# COMMON COUNCIL.

#### REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,
MONDAY, NOVEMBER 30TH, 1868, 7 O'CLOCK, P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, MacArthur, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—14.

Absent—Councilmen Burgess, Colley, Loomis and Schmidt—4.

The proceedings of the regular session, held Nov. 23d, 1868, were read and approved.

Business was resumed in the order in which it was left off at last meeting, viz:

#### ORDINANCES ON SECOND READING.

On motion by Mr. Davis, general ordinance No. 166—1868, was called up, read the second time, and ordered to be engrossed.

#### ORDINANCES ON THIRD READING.

Mr. Davis called up general ordinance No. 166-1868, entitled:

An Ordinance repealing an ordinance, entitled "An ordinance authorizing the Indianapolis Water Works Company to construct, maintain and operate Water Works and supply water to the city and citizens of Indianapolis, defining their powers and privileges, and prescribing their duties, ordained and established this 3d day of November, 1866."

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Henschen, MacArthur, Seidensticker and Woodburn—10.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Mr. Coburn moved to reconsider the vote taken at the last meeting awarding the contract for paving the west sidewalk of Delaware street, between Ohio and St. Clair streets, to R. P. Dunning.

The question being on reconsidering, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, MacArthur, Seidensticker and Woodburn—11.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the vote was reconsidered.

Mr. Coburn then moved that the contract be awarded to Samuel Lefever, provided the work be done within sixty days.

Which motion was adopted.

#### REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS.

Mr. Brown offered the following motion:

That the Chief Fire Engineer be directed to employ the necessary force to ring the bell of the Central Alarm on Glenns' Block, until a new Tower is ready for use.

Mr. Seidensticker moved to refer the motion to the Committee on Fire Department, with instructions to carry out the object of the motion at once, if they deem it proper. Mr. Brown called for the ayes and noes on Mr. Seidensticker's motion.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Coburn, Geisel, Goddard, Kappes, Seidensticker and Woodburn—6.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Henschen and MacArthur—6.

There being a tie, His Honor, the Mayor, voted in the negative.

So the motion was lost.

Mr. Brown's motion was then adopted.

Mr. Brown presented the following petition:

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 24, 1868.

Mr. A. H. Brown, Councilman of the Sixth Ward:

Dear Sir:—We, the undersigned, would respectfully ask you to lay before the City Council and have provision made for two lamps on Pearl street between Illinois and Meridian streets. The Council have already erected lamps on Pearl street between Meridian and Pennsylvania streets, there being two alleys between the streets we ask for; therefore there should be two lamps placed at the corner of each alley on Pearl street.

Also, the following motion:

That the property owners on Pearl street, between Meridian and Illinois streets, be allowed the privilege of placing bracket gas lamps on the walls of adjoining buildings at the points where the two alleys running north and south cross such portion of Pearl street; provided that no more than two lamps be so erected, and that the same be done at the expense of the property owners interested. And that when such lamps are erected they snall be regarded as public lamps, and as such shall be furnished with gas and lighted at the expense of the City.

On motion, both the petition and motion were referred to the Committee on Gas.

Mr. Coburn presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Nov. 23, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common of Council of the City Indianapolis:

The undersigned, property holders on West Washington street, respectfully ask that the City direct the south side of the State House Square be paved with brick. We have paved on both sides of the State House Square along Washington street, and justice requires that the pavement should be made continuously.

We, the Officers of State, hereby give our consent that the City Council may pave the sidewalks around the State House Square, but do not assume or pretend to bind the State of Indiana to pay for the same or any portion of it—and it is hereby expressly understood that the City Council are to look to the future action of the Legislature of said State for remuneration for said work.

Which were referred to the Board of Public Improvements.

Mr. Coburn introduced special appropriation ordinance No. 55—1868, entitled:

An Ordinance appropriating money to pay off the indebtedness incurred by sinking a tube for a supply of water.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Cottrell offered the following motion:

That the Chief of Police be, and is hereby, instructed to require every member of the Police Force, while on duty, not to enter any public or private house unless in the discharge of their duty as policemen.

Mr. Brown called for the ayes and noes.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Henschen, Kappes and Stanton—8.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Coburn, Goddard, MacArthur, Seidensticker and Woodburn—5.

So the motion was adopted.

Mr. Cottrell offered the following motion:

That the City Clerk be instructed to report to this Council a statement of the amount paid to members of the Police Force of the city, including all special as well as regular policemen, between the 15th day of May, 1867, and the 1st day of December, 1868, as shown by the records of his office, giving the aggregate amount paid to each policeman, and, if possible, the number of days for which each has been paid; and that said report be made on or before the first Monday in January.next.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Davis offered the following motion:

That the Fire Alarm Box in the Police Office be removed to the Fire Alarm Tower, under the direction of the Chief Fire Engineer.

The question being on the passage of the motion,

Mr. Brown called for the ayes and noes.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Davis, Foster, Henschen and MacArthur—5.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Coburn, Cottrell, Geisel, Goddard, Jameson, Kappes, Seidensticker and Woodburn—8.

So the motion was lost.

Mr. Goddard presented the following petition:

GENTLEMEN:—In the Journal of last week I noticed that you had passed an ordinance to gravel the sidewalk near my residence and others, in order to prevent the water from overflowing the south side of Market street

Now it appears that the City Council has not been fully informed of the condition of the said run that conveys the water into the Canal. The gutter is not deep enough, and it is also in a filthy condition, and more especially at the end of the culvert that conveys the water directly into the Canal, which has partly fallen in, and it is too narrow even in an ordinary rain, and we are fully satisfied should a heavy rain fall we should be seriously damaged thereby. We, the undersigned, respectfully claim your attention to this matter so as to prevent further damage.

- 1st. David Sylvester is the lowest bidder for grading and graveling the west sidewalk of Alabama street, between Duncan and Merrill streets, his bid being 15 cents per foot.
- 2d. That James Stewart is the lowest bidder to grade and gravel Vine street and sidewalks, between Jackson and Ash streets, his bid being  $64\frac{1}{2}$  cents per foot.
