REPORT FROM CITY COMMISSIONERS.

The Board of City Commissioners submitted the following report, accompanied with resolution:

To the Mayor, Board of Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Ind:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, members of the Board of City Commissioners of said city, duly appointed, qualified and acting under the provisions of the Statutes of the State of Indiana, in relation to the laying out, opening, widening, altering and vacation of streets, alleys and highways, beg leave to submit the following report, in the matter of the vacation of certain streets and alleys in the east part of Bruce Place Addition, as more particularly described in the petition and plat herewith attached, and filed herewith, and made a part of these proceedings; marked "Exhibit A."

1st. We met at the office of City Clerk, in room 6, on Friday, the 30th day of May, 1884, at 10 o'clock A. M., to examine into the matter of the proposed vacation, in accordance with the notice of the City Clerk, which notice and return of the Superintendent of the Metropolitan Police, endorsed thereon, is filed herewith, and marked "Exhibit B."

2d. We immediately proceeded to view the streets and alleys proposed to be vacated, and the property contiguous thereto, and the surrounding property along the line of said streets and alleys, and find the following corporations and persons owning the property, herein described, are interested in said vacations, viz: Aaron

C. Goodman, the owner of two-sevenths interest in lots 154 to 162, and 163 to 171, inclusive, Bruce Place Addition; Stoughton J. Fletcher and F. M. Churchman, the owners of five sevenths interest in the above described lots; Thomas H. Sharpe, Ingram Fletcher, Stoughton A. Fletcher and Albert E. Fletcher, the owners of lots 145 to 153, and 172 to 180, and 181 to 189, in Bruce Place Addition; Wabash, St. Louis & Pacific Railway Company, the right of way along the east side of said Bruce Place Addition. That we made due report of said facts to the City Clerk, and required said Clerk to have the petitioners notify said interested parties to meet the City Commissioners in room 6, of the City Clerk's office, on Monday, the 4th day of August, 1884, at 10 o'clock A. M., when evidence would be heard as to said matters. Said r port is filed herewith as a part hereof, marked "Exhibit C."

3d. We further report that we met at the time and place named, and though due service had been made on all said interested parties, none of them made any opposition to said proposed vacation. Whereupon it was agreed that the Secretary should prepare a report of vacation, in accordance with said facts, and present it to a meeting of the Board, to be held on Monday, the 11th of August, 1884, at 10

o'clock A. M., in room 6 of the City Clerk's office.

4th. We now, on the 11th day of August, further report, that the length, width and location of the streets and alleys proposed to be vacated is as follows: Greenwood street, from Reagan street on the south to Bruce street on the north, a distance of twelve hundred and twenty seven and ninety-two hundredths feet, the width of said Greenwood street being 80 feet; Clyde street. from Bellefontaine avenue to the right of way of the Wabash, St Louis & Pacific Railroad, a distance of seven hundred and forty-seven feet, said Clyde street being 60 feet wide; the alley between Bellefontaine avenue and Greenwood street, twenty feet wide, and running from Bruce street to Reagan street a distance of twelve hundred and twenty-seven and ninety-two hundredths feet.

5th. The value of the land on which said streets and alleys are situate is \$500.

6th. The benefits to the persons desiring the vacation is \$54.00.

7th. There are no persons owning property on said streets objecting to said vacation.

The expenses attending said vacation, to be paid by the petitioners, amounts to \$54.00.

We therefore recommend the prayer of the petition be granted, and that said vacation be made as prayed for.

A. Harder, \$2,200. W. B. Bassett, 47 cents per lineal foot.

W. A. Pattison & Co., 32 cents per lineal foot.

M. O'Brien & Co., 29 cents per lineal foot.

The only bid accompanied with a sufficient bond was W. B. Bassett, and we therefore, as in duty bound, awarded him said contract. The number of lineal feet in all the bridges is, according to the Engineer's report, 1,916 lineal feet.
