The Judiciary Committee, through Councilman Pritchard, submitted the following report; which was concurred in:

To the Mayor and Common Council,

Gentlemen:—Your Judiciary Committee, together with the City Attorney, to whom was referred sundry papers, report thereon as follows, to wit:

First, are two bills of \$50 each, filed by Dr. L. S. Henthorne, for burying Carrie Criss and Julius Berndt, two small-pox cases. Dr. Elder, Secretary of the Board of Health, certifies that both bills are correct, and each are \$33 less than any other undertaker would do the work.

We recommend \$100 be placed in next appropriation ordinance for Dr. Henthorne.

Second, in an item of last report recommending that \$32.34 be paid to Henry Clay on account of estimate given him on lot owned by the State. It was referred back with instructions to present same to State officers for payment. This has been done and payment refused.

We recommend the sum be allowed Henry Clay in June appropriation.

Third, is petition of Anna E. Stanton, showing that as owner of lots 7 to 22, lot 24, 31 to 27, 40, 41, 42, 43, 46, 31 to 27 inclusive, in Stanton's addition, she paid taxes for years 1876 to 1880 inclusive, amounting to \$176.47. Said addition was never in the city and has been stricken from the duplicate by order of Council and Board for above reason. Under the McAvoy case, this money must be refunded.

We recommend the same be refunded, with interest, and that the Clerk make proper reductions on account of school money.



THIS AGREEMENT, Made and entered into this 14th day of May, 1883, by and between the City of Indianapolis, party of the first part, and Luther Mehring, party of the second part:

Witnesseth, That the said party of the first part, for and in consideration of one hundred and thirty-five dollars, and the covenants and agreements herein contained, to be kept and performed by the party of the second part, does hereby give and grant to the party of the second part, the exclusive right and privilege for and during the term of one year, from the 14th day of May, 1883, to remove from the streets, alleys, lots, yards, and public places of said City of Indianapolis, all dead

animals of every description; the said party of the second part to have the right and privilege to have and appropriate all such dead animals so removed to his own use; it being understood that the above rights and privileges are granted by the said City of Indianapolis only to the extent of her right and power to grant them, and that she shall be in no way liable to the party of the second part on account of any failure of said party of the second part to enforce his rights under this contract, to dead animals, or the right to remove the same as against other parties than the City of Indianapolis.

In consideration whereof, the said party of the second part covenants and agrees to pay the said City on demand, the sum of one hundred and thirty-five dollars, and undertakes and agrees that he will, during the term of this contract, remove all the dead animals from the streets, alleys, lots, yards and public places of said city; that he will promptly and faithfully do said work, and so remove said animals, and that he will faithfully comply with all the ordinances, rules and regulations of said City now in force, or that may hereafter be enacted by the proper authorities of said City, concerning or regulating the matter of the removal and disposition of dead animals.

And said party of the second part further agrees to remove all such dead animals to what is known as the "Sellers Farm," and in disposing of the same to use the most approved machinery and appliances for destroying the offensive odors and smells, and to use every proper prevention and care to prevent any nuisance arising therefrom, or anything done by said party of the second part.

This contract shall not be assignable or transferable by the party of the second part, without the consent of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of said city first obtained.

In case the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of said city shall at any time during the continuance of this contract deem the party of the second part to have failed to perform any of the stipulations of this contract, or violated any of the ordinances or regulations of the city upon the subject of dead animals, or the removal thereof, they shall have the power and right to wholly terminate and put an end to this contract by giving said party of the second part ten days' notice; and after the expiration of said ten days, the contract shall be wholly terminated and ended, and no right of action of any kind whatever, shall ensue to said party of the second part by reason of the termination of the contract as aforesaid.

The said party of the second part further agrees to provide all necessary apparatus, wagons and tools to enable him to promptly remove and dispose of all such dead animals in a proper manner, and to execute to the said city a bond in the penal sum of fifteen hundred dollars, with sureties to the satisfaction of the Common Council and Board of Aldernien, conditioned for the faithful performance of this contract on the part of the party of the second part.

G. O. 1, 1883—An ordinance to amend Section five (5) of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance for the protection of travelers, passengers and baggage, and for the preservation of order in and about the Union Depot, in the City of Indianapolis, Indiana," ordained February 20th, 1882.

And it was passed by the following vote:

AYES, 8-viz. Aldermen DeRuiter, Hamilton, Mussmann, Newman, Rorison, Seibert, Tucker, and President Layman.

NAYS-None.

The Committees on Streets & Alleys and Sewers & Drainage, through Alderman Seibert, submitted the following report;

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Streets and Alleys, to whom sundry papers were referred, report as follows:

1st. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner repair the old National Road bridge, and that he be directed to receive bids for putting the same in good order.

We recommend the Street Commissioner make said repairs.

2d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to lower the crown of the cistern on Mississippi street, between St. Clair and Pratt streets.

We recommend that the action of the Council in adopting said motion be concurred in.

3d. Is a motion that the City Civil Engineer be directed to advertise for bids to lower the crown of the fire cistern on Tennessee street, between McCarty and Ray streets.

We recommend the Street Commissioner do the work.

4th. Is the matter of extending Woodlawn avenue from the terminus, at Dillon street, to Elk street.

We recommend that the action of the Common Council in said matter be concurred in when the parties interested file the proper bond.

5th. Is a motion granting S. A. Fletcher permission to sink a well near the corner of Ninth and Newman streets.

We recommend the same be concurred in.

INTRODUCTION OF MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS.

Alderman Tucker offered the following motion, which was adopted:

That the City Attorney be, and is hereby, requested to prepair and present to the Council for their action, an Ordinance appropriating the sum of \$25,000 for the purpose of cleaning and widening Pogues Run; that such work be done under the directions of the City Civil Engineer and Street Commissioner, and that said work be commenced as soon as possible.

Alderman Rorison offered the following motion, which was adopted:

That the City Attorney be, and he is hereby, instructed to prepare and have introduced, an ordinance providing for an election, in October next, of a Police Judge, to preside over the City Court, the term of his office to begin January 1st, 1884.

The Council and Board hereby pledge themselves to reduce the salary of the Mayor by the amount appropriated for the salary of said Police Judge, so as not to increase the Salary Ordinance on account of this office.

Alderman Hamilton introduced the following entitled ordinance, which was read the first time:

G. O. 34, 1883—An ordinance to amend section eleven (11) of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance providing a uniform system for numbering buildings," ordained August 30th, 1869.

The following entitled ordinance (passed by the Common Council) was read the first time:

Ap. 0. 42, 1883—An ordinance appropriating the sum of one thousand dollars on account of the Street Department of the City of Indianapolis, for the cleaning of streets, etc.

On motion by Alderman DeRuiter, the rules were suspended for the purpose of placing the ordinance on its final passage, by the following vote:

AYES, 8-viz. Aldermen DeRuiter, Hamilton, Mussmann, Newman, Rorison, Seibert, Tucker, and President Layman.

NAYS-None.

Ap. O. 42, 1883, was then read the second time.

Alderman Tucker offered the following amendment, which was adopted:

Amend Section one by striking out the proviso therein, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Provided, That the Street Commissioner use the amount of money appropriated in this ordinance throughout the city, wherever he may deem it necessary."

The ordinance was then ordered engrossed as amended, read the third time, and passed by the following vote:

AYES, 7-viz. Aldermen DeRuiter, Hamilton, Mussmann, Newman, Seibert, Tucker, and President Layman.

NAYS, 1-viz. Alderman Rorison.

The following entitled ordinance (passed by the Common Council) was read the first time:

G. O. 33, 1883—An ordinance providing for the compensation of the officers of the City of Indianapolis, and the officers and members of the Fire Department of said city, from June 1st to December 31st, 1883.

Alderman Rorison moved that the Board of Alderman do now adjourn, which was laid on the table, on motion by Alderman Tucker.

Alderman Seibert moved a suspension of the rules, for the purpose of placing G. O. 33, 1883, on its final passage.

Which motion failed of adoption by the following vote:

AYES, 5-viz. Aldermen Hamilton, Mussmann, Newman, Seibert, and Tucker. NAYS, 3-viz. Aldermen DeRuiter, Rorison, and President Layman.

On motion, the Board of Aldermen then adjourned.
