# PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

# REGULAR SESSION—August 28, 1882.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Aldermanic Chamber, Monday evening, August 28th, A. D. 1882, at eight o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. James T. Layman, President of the Board of Aldermen, in the Chair, and Aldermen DeRuiter, Hamilton, Mussmann, Newman, Seibert, Tueker, and Wood—8.

ABSENT, 2-viz. Aldermen Drew, and Rorison.

The Proceedings of the Board of Equalization, held August 7th and August 16th, 1882, and the special sessions, held August 7th and August 16th, 1882, and the regular session, held August 14th, 1882, having been printed, and placed on the desks of the Aldermen, said Journals were approved as published.

The following report from the Judiciary Committee (see page 350, ante) was read, and referred to the Judiciary Committee and City Attorney:

Indianapolis, Aug. 21st, 1882.

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your Judiciary Committee, together with the City Attorney, to whom was referred sundry papers, report thereon as follows, to-wit:

The first is a petition by the Indiana National Bank, by V. T. Malott, President, showing that the City Treasurer refused to permit him to pay taxes for 1881, on lots 4, 5, 6 and 7, in square 64, city, for reason that, by his books, the taxes of 1879 were unpaid, when, in point of fact, the taxes of 1879 were paid.

The petition further shows that, by memorandum of books of City Treasurer, said lots are marked sold for taxes of 1879 and 1881, but, in point of fact, they were not sold. The City Treasurer informs your Committee that the above facts are true.

We therefore recommend that the memorandum of said supposed sale be caucled, that proper entry be made on Treasurer's books showing taxes of 1879 paid, and that the City Treasurer be directed to receive taxes of 1881, without penalty and interest.

The second is the petition of F. McWhinney, showing that, on February 15th, 1881, he purchased at tax sale lot 9, in Bartholomew's sub. of I. & C. R. R. Co,'s addition to city, and that \$3.21 of the money paid was on account of improvements made on lot, when, in point of fact, there never was any improvements on said lot.

We therefore recommend that \$3.21, with interest from February 15th, 1881, be refunded.

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—Your Committees on Accounts and Claims and on Judiciary, to whom was referred the claim of Hiram Hunt, John Kent and Jas. Kealy, for \$30 on account of work performed in recovering bodies from Pogue's Run in the recent flood, would report thereon as follows:

No claim can be held valid against the city on account of said accident, by which several of our citizens lost their lives by being drowned in Pogue's Run. The bridge upon which they were standing was not built by the city, and was not in a public street. Only upon the ground of a gift, could the bill be paid. We question the right of the city government to make gifts to individuals out of public moneys. We therefore recommend that the claim be not allowed.

The following report from a special committee was read, and the favorable action of the Common Council thereon (see page 351, ante), was not concurred in:

Indianapolis, Aug. 21st, 1882.

Your special committee to whom was referred a clause in a report of the City Attorney in regard to suit by Harrison's Bank vs. The City, to restrain the City Treasurer from collecting certain taxes on moneys placed on the duplicate by the

Board of Equalization. It was supposed by said Board that the money was in the vaults of the bank, while in point of fact it was, on April 1st, 1881, in United States bonds, deposited in the Corn Exchange Bank, of New York city. All the testimony taken in New York goes to show that the money supposed by the Board of Equalization to be in money was in United States bonds, and therefore not taxable.

But as the City Attorney has collected all the testimony he can find and is ready for trial, we recommend that the case be submitted to the Circuit Court for trial,

and that the city abide by the decision of said court.

That the City Civil Engineer be directed to contract for such number of street signs (same as now in use) as may be needed from time to time to replace broken ones, and to place where not already located; and that he be directed to place such signs at any point needed on order of any Councilman or Alderman.

The following entitled ordinances (passed by the Common Council) were severally read the first time:

- S. O. 85, 1882 —An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the first alley east of Everson street, from the first alley south of Prospect street to Orange street.
- S. O. 90, 1882.—An ordinance to provide for grading, paving with brick and curbing with stone the east sidewalk, of Broadway street, from St. Clair street to Cherry street (where not already properly done.)
- S. O. 93, 1882.—An ordinance to provide for grading and bowldering the first alley south of New York street, from Missouri street to Columbia street.
