REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

Monday, February 1, 1869, 7 o'clock, p. m.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—16.

Absent-Councilmen Burgess and Colley-2.

The proceedings of the regular session, held Jan. 18th, 1869, were read and approved.

REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS.

Mr. Brown presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Jan. 30, 1869.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned, in behalf of the Hebrew Benevolent Society, would ask your honorable body for an appropriation of two hundred dollars (\$200) out of the City Treasury for the benefit of the Hebrew Benevolent Society, their means having all been exhausted, and fresh demands being made upon them

almost daily. Your honorable body well know that scarcely ever an Israelite, no matter how destitute applies to the City for aid, and in every instance calls upon his brethren in faith. The times being extremely hard we have to support many indigent families, and hence would kindly ask your honorable body for the above appropriation.

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to place foot bridges across the gutters on Duncan street at its intersection with Alabama street, on the west side.

An Ordinance to provide for graveling the west sidewalk of Alabama st., between the south side of Duncan street and the south side of South st.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Cottrell introduced general ordinance No. 2-1869, entitled:

An Ordinance establishing and bounding the Wards of the City of Indianapolis.

Which was readthe first time.

Mr. Cottrell introduced general ordinance No. 3-1869, entitled:

An Ordinance to amend section 17 of an ordinance protecting public morality, decency and order, passed December 21, 1868.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Goddard presented the following petition:

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 1, 1869.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned would represent that they are doing a large business in lumber on Square 89 in this City, and that for the purpose of carrying on of said business it is necessary to be connected with the Railroad tracks, and we respectfully ask permission of your honorable body to lay a track from the Indianapolis, Cincinnati and Lafayette Railroad across the north side of Louisiana street and the alley in Square 89 into our yard.

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to properly repair the sidewalk on the east side of West street, between Michigan and Vermont streets; also, to place sufficient gravel at the alley crossings on each side of West st., between North and New York streets.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to cause the culvert at the crossing of the Railroad at Pogue Run, on the west side of Delaware street, north side of said Run, to be repaired.

GENTLEMEN:—The Board of Public Improvements, to whom was referred the bids for building a stone wall at the terminus of the sewer on Ray street, would report that we find that Messrs. Burke & Richter are the lowest bidders, their bid being for the stone work \$8.50 per yard, and for the wood work \$2.25 per 100 feet.

We respectfully recommend that the contract be awarded said parties. We would also recommend that the Street Commissioner be instructed to place a sufficient amount of gravel on Kentucky Avenue to fill the wagon tracks, so as to make said street good between Tennessee and Missouri sts.

Mr. Davis moved to reconsider the vote taken at the meeting of Council January 18, 1869, by which an ordinance re-districting and bounding the Wards of the City of Indianapolis was passed.

Mr. Seidensticker raised a point of order, that inasmuch as the ordinance was not reconsidered at the same or next subsequent meeting, that Mr. Davis' motion was out of order.

His Honor, the Mayor, decided the point not well taken, and that the motion to reconsider was pertinent.

Mr. Seidensticker appealed from the decision.

Mr. Brown demanded the ayes and noes.

The question being, shall the decision of the chair be sustained?

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Henschen, Kappes, Schmidt, Stanton and Woodburn—10.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Coburn, Goddard, Jameson, Loomis, MacArthur and Seidensticker—6.

So the decision of the chair was sustained.

The question then being on the motion to reconsider,

Mr. Brown called for the ayes and noes.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Henschen, Kappes and Schmidt—8.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Coburn, God dard, Jameson, Loomis, MacArthur, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—8.

There being a tie vote, His Honor, the Mayor, voted in the negative.

So the motion to reconsider was lost.

Mr. Brown arose and stated that, inasmuch as he believed the passage of the ordinance legislated him out of office, he could therefore no longer represent his constituency, and withdrew from the Council Chamber.

ORDINANCES ON SECOND READING.

Mr. Coburn called up special appropriation ordinance No. 3—1869, appropriating money for the payment of sundry claims against the City of Indianapolis.

Which was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Coborn moved that the rules be suspended and that the ordinance be placed upon its passage.

The question being on a suspension of the rules, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Coburn, Cottrell, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—14.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the rules were suspended, and the ordinance read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Coburn, Cottrell, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—14.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Cottrell called up general ordinance No. 3—1869, amending the 17th section of the morality ordinance.

Which was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Cottrell called up general ordinance No. 2—1869, establishing and bounding the Wards of the City of Indianapolis.

Which was read the second time.

The question being on engrossment, the ayes and noes being demanded,

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Cottrell, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Kappes and Schmidt—7.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Coburn, Jameson, Loomis, MacArthur, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn-7.

There being a tie vete, His Honor, the Mayor, voted in the negative.

So the motion to engross was lost.

Mr. Loomis offered the following resolution:

The first named to be Inspectors and the others Judges of Elections.

The question being on the passage of the resolution, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Goddard, Jameson, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—11.

Councilman Henschen voting in the negative.
