I have since that time bought it with a clear title according to the records. Last spring there appeared against the property on the tax list a benefit assessment for opening an alley, the opening of which has decreased the value of my property several hundred dollars, and has besides debarred me from effecting a sale of the property. This alley is now built up with out-houses and stables, and though said alley-opening has benefited the property on Locke street, it has proved to be a great damage to me, as you will see by referring to the plat attached hereto. Believing that this assessment is decidedly unjust, I shall await the action of your honorable bodies.

O. 93, 1884—An ordinance to provide for the erection of one lamp-post, lamp and fixtures (complete to burn gas, except the service pipes), on Chapel street, between Pratt and St. Joseph streets, at or near the southwest corner of said Chapel street and the alley running east and west between said Pratt and St. Joseph streets.
