REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,
Monday, December 7th, 1868, 7 o'clock, p. m.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present-His Honor, the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, MacArthur, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—14.

Absent-Councilmen Burgess, Colley, Loomis and Schmidt-4.

The proceedings of the regular session, held Nov. 30th, 1868, were read and approved.

Business was resumed in the order in which it was left off at last regular meeting, viz:

ORDINANCES ON SECOND READING.

On motion, the following ordinances were read the second time and ordered to be engrossed:

Special ordinance No. 104-1868. Special ordinance No. 105-1868. Special appropriation ordinance No. 55—1868. General ordinance No. 157—1868.

ORDINANCES ON THIRD READING.

Mr. Kappes called up special ordinance No. 97-1868, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, lamps and fixtures complete to burn gas, except the service pipe, on St. Joseph street, between Alabama and New Jersey streets.

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, MacArthur, Stanton and Woodburn—13.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Kappes called up special ordinance No. 104-1868, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for paving with brick the west sidewalk of Delaware street, between Walnut and Pratt streets.

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, MacArthur, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—14.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Kappes called up special appropriation ordinance No. 55—1868, entitled:

An Ordinance appropriating money to pay off the indebtedness incurred by sinking a tube for a supply of water.

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, MacArthur, Seidensticker and Woodburn—13.

Councilman Foster voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. MacArthur called up general ordinance No. 157-1868, entitled:

An Ordinance directing the City Clerk to issue an annual license to the Officers or Board of Trustees of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Indiana, for Masonic Hall.

Which was referred to the City Clerk, City Attorney, Mayor, and the Committee on Revision of Ordinances, with instructions to revise the general ordinance regulating licenses in the city.

REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS.

Mr. Brown presented the following petition:

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 7, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned, a citizen of said city, and a heavy tax payer, in 1857, in accordance with an ordinance of the City Council, erected at his own expense, on the south-west corner of Maryland and Illinois streets a lamp-post and fixtures, which, according to the spirit of said ordinance, was to be kept lighted and in repair by the city. That in the year 1867-8, said lamp-post and lantern were dismantled, and the lighting thereof discontinued, to the great injury and inconvenience of the undersigned.

Your petitioner, therefore prays your honorable body to reimburse to the undersigned the amount of his outlayin the erection and furnishing of said

lamp-post, which is \$33, as per receipt of Gas Company.

In reference to which Mr Brown offered the following motion:

That the petition of N. B. Palmer be referred to the City Attorney with instructions to report, whether, in his opinion, under the ordinance referred to in the petition, the Council has the power to prohibit the lighting of gas lamps which have been erected under its provisions; and also, whether the city is liable to damages in so doing.

On motion, both the petition and motion were referred to the Finance Committee.

Mr. Goddard presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Nov. 30, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The absence of a fence around the burial ground for dead animals being a constant source of annoyance to the citizens living in the neighborhood of that place, the undersigned would respectfully submit to your honorable body a plan, the adoption of which would remove all just cause of complaint, and, at the same time, save the city a good deal of cost.

In order to prevent the hogs from digging out the carcasses of dead animals, a light fence is needed. Your petitioner is willing to build one on his own expense, provided that the contract to remove and bury all dead animals found within the city limits be given him for a period of five years, be-

ginning in May, 1869, the fence remaining at the expiration of that term the

property of the city.

In consideration of the heavy cost of this work, which would amount to about three hundred dollars, and which no contractor could bear in a shorter time, the undersigned believes that the prolongation of the contract to bury the dead animals for the period above named, would, in every respect, be justifiable. Conscious that he has always performed the duties, imposed on him by his contract, to the satisfaction of the Common Council, the Board of Health, and the citizens in general, the undersigned hopes that his petition will be granted, the more so, as the new contract could embrace a clause subjecting him at any time to dismissal for neglect of duty or breach of contract.

Dr. Woodburn offered the following motion:

5dis. That the Street Commissioner be instructed to properly gravel the alley crossings on Illinos street north of North street.

Which was adopted.

The Committee on Streets and Alleys, to whom referred the petition of Thomas Arthur and others, report the following resolution, which they recommend be adopted.

Resolved, That the City Clerk give the requisite notice to the owners of property along the line of Norwood street, which is asked to be widened by the petition of Thomas Arthur and others, and, also, to the Commissioners authorized to make assessments of damages and benefits in such cases, that such Commissioners will be required to meet for the purpose of hearing and determining the damages and benefits arising in such tases, the day of meeting to be fixed by such notice.

Mr. Coburn, from the Committee on Fire Department, made the following report:

Indianapolis, Dec. 7, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The Committee on Fire Department, to whom was referred the petition to have the Artesian Well continued. would report that they had a consultation with Professor Brown when the well was 70 feet deep, and he was of the opinion that water that would raise to within a few feet of the surface would be struck about 100 feet from the surface; since that time the pipe has been driven 21 feet, being now 91 feet from the surface. At the Gas Works water was struck at 83 to 85 feet. The Gas Works are some 10 to 15 feet lower than the present Well. It looks reasonable that the water would be struck witnin the next fifteen or twenty feet. We would, therefore, recommend that the pipe be sunk still further, under such contract as the Council may hereafter order.
