COMMON COUNCIL.

REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,
Monday, October 19th, 1868, 7 o'clock, p. m.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—16.

Absent—Councilmen Burgess and Colley—2.

The proceedings of the regular session held October 12th, 1868, were read and approved.

REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS.

Mr. Cottrell offered the following motion:

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to have the gutter on the west side of New Jersey street, between South and Duncan streets, properly cleaned out.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following:

That the City Marshal notify the property holders to remove the fence from the alley running north and south through out-lots Nos. 103 and 104, in accordance with a dedication made to the city of a 15 foot alley, made and received in June, 1868.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following resolution:

Resolved, That the owners of the following described real estate, to-wit: Lot "C" of Seidensticker, Kappes & Lingenfelter's subdivision of lot No. one (1) in Square No. sixty-two (62) of the City of Indianapolis, be, and they are hereby, required to fill and drain the same, as, in the opinion of this Council, there is a hole or excavation thereon, in which water has or may become so stagnant and noxious as to be a nuisance and injurious to the health and comfort of said city and of the inhabitants thereof, and that the Street Commissioner be, and he is hereby, required to notify the owners thereof, as provided by an ordinance passed April 23d, 1866, entitled "An ordinance providing for the drainage and filling up of ponds, excavations and holes, and prescribing penalties for the failure to fill up or drain the same," and that in case of the failure of the owners thereof to fill or drain the same, the Street Commissioner proceed to fill or drain said excavation, as provided in said ordinance, and provided that the cost thereof shall not exceed ten per cent. of the value of the aforesaid real estate, as assessed upon the tax duplicate for city purposes.

The question being on the passage of the resolution, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Cottrell, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Stanton and Woodburn—12.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the resolution passed.

Mr. Cottrell introduced special ordinance No. 100-1868, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for repairing Delaware street, between Wyoming street and Madison Road.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Cottrell introduced special ordinance No. 101-1868, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for grading and bowldering Delaware street, between the south side of Pogue Run and the south side of South street, and curbing the outside edge with White Oak plank.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Cottrell introduced special ordinance No. 102-1868, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for graveling the west sidewalk of Alabama st., between Duncan and Merrill streets.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Geisel introduced special ordinance No. 103-1868, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling Vine street and sidewalks, between Jackson and Ash streets, and to repeal an ordinance to grade said Vine street and sidewalks, between Jackson street and the first alley east of Ash street.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Goddard offered the following motions:

That the Market Master rent the benches in the east end of the East Market House for the use of fish men.

That Mr. Parry be allowed to grade and gravel his sidewalk on Missouri street, between South and Henry streets, according to the stakes and directions of the Civil Engineer, at his own expense.

That E. C. Atkins & Co. be allowed to pave with brick the entire sidewalk in front of their saw works, together with curbing the outer edge of said sidewalk with curb-stone, and that the Civil Engineer be directed to set the necessary grade stakes

Which were adopted.

Mr. Goddard presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Sept. 28, 1868

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

We, the undersigned, property owners on Kentucky Avenue, between Tennessee and Missouri streets, and bordering on the line of improvement contracted for by William Kown, respectfully represent, that said contractor has duly performed his contract, and is justly entitled to an estimate and pay therefor, except the sidewalk on the south side of Kentucky Avenue, which has not been improved because of the expressed wish of the property owners, and we respectfully ask that said sidewalk be not improved, and that the contractor be relieved therefrom, but the contract, with that exception, shall be and remain in force, and subject to be legally enforced against us.

Mr. Henschen presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Oct. 19, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned citizens would respectfully petition His Honor, the Mayor, and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis to take the necessary steps to have removed a certain pond now existing on let No. 45, in out-lot No.

160 of Greer & Walters' Subdivision, and the adjoining alleys. This large body of water, impregnated with filth, renders the air impure and unhealthful, and, by reason of its extent and depth, is a thing of inconvenience, endangering property, personal safety and human life. It is a nuisance to those affected thereby, and they respectfully ask that the same be filled up and removed, and the nuisance abated. We believe the said lot belongs to W. W. Walters.

Also, the following resolution:

Resolved, That the owners of the following described real estate, to-wit: lot No. forty-five (45), in out-lot No. one hundred (100), Greer & Walters' Subdivision, in the City of Indianapolis, be and they are hereby required to fill and drain the same, as, in the opinion of this Council, there is a hole or excavation thereon in which water has or may become so stagnant and noxious as to be a nuisance and injurious to the health and comfort of said city, and of the inhabitants thereof, and that the Street Commissioner be, and he is hereby required to notify the owners thereof, as provided by an ordinance passed April 23, 1866, entitled "An ordinance providing for the drainage and filling up of ponds, excavations and holes, and prescribing penalties for the failure to fill up or drain the same," and that in case of the failure of the owners thereof to fill or drain the same, the Street Commissioner proceed to drain or fill said excavation, as provided in said ordinance, and provided that the cost thereof shall not exceed ten per cent. of the value of the aforesaid real estate, as assessed upon the tax duplicate for city purposes.

The question being on the passage of the resolution, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Stanton and Woodburn—14.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the resolution passed.

Mr. Henschen offered the following motion:

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to build a bridge over the gutter, on the east side of Virginia Avenue, on the crossing of Noble and Pine streets, and the same be done under the direction of the City Engineer.

Which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements.

Dr. Jameson offered the following motions:

That David S. Beatty be permitted to grade and pave the sidewalk in front of his property on North New Jersey street, and that the Engineer be directed to set the proper stakes.

That Conrad Schuslor be permitted to grade and pave the sidewalk in front of his property on North New Jersey street, and that the Engineer be directed to set the proper stakes.

That Stoughton A. Fletcher, Sr., be permitted to grade and pave the sidewalk in front of his residence on Ohio street, and that the Engineer be directed to set the proper stakes.

That the Gas Inspector be directed to make a schedule for lighting the city, for one year, including the time, since going into effect, of the late contract with the Gas Company; and that said schedule should approximate, as nearly as practicable, 1,900 hours, and that the remaining hours, up to 2,000, be expended by the lamp lighter, under the direction of said Gas Inspector, the same if dark nights, before the hours of 10 o'clock p. m.; and that it shall be the duty of the Gas Inspector to leave written instructions with the Gas Company, on or before 5 o'clock p. m., on such evenings as it may be necessary to do extra lighting, and to see that all such extra hours are fully expended during the year.

Which were adopted.

Mr. Kappes offered the following motions:

That Everett Everts and Ludwig Sahn be allowed to pave with brick the sidewalk in front of their respective property, on Fort Wayne Avenue, and that the Civil Engineer be directed to set the necessary grade stakes. The whole work to be done under the direction of the City Engineer.

That James Brown be allowed to pave with brick the sidewalk in front of his property, on North Meridian street, between Ohio and New York streets, and that the City Engineer be directed to set the necessary grade stakes.

Which were adopted.

Mr. Kappes presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Oct. 19, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned, owners of property along the route herein described, having frontage according to the number of feet affixed opposite our names, would respectfully petition your honorable body for the passage of an ordinance to pave with brick, eight feet wide, the sidewalk commencing at Pennsylvania street; thence on the northwest side of Fort Wayne Avenue to Delaware street; thence on the west side of Delaware street to Pratt street.

Also, special ordinance No. 105-1868, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for paving with brick the north-west sidewalk of Fort Wayne Avenue, between Pennsylvania and Delaware streets.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Loomis offered the following motion:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to build a wooden culvert under Stevens street, at the intersection of Greer street.

Which was adopted.

Mr. MacArthur introduced special ordinance No. 106—1868, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the second alley west of Market street, running north and south from Market street to Wabash street.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. MacArthur offered the following motion:

That the Committee on Revision of Ordinances be instructed to report an amendment to an ordinance entitled an ordinance Regulating the Markets within the City of Indianapolis, and defining the duties of Market Master, &c., so as to prevent the sale of fresh cut meats outside of the Market Houses, so long as there are stalls to be rented inside.

Mr. Davis called for the ayes and noes on the motion.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Geisel, Goddard, Loomis, MacArthur and Woodburn—5.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Schmidt, Seidensticker and Stanton—11.

So the motion was lost.

Mr. MacArthur presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Sept. 7, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, contractor for building the fence around Military Park, would respectfully state to your honorable body that I have lost on the fence built for your honorable body near three hundred dollars, not including my own labor. As I am a poor man, and have a debt yet unpaid on the fence, I respectfully ask you to make me an appropriation of three hundred dollars, and, as in duty bound, your petitioner will ever pray, &c.

Mr. Seidensticker presented the following from the City Treasurer:

against the residents of Blackford street for the widening and opening of said street.

Mr. Seidensticker offered the following motion:

That the City Clerk be authorized and directed to withhold from Thomas Wren, from the money due him from city for the improvements on Tennessee street, the sum of one hundred and thirty-six dollars and twenty-one cents (\$136.21), being for printing and costs on precepts issued on the 14th day of August, 1867.

(The property described in said precepts was sold to said Wren on the 2d of November, 1867, and the costs made on account of such sale have no

yet been paid.)

Which was referred to the Committee on Finance, with instructions to ascertain the facts in the case, and that the Clerk retain the amount until said Committee reports.

Mr. Stanton offered the following motion:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to place a suitable wooden culvert, the full with of Vermont street, on the east side, at the crossing of said Vermont, Mississippi streets and Indiana Avenue.

A consideration of which was postponed one week.

Dr. Woodburn offered the following motion:

That Nelson Trusler be permitted to place a wooden bridge from his stable door to the ground on Muskingum alley.

Which was adopted.

Dr. Woodburn presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Oct. 19, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned residents of said city would respectfully represent that they are the sole owners of lots Nos. 3, 4 and 5, in square 6, Coe's Subdivision, in said city; that said lots are divided by an alley running east and west through the same; and for the following reasons the undersigned respectfully ask your honorable body to vacate said alley, between Meridian street and west line of said lots, if no good reasons are shown to the contrary, after due and legal notice shall have been given in the premises: It is but twelve feet wide, and its use for the passage of hay, wood and other wagons causes a constant and costly destruction of fences; that we are unable to enter into or pass out of our stables through said alley, and the fact that in the same square there are two north and south alleys, each twenty feet wide, dispenses with the further use of said alley.

They further represent that said alley is of no value whatever to the property of any other person than the undersigned, and it is intended, if such vacation is ordered, to erect such ornamental improvements as will benefit and beautify what is now but an useless and unsightly waste of ground.

His Honor, the Mayor, introduced general ordinance No. 162—1868, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE protecting public morality, decency and order.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Davis introduced special ordinance No. 107-1868, entitled:

AN Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling Wabash street, between Meridian and Illinois streets.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Davis offered the following motion:

That the Street Commissioner be and is hereby directed to properly repair the gutter on the west side of Illinois street, between Washington street and Potomac alley.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Coburn presented the following remonstrance:

Indianapolis, Oct. 19, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned, property owners upon Washington street and the alley running north thereof, between Meridian and Pennsylvania streets, respect fully and most earnestly protest and remonstrate against the permission to Mrs. Rhodius, or other person, to obstruct said alley by the erection of a stairway in the same. The said alley is a narrow one, being only fifteen feet in width, and is in constant use by a very large number of our citizens, and the Express Companies, and the erection of said stairway would so obstruct the roadway as to greatly interfere with the business of the public, and greatly damage our property.

That the action of the Council heretofore taken granting Mrs. Rhodius the privilege of erecting a stairway in an alley running east and west, between Market and Circle streets and Washington street, and between Pennsylvania and Meridian streets, be rescinded.

The ayes and noes being demanded, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Kappes, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn-10.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Goddard, Henschen, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt and Seidensticker-6.

So the motion was adopted.

Mr. Davis gave notice that at the next meeting of Council he would introduce a resolution requiring all stairways erected in alleys to be removed.

Mr. Coburn presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Oct. 19, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

I respectfully request permission to pave with brick, eight feet in width of the sidewalk in front of my lot, No. 434, North Delaware street. J. P. HARPER.

In reference to which Mr. Coburn offered the following motion:

That the request of J. P. Harper be granted, if done under the direction of the Civil Engineer, and within thirty days.

Which was adopted.

Sealed proposals for public work were referred to the Board of Public Improvements without reading.

REPORTS FROM BOARDS.

Mr. Davis, from the Board of Public Improvements, made the following report:

> OFFICE BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS, \ Indianapolis, Oct. 19, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:-The Board of Public Improvements, to whom was referred the several matters, would respectfully report:

- 1. That Samuel Lefever is the lowest bidder for grading and bowldering Virginia Avenue, and curbing the outside edges with white oak plank, from the south side of Pogue Run to the south side of Louisiana street, his bid being, for bowldering, \$2.40 per lineal foot, and for curbing, 18 cents per lineal foot.
- That Samuel Hanway is the lowest bidder for grading and graveling Muskingum alley, between St. Clair and Pratt streets, his bid being 27 cents per lineal foot front on each side.
- That D. Root & Co. are the lowest bidders for the erection of lampposts, lamps and fixtures on St. Joseph street, between Delaware and Alabama streets, their bid being, for corner posts, \$37, and for intermediate posts, \$35.
- That Samuel Lefever is the lowest bidder for building a brick sewer on Ray street, from Delaware street to Pogue Run, his bid being, for sewer,
 - 36 inches, internal diameter, \$4.50 per lineal foot. 42 inches, internal diameter, \$4.95 per lineal foot. 48 inches, internal diameter, \$5.25 per lineal foot. 60 inches, internal diameter, \$6.00 per lineal foot.

 - We respectfully recommend that the contracts be awarded said parties.
- 5. That the petition of A. D. Wood, asking the privilege of erecting an office adjoining his foundry on South Delaware street, be granted, on condition that he place no post in the creek.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Mr. Cottrell moved that the contract for building a sewer 48 inches internal diameter be awarded to Samuel Lefever.

Mr. Kappes called for the ayes and noes.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn-13.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Coburn and Kappes—2.

So the motion to award was adopted.

On motion, the remainder of the report was concurred in and the contracts awarded.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES.

Mr. Coburn, from the Committee on Claims, reported back special appropriation ordinance No. 48—1868, for the payment of sundry claims.

Which was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Seidensticker moved that the rules be suspended, and that the ordinance be placed upon its passage.

The question being on a suspension of the rules, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Kappes, Loomis, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—14.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the rules were suspended, and the ordinance read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being shall the ordinance pass? those whose voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Kappes, Loomis, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—14.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Brown, from the Committee on Streets and Alleys, made the following report:

Indianapolis, Sept. 28, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The Committee on Streets and Alleys, to whom was referred the petition of Kasimir Seiter, Herman Korst, Louis Budenz and Peter Kirsberg, Trustees of the German Catholic Church, asking for the vacation of an alley running through the north half of square seventy-seven (77), along the west side of lots number nine (9) and ten (10), in St. Palais' Subdivision in said square, and proposing, in case such vacation is ordered, to convey twelve (12) feet off of the east side of lots numbered nine (9) and eleven (11), in the above mentioned subdivision to the City of Indianapolis, to enlarge the alley running in the rear of lots numbered one (1), two (2), three (3), four (4), five (5), six (6), seven (7) and eight (8) of said subdivision, have had the subject under consideration, and report that they find the petitioners have given the requisite notice, and that no objection, by remonstrance or otherwise, has been made, but that the written consent of property owners in the immediate vicinity has been given and presented to the Council. Your committee, therefore, recommend that an order of vacation be made by the Common Council, in pursuance of the prayer of the petitioners, provided that they convey to the city fifteen feet of ground instead of twelve feet, as proposed.
