ADJOURNED SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 29TH, 1868, 7 O'CLOCK, P. M.

The Common Council met pursuant to adjournment:

Present-His Honor, the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Loomis, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn-13.

Absent-Councilmen Burgess, Colley, Jameson, Kappes, and MacArthur-5.

The proceedings of the regular session held Oct. 26th, 1868, were read and approved.

REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS.

Mr. Brown presented the following remonstrance:

Indianapolis, Oct. 26, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned, owners of real estate in Square 77, would respectfully represent to your honorable body that they read with surprise the proposition which was before your body at your last meeting to vacate and change the alley running north and south through part of said Square, and would respectfully remonstrate against the same on their own part as well as that of the public.

Recognizing the Council as custodians of the public highways for the interest of the common public and the permanent maintenance of the same, we would represent to your body that the alley thus proposed to be vacated is a public alley, belonging to the original plat, and consequently as old as the city itself. They would represent that it would be no doubt a very nice thing for the private interest of certain individuals. But they must protest on their own part that their interest, as well as that of the public, should not be sacrificed to accommodate private interest.

Mr. Brown moved to reconsider the vote by which the vacation of the alley named in the remonstrance was ordered.

Dr. Woodburn raised a point of order, that inasmuch as the remonstrance was not presented at the next subsequent meeting after the order was made, said motion was not in order.

Which point His Honor, the Mayor, decided was well taken, consequently, Mr. Brown's motion was declared out of order.

Mr. Coburn offered the following motion:

That the City Clerk and City Treasurer be authorized to contract for the re-painting and papering their offices, and if necessary the Mayors office.

Which was not adopted.

Also, the following motion:

That the bills of the County Treasurer, for taxes on the grounds owned by city for a lock-up, and the grounds of the Home of Friendless Women are subject to taxation for County purposes, be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and City Attorney.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Cottrell offered the following motion:

That John Ludlow be permitted to grade the alley running east and west, on the south side of lot 6, in out-lot 22; the same to be done under the direction of the Civil Engineer.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Foster offered the following motions:

That Michael Bolen be permitted to grade the sidewalk in front of his property on Missouri street, the first lot south of Henry street at his own expense, under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

That the Street Commissioner be directed to repair the sidewalk on the east side of West street, near Catherine street.

That the Street Commissioner be directed to repair the sidewalk on each side of the Canal, at the ends of the bridge lately built by the Terre Haute Railroad Company, across the Canal, on the north-west side of Kentucky Avenue, by filling the same with gravel.

Which were adopted.

Mr. Geisel offered the following motions:

That the property owners be permitted to grade Lockeby street, between Liberty and Noble streets at their own expense, and to be done between the first of November, 1868, and the first of March, 1869, under the direction of the Civil Engineer.

That the Street Commissioner be directed to so construct, a wooden Culvert down Ohio street, between Davidson and Winston streets.

Which were adopted.

Mr. Goddard offered the following motions:

That the Street Commissioner repair the bridge over the Canal, on Georgia street.

That W. Klein be allowed to repair the sidewalk in front of his premises, on the Bluff Road, between Corporation Line and Wilkins street at his own expense, under the direction of the Civil Engineer.

Which were adopted.

Mr. Henschen presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Oct. 29, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned respectfully petition you, to order the filling up of that part of Block on out-lot 84, in the City of Indianapolis, as is immediately east of the property of the undersigned, the same having become by reason of standing water collecting thereon, obnoxious to health, and a common nuisance. Said property is owned by Mr. S. W. Schofield.

Resolved, That the owners of the following described real estate, to-wit: That part of out-lot No. 84, in the City of Indianapolis, as is immediately east of so much of said out-lot owned by Charles John, be, and they are hereby required to fill and drain the same, as, in the opinion of this Council, there is a hole or excavation thereon in which water has or may become so stagnant and noxious as to be a nuisance and injurious to the health and comfort of said city, and of the inhabitants thereof, and that the Street Commissioner be, and he is hereby required to notify the owners thereof, as provided by an ordinance passed April 23, 1866, entitled "An ordinance providing for the drainage and filling up of ponds, excavations and holes, and prescrib-

ing penalties for the failure to fill up or drain the same," and that in case of the failure of the owners thereof to fill or drain the same, the Street Commissioner proceed to drain or fill said excavation, as provided in said ordinance, and provided that the cost thereof shall not exceed ten per cent of the value of the aforesaid real estate, as assessed upon the tax duplicate for city purposes.

The question being on the passage of the resolution, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Loomis, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—13.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the resolution passed.

Mr. Loomis offered the following motion:

That Mr. Blair, Proprietor of the Palmer House, be permitted to place a platform over the gutter on Illinois atreet, similar to the one in front of the Bates House. The same not to exceed 45 feet in length.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys.

Mr. Stanton presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Oct. 29, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned respectfully petition your honorable body to grant the Indianapolis, Cincinnati and Lafayette Railroad permission to construct a railroad track from the track of the Lafayette Railroad Company, near the intersection of Market and Missouri streets, to a point near the corner of Blake street and the National Road. The route of said track is shown by the plat herewith filed.

The undersigned respectfully petition, that if the right of way be granted to the Cincinnati & Lafayette Railroad, to put a track on the south bank of the Canal to the Mills, it be provided, that they shall have but one track across West street, Blackford street and Blake street, and that said track shall be laid on the north line of the alley, between Chandler & Taylor's Machine Shop, and Field, Braden & Scanlen's Paper Mill, and that no switch shall be put in on any street or alley, and that said right of way shall be granted only on the condition, that said track shall never be used for storing cars, either loaded or empty, and that all other roads now running into this city, or that may hereafter be built to run into this city, shall at all times have the right to pass over the track of said C., I., & L., R., R., to and along said side track to any of the Mills, Warehouses or Machine Shops, or to bring it out, by paying, not to exceed one dollar per every loaded ear, or for less than a car load, ten cents per ton. If the said Railroad shall

violate any of the foregoing conditions, all right granted said Company, shall cease, and on notice or complaint of any citizen, the City Marshall shall notify said Company, and if the conditions of the ordinance are not immediately complied with, the Marshall shall be authorized to take up the track across said streets and alleys.

Gentlemen:—The Board of Public Improvements, to whom was referred the several matters, would respectfully report:

1st. That James Stewart is the lowest bidder for grading and graveling Wabash street and sidewalks, between Delaware and Alabama streets, his bid being 29½ cents per lineal foot on each side of the street.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Foster and Geisel-2.

Councilmen Henschen and Seidensticker having been excused for the remainder of the evening.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Coburn called up special ordinance No. 22-1868, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for paving with brick the sidewalk on the north side of Vermont street, and also curb the outside edge with White Oak plank, between Meridian and Pennsylvania streets.

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Loomis, Schmidt, Stanton and Woodburn—10.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Coburn called up special ordinance No. 79-1866, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for the paving of the west sidewalk of Delaware street, between Ohio and St. Clair streets.

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Loomis, Schmidt, Stanton and Woodburn—12.

No Councilman voting in the affirmative.

So the ordinance passed.

By consent, Mr. Brown offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the property owners interested, be allowed the privilege of placing a bracket gas lamp on the building, on the corner of Pearl street and the alley, running north and south through square 65, provided, the same be done at their own expense, and that when completed, the same be regarded as a public lamp-post, to be lighted at public expense.

The question being on the passage of the resolution, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Loomis, Schmidt, Stanton and Woodburn—11.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the resolution passed.

On motion, the Council adjourned.
