REGULAR SESSION—October 16, 1882.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Council Chamber, Monday evening, October 16th, A. D. 1882, at half-past seven o'clock, in regular session.

The City Civil Engineer submitted the following report; which was received;

To the Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—I was directed by your honorable bodies to make an examination and report, what should be done to the sewer at corner of Greer and Stevens streets; the motion stated that the sewer was insufficient to carry off the water.

I have not had an opportunity, since receiving your instructions, to watch the

action of said sewer during a storm; but from the indications, and from information, I am of the opinion that the fault is not so much the incapacity of the sewer in question, as it is that of the out-fall—South street sewer being its out fall; and I am informed that at this point it is frequently taxed to its utmost capacity for considerable time. The relief proposed would not, in my opinion, be of material benefit, so long as the present conditions exist, except as a storage reservoir, to hold the accumulation of water until an outlet could be had in the South street sewer. Though South street sewer will soon be relieved by Reid street sewer, and in that event an extra line of pipe from Stevens street to South street, except where the said sewer is built of brick, in Merrill street, would be of considerable benefit.

14th. Is that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to clean the gutters on Agnes street.

15th. Is that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, requested to clean the gutters of College avenue, between Seventh and Tenth streets, as the west gutter is now in a filthy condition.

Work has been done.

16th. Is that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to put footbridges across the gutters at the crossings of Eight street, on College avenue.

Recommend the work be done.

17th. Is that the Street Commissioner be directed to put in a stone crossing across Seventh street, on west side of Pennsylvania street; also, to gravel the first alley-crossing north of Seventh street and Eighth street crossing, all on west side of Pennsylvania street.

18th. Is to instruct the Street Commissioner to clean the ditch that runs along Nevada street, from Hill avenue to Sheldon street.

27th. Is that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, authorized to employ sufficient men to remove the rank growth of weeds now growing upon the public streets and sidewalks on the outskirts of the city.

Recommend the work be not done.

28th. Is that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, requested to lay stone crossing at corner of Fifth and Pennsylvania streets.

Recommend the work be done.

29th. Is that the deep ditch between Meridian and Illinois streets, on the north side of Seventh street, be covered, to guard against accidents that may occur.

Recommend this matter be referred to the City' Civil Engineer, with instructions to report best manner to improve the same.

30th. Is that the Street Commissioner be directed to clean the gutters on Howard street, from Second street north to Fifth street, and remove the pipe in the gutter at Howard and Third streets, so the water can flow.

Recommend the work be not done.

31st. Is that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to fill up sinkholes on Wabash and Miami streets, from Alabama street to Noble street.

Recommend the work be done.

32d. That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, requested to lay a stone crossing at the crossing of Pennsylvania and Second streets.

Recommend the work be done.

33d. Is that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to lay stone crossings across the streets and alleys from English avenue to Prospect street, on Dillon street.

Recommend the Street Commissioner be authorized to do this work by contract.

34th. Is that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, requested to cut the weeds and Canada thistles on the following named streets: On Ray street, from Tennessee street to West street; on Church and Carlos streets, between Ray and Morris streets.

35th. Is that the Street Commissioner be directed to clean the gutters on Market street, between Noble and State streets.

Recommend the work be done.

36th. Is that the Board of Public Improvements be directed to contract for a driven well at the northwest corner of Delaware and Walnut streets.

37th. Is that the Street Commissioner be directed to raise the bowldered gutter on the east side of New Jersey street, just south of St. Clair street, so as to cause the water to run off at that point; said work to be done under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

38th. Is that the Street Commissioner repair the chuck-holes on Lawrence street, from Nevada street to Rural street.

Recommend the work be not done.

39th. Is that the Street Commissioner clean the gutters on Ninth street, from Martindale avenue to Newman street.

Recommend the work be not done.

40th. Is that a driven well be established at the northeast corner of South and Meridian streets.

We find that there is a driven well within two squares of said locality, also, a drinking-fountain on opposite side of the street. Therefore, recommend the work be not done.

41st. Is that the Street Commissioner be instructed to place double stone crossings at the alley-crossing of McCarty street, between East street and Virginia avenue, as the sidewalks on said street have been lately improved with new brick walks.

Recommend the Street Commissioner be authorized to do the work under contract.

- 42d. Is that the Street Commi sioner be, and is hereby, instructed to repair California street, from Washington street to Maryland street, with coarse gravel. Recommend the work be done.
- 43d. Is that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to clean the gutters and fill the chuck-holes on Maryland street, from Missouri street to Helen street.

Recommend the work be done.

44th. Is that a double stone crossing be placed on Mississippi street, south side, crossing of First street.

Recommend the work be done.

45th. Is that a double stone crossing be placed on Mississippi street, at the crossing of Pratt street, north side, as the gutters have been bowldered and curbed, and sidewalks paved.

Recommend the work be done.

46th. Is that the Street Commissioner be instructed to put stone crossing on south side of Michigan street, across Bright and Douglass streets.

Recommend the Street Commissioner be authorized to do the work under contract,

51st. Is that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to clean the north gutter of Ohio street, from Noble street to Harvey street.

That the Street Commissioner is hereby instructed to repair the wash out in Locust street, at the intersection of the third alley south of Ray street, so as to prevent the water on said street from draining into, and flooding private property.

That the City Civil Engineer is hereby instructed to examine into, and report to this Council, at its next meeting, if any additional drainage be necessary at the intersection of Locust street and the third alley north of Ray street, and the best method of doing the same.

Councilman Koller offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to raise the sidewalk on north side of Washington street, from Noble street to Davidson street.

Councilman Koller offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the City Marshal be, and is hereby, directed to notify the C., C., C. & I., Wabash, and I., B. & W. R. R. Companies, to plank the crossings of the first alley north of Market street, between Railroad and Davidson streets; also, to notify said companies to enlarge the culverts under their tracks on Davidson street, between Market and Ohio streets, and on Market street.

Councilman Pritchard offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the Sanitary Police notify residents of property along first alley west of Illinois street running from Third street to Fourth street, to remove the stable manure from said alley, at once.

Councilman Pritchard offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements.

That a double stone crossing be placed across Seventh street, on west side of Mississippi street, a new brick sidewalk having been lad.

Councilman Reichwein offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to lay a stone crossing on New Jersey street, crossing New York on east side.

Councilman Reichwein offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the Market Master be, and is hereby, authorized to examine the weights and measures of the so-ealled potatoe pedlars, and if found incorrect, to file against them.

Councilman Morrison presented the following petition; which, on motion by Councilman Pritchard, was received, and time extended for three weeks from October 23d, 1882:

Indianapolis, October 16, 1882.

To the Board of Public Improvements:

Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned, contractors for the paving of north Meridian street, from New York street to St. Clair street, would respectfully ask your honorable body to grant us an extension of time for the completion of the work until November 20th, 1882.

We hereby state the cause of our delay in getting at the work, was due to the extreme scarcity of cedar, and the failure of persons making contract to turnish the same to us.
