Indianapolis, January 1st, 1883.

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—I beg leave to submit the following brief summary report of cases disposed of, in which the city was interested, during the year 1882:

There were pending against the city, in the United States Courts, the Supreme Court of Indiana, and the courts of Marion county, on the 1st day of January, 1882, when I entered upon the discharge of my duties as your attorney, forty-two (42) cases. Of these, thirty-one (31) have been disposed of as follows: Twenty-seven (27) were decided in favor of the city; three (3) were compromised; and one (1) was decided against the city.

In addition to the above, forty-five (45) suits were brought against the city during said year, and three (3) brought by the city, in the courts above named. Of these, twenty-nine (29) have been disposed of with the following result: Against the city, three (3); in favor of the city, twenty-five (25); and one (1) case was compromised or abandoned.

Of the three (3) cases decided against the city, two (2) have been appealed, and are now pending in the general term of the Superior Court. The other, being the case of Annie Merrick vs. The City, has been finally settled, and is the only case tried during my term which has involved the city in an actual outlay of money.

In the foregoing statement, I have not included any cases which originated before the Mayor or Justices of the Peace, and afterwards appealed to the courts named.

I have collected and turned into the treasury during said year, by suit and otherwise, the sum of \$1,321.51.

The interest on these amounts to this time, at 6 per cent., is \$4.73, and they paid \$2.35 for deed and recording same; total, \$36.22

This same property was mortgaged to one John F. Trask to the School Fund of the State, July 28th, 1877, and on March 22d, 1880, it was forfeited and bid in by the State, and is now the property of the State. (See record of the sale in County Commissioners' Record No. 17, p. 513.)

Your petitioners pray that the city refund to them said \$36.22, as in other similar cases, and as is the rule of Council, and according to the decisions of the Supreme Court.
