INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 30, 1871.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:—Your Committee on the Judiciary, and the City Attorney, to whom was referred a resolution instructing them to inquire into the expediency of reporting an ordinance providing for working city prisoners and transient paupers, have considered the subject, and a majority of said committee are of the opinion that an ordinance providing for the working of city prisoners would be expedient and proper; but that the Common Council has no power to provide for the working of transient paupers. A majority of said committee, therefore take the liberty of reporting the accompanying ordinance providing for working city prisoners, and recommend that it be passed. Your committee also report the accompanying resolution in relation to transient paupers, and recommend its adoption.

The City Commissioners made the following report:

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 30, 1871.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:—The petition of Charles Welling and 14 others, asking the extension westward of Vermont Street from the first alley west of Bright Street to the Donation line, having been referred to us, we have, after viewing the premises and hearing testimony, agreed on the following report and assessment of damages and benefits:

The proposed extension will require the condemnation of the following ground and improvements, a more detailed description being given, with the names of the several owners, in the schedule hereinafter contained.

Between the first alley west of Bright Street, and Blake Street, the proposed extension will take a strip 60 feet wide by about 435 feet long, cast and west. in out-lot No. 151. From Blake to Agnes street it takes all of lots 7, 14, 27 and 34, and also a strip 25 feet in width

off the north side of each of lots 8, 13, 28 and 33, all in Ray's subdivision of out-lot No. 159.

From Agnes Street west to the donation line, the proposed street takes a strip 60 feet wide by about 570 feet long, of unimproved, undivided ground, in the west part of out-lot No. 150.

Lot 7. in Ray's subdivision above named, had on it, at the time this petition was filed, a partially constructed brick house, belonging to Austin H. Lintner, but this has been removed to make way for the contemplated street, and in the schedule of damages, we have allowed him the fair cash cost of removing and replacing his improvements, on the adjoining lot No. 6. There is on each of lots 27 and 28 above named, a small frame house, with fences &c., owned by James O'Meare. We have allowed him the present fair cash value of these improvements. They can, after condemnation, be sold by the city, and the proceeds go into the treasury. We have charged the city in the schedule of benefits with the snm of four hundred dollars, the amount we estimate said improvement should bring at said sale. The real estate and improvements set forth in the following schedule have been estimated as to their values, and the benefits charged according to our own judgment and the weight of the testimony taken in the case.
