Councillor Dowden announced the Co-sponsors, which included Councillors Brinkman, Campbell, Clark, Cottingham, Durnil, Gilmer, Hawkins, Holmes, Howard, Jones, Journey, McGrath, Nickell, Page, Parker, Rader, Rhodes, Schneider, Stewart, and Strader. Acting President Clark called for discussion. Councillor West stated that time did not permit a hearing to thoroughly discuss the burning regulations. There was an agreement by Councillors that the 100 ft. restriction was an impossible standard for anyone in the inner-city to abide by. PROPOSAL NO. 54, 1981, was then retitled SPECIAL RESOLUTION NO. 11, 1981, and reads as follows:

A SPECIAL RESOLUTION disapproving and rejecting Regulation III, Open Burning Restrictions, promulgated by the Indianapolis Air Pollution Control Board.

WHEREAS, the Indianapolis Air Pollution Control Board on January 7, 1981, approved a revised Regulation III regarding Open Burning Restrictions; and

WHEREAS, such revised regulation is not in the best interests of the public; and

WHEREAS, Section 4-26 of the "Code of Indianapolis and Marion County, Indiana", "Promulgation of rules and regulations," provides that the City-County Council can reject or disapprove rules or regulations of the Air Pollution Control Board within 30 days of their promulgation by passage of a resolution or ordinance; now therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY—COUNTY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS AND OF MARION COUNTY, INDIANA:

SECTION 1. The City-County Council finds that newly revised Regulation III, Open Burning Restrictions of the Indianapolis Air Pollution Control Board should be disapproved and rejected.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon adoption and compliance with IC 18-4-5-2.

INTRODUCTION OF PROPOSALS

PROPOSAL NO. 28, 1981. Introduced by Councillor Miller. The Clerk read the proposal entitled: "A Proposal for a General Ordinance modifying the various provisions dealing with city and county personnel policy"; and the President referred it to the Administration Committee.

PROPOSAL NO. 29, 1981. Introduced by Councillor Dowden. The Clerk read the proposal entitled: "A Proposal for a Fiscal Ordinance transferring \$5,500 in the County General Fund for the lease/purchase of a duplicating machine for the Co-operative Extension Service"; and the President referred it to the Community Affairs Committee.

PROPOSAL NO. 30, 1981. Introduced by Councillor Schneider. The Clerk read the proposal entitled: "A Proposal for a General Ordinance authorizing changes in the personnel compensation schedule of the Washington Township Trustee"; and the President referred it to the County & Townships Committee.

PROPOSAL NO. 31, 1981. Introduced by Councillor Tintera. The Clerk read the proposal entitled: "A Proposal for a Special Resolution authorizing proceedings with economic development bond financing for Vern Havens & Don Kosten Project in the amount of \$300,000"; and the President referred it to the Economic Development Committee.

PROPOSAL NO. 32, 1981. Introduced by Councillor Tintera. The Clerk read the proposal entitled: "A Proposal for a Special Resolution authorizing proceedings with economic development bond financing for CAC Realty in the amount of \$375,000"; and the President referred it to the Economic Development Committee.

PROPOSAL NO. 39, 1981. Introduced by Councillor West. The Clerk read the proposal entitled: "A Proposal for a Fiscal Ordinance transferring \$11,500 in the County General Fund for purposes of the Marion County Superior Court, Juvenile Division"; and the President referred it to the Public Safety and Criminal Justice Committee.

PROPOSAL NO. 40, 1981. Introduced by Councillor West. The Clerk read the proposal entitled: "A Proposal for a Fiscal Ordinance authorizing changes in the personnel compensation schedule of the Marion County Superior Court, Civil Division, Room 5"; and the President referred it to the Public Safety and Criminal Justice Committee.

PROPOSAL NO. 41, 1981. Introduced by Councillor Howard. The Clerk read the proposal entitled: "A Proposal for a General Ordinance providing for a penalty for driving through funeral processions (Amends Code Sec. 29-119)"; and the President referred it to the Transportation Committee.

PROPOSAL NO. 42, 1981. Introduced by Councillor Rhodes. The Clerk read the proposal entitled: "A Proposal for a Special Ordinance approving and confirming the CATV franchise to Indianapolis Cablevision Co., Ltd."; and the President referred it to the Committee of the Whole.

PROPOSAL NO. 43, 1981. Introduced by Councillor Howard. The Clerk read the proposal entitled: "A Proposal for a Special Resolution commending the Citizens Neighborhood Coalition." This proposal for a Special Resolution was adopted under "Presentation of Petitions, Memorials, Special Resolutions, and Council Resolutions."

PROPOSAL NO. 44-52, 1981. Introduced by Councillor Durnil. The Clerk read the proposals entitled: "Proposals for Rezoning Ordinances certified from the Metropolitan Development Commission on January 8, 1981"; and the President referred them to the Committee of the Whole to be heard under Special Orders Final Adoption.

MODIFICATION OF SPECIAL ORDERS

Council consent was given to suspend the Council Rules with respect to the Introduction, Initiation, and Preparation of Proposals, in order that the following ordinances could be introduced, although not timely submitted under the Rules.

PROPOSAL NO. 53, 1981. Introduced by Councillor McGrath. The Clerk read the proposal entitled: "A Proposal for a Fiscal Ordinance transferring \$20,000 in the Parking Meter Fund for purposes of the Parking Meter Division, Department of Transportation"; and the President referred it to the Transportation Committee.

PROPOSAL NO. 54, 1981. Introduced by Councillor Dowden and twenty others. This proposal for a Special Resolution was adopted under "Presentation of Petitions, Memorials, Special Resolutions, and Council Resolutions".

PROPOSAL NO. 55, 1981. Introduced by Councillor Miller. The Clerk read the proposals entitled: "A Proposal for a General Resolution establishing guidelines for employees deferred compensation program"; and the President referred it to the Administration Committee.

SPECIAL ORDERS, PUBLIC HEARING

PROPOSAL NO. 17, 1981. Councillor McGrath opened the hearing by stating that Reilly Tar & Chemical has not been concerned about complying with the zoning laws until they wanted to expand their company further. Mr. Robert G. Elrod, General Counsel, notified the Council that there is currently a Special Exception pending and that the case has been postponed until there is action taken by the Council on this Proposal. Mr. Carl T. Reis, Attorney for Reilly Tar & Chemical, stated that Reilly has been in operation for the past 80 years. Reilly is one of the two companies remaining with world headquarters in Indianapolis. Reilly has operated a chemical plant 40 years, prior to the existence of any zoning regulations, under the Grandfather Clause. Mr. Reis stated that Reilly is in full compliance with EPA regulations. Mr. Reis noted that they are requesting a zoning change from an I-3-U District to I-4-U District, and a Special Exception Permit, which would be needed for operating a chemical plant. However, that type of operation cannot be done without permission from the Board of Zoning Appeals. Mr. Reis introduced Reilly Plant Manager, Mr. Robert McNeeley, and Dr. Dan Bailey, Associate Director of Research. Mr. Reis stated that Reilly has met with the neighborhoods trying to solve any complaints that exist. Mr. Reis noted that I-4-U provides for outside storage not to exceed 75% of gross floor area. Mr. McNeeley stated that they do a very small amount of outside drum storage and almost all those stored outside are on concrete above the ground. Mr. McNeeley added that Reilly is one of the largest users of natural gas, which is the cleanest fuel to burn. Reilly has the capability of burning both natural gas and fuel oil.

Marion Altemeyer recited from a three page prepared statement listing the Oak Park Civic League's opposition as previously testified to in the quarterly meeting of the Community Affairs Committee. She claimed that this area has the highest amount of pollutants in Marion County. Mrs. Altemeyer pointed out that she resides in this area due to the excellent schools, volunteer fire department, and the easy access to the City. She noted that the other companies, besides Reilly Tar and Chemical, in this area do not pose a threat to the health of the neighborhood. Mrs. Kian Altemeyer noted that this area has a higher disease rate. Mr. Russell Carroll pointed out that there are no dikes surrounding the chemical tanks. Mrs. Peggy Woodriff also testified before the Council. Mr. Steve Granner, Division of Planning and Zoning, stated that the staff recommendation was favorable. They have reviewed the petition and are satisfied and saw no problems. Mr. Granner reiterated that Reilly has been operating under the Grandfather Clause, which legally allows Reilly to operate, because they were "Legally Established" before the zoning laws went into effect. He added that if operations change, so must the zoning. He stated that the issue before the Council is a land use issue and that the environmental issues are more appropriately addressed in different forums (before the Board of Zoning Appeals as a Special Exception or before the Air Pollution Control Board). In closing, Councillor McGrath requested that the requested zoning changes be denied by the Council. The Vice President then closed discussion and called for the vote. Proposal No. 17, 1981, was then adopted on the following roll call vote; viz:

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 13, 1981

The Metropolitan Development Commission of Marion County, Indiana, proposes that adoption of ORDINANCE 80-AO-3, amending the INDUSTRIAL ZONING ORDINANCE OF MARION COUNTY, INDIANA (ORDINANCE 63-AO-4, as amended) by amending sections 2.01 (B) (1) (b), section 2.02 (A) (18), and section 2.06 (S) (18), relating to I-1-S Development Standards for outside storage, and Permitted I-2-S and I-2-U Uses regarding construction companies, contractors, and home remodeling companies.

PROPOSAL NO. 634, 1980. Introduced by Councillor West on December 15, 1980, appropriates an additional \$146,737 in the County General Fund for the Marion County Municipal Court, funding the First Offender Program. This proposal was postponed by the consent of the Council until February 9, 1981, in order that it might be discussed in the Public Safety and Criminal Justice Committee.

SPECIAL ORDERS, FINAL ADOPTION

PROPOSAL NO. 2, 1981. Councillor Schneider reported that this proposal had been heard by the County & Townships Committee on January 13, 1981, and was passed in Committee by a vote of 4-0. This proposal increases the salaries in the Center Township Trustee's office by no more than 6%. Mrs. Bernetta Tanner commended the Council on their efforts to get the salaries of the Trustee's office up to the County level. Councillor Rhodes moved to amend by inserting Payroll Bookkeeper at a salary level of \$8,525 back into the proposal which had inadvertently been deleted from the proposal; Council consent was given. 
