From the Civil Engineer

The Civil Engineer respectfully reports to the City Council.

lst That he has agreeable to instructions Surveyed the route on Donation Street, between Harrison Street and Pleasant Run, in order to ascertain wether the water can be turned down Said Street, and if So to make an estimate for ditching the Same, and herewith Submits a profile of Said route,



from which it will be Seen, that the level of Harrison Street is 18 feet 11 Inches above the bed of Pleasant Run, and the Ravine South South of Harrison Street 12 Feet. As the intermediate ground is considerably higher than the bottom of the Ravine, and bed of Pleasant Run, he has given the Ditch a minimum grade of 1 Foot in 1294 Feet for the purpose of reducing the expense as much as possible and with Such inclination, and calculating the ditch at 18 inches, wide in the bottom, and Side Slopes at Six inches horizontal to one foot vertical, the quantity of excavation is 6045 Cubic yards at 16 cents per yard, amounts to \$967.20. The Ditch commences at the Ravine 1414 Feet South of Harrison Street, and terminates 640 Feet north of and at

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at a point 9 Feet above pleasant Run.

On motion this part of the report was laid on the table.

2nd The grading and graveling of Side walk on north side of Washington Street and National Road, between Tennessee Streets and the waste way of the Central Canal, performed by Martin L. Coyner, have been finished according to contract, and the citys portion of the estimate is \$106.60, but those portions of Said Side walk in front of John Carlisles property which he was authorized to grade and gravel at his own expense have not been finished according to the Ordinance as he has Substituted Sand for gravel on a portion of the Sidewalk and the balance has not been graveled at all.






Gentlemen.
