

Awarded to Carey H. Boatright for \$350 if said bidder give security & if not the Engineer to give the work to the next lowest bidder if he gives bond.

The bridge on Maryland Street was awarded to Carey H. Boatright on same terms as above.



The bids for the bridge on South Street was referred to the Civil Engineer with instruction to award said work to either L. Comegys or C. H. Boatright The one who will do the work the soonest to get it.

The following communication was read from the James Wood the Civil Engineer:

The undersigned reports to the Council that since the city entered into contract with Owen Cullings, to repair the bridge over Pogues Run on Meridian Street, the Railroad Companies have raised Meridian Street at the North side of the bridge about eighteen inches, it will, therefore, be necessary to elevate the floor of the bridge to correspond with the railroad tracks leading to and from the Union Depot; and for this purpose, the stringers will have to be taken off, and two courses, of logs laid on the top of the abutments, which, together with fifteen cubic yards of filling at the end of the bridge will cost thirty five dollars The Council will please dispose of this matter.

The committee to consist of Councilmen Dunlap & Edwards & the Civil Engineer.


The Civil Engineer reported estimates and specification of a bridge across Pogues Run on East street and for repairs of a bridge on New Jersey Streets.

The Civil Engineer presented the following communication: "The engineer reports to the Council, that, in order to obtain a solid foundation for the bridge erected over the canal on Indiana Street, it was necessary to build an abutment for sustaining the North West corner of the bridge; the expense of which, together with 20 cubic yards of extra excavation on the East side of the canal is \$22.50. The Council will please allow Owen Cullings said amount.

Cady for leave to take dirt from the enlargement of Maryland Street, to fill up the space between the grade of the National Road, or Washington Street, and the sidewalk in front of Lot No. 77, and making the gutter for the water next to said sidewalk, agreeably to the established grade of said Washington Street, and the Council's order thereon have been duly considered by the undersigned, and recommend to the Council to grant the desire of the petitioner.

A communication was received and read from the petitioners residing on Vermont Street declining to pay any more than

their half of said improvement.

Referred to the Councilmen of the 2d Ward with instructions to ascertain whether Croase, the contractor for the improvement of Pennsylvania Street, did not agree to fill a hole made by him in Vermont Street.

A communication from the Civil Engineer was read as follows: In accordance with the resolution passed by the Council, at their Meeting on the 3d instant, the Civil Engineer respectfully reports, that he has made a reexamination and resurvey of meridian Streets, North of North street, and ascertained that the grade of Meridian Street between St Clair street and the Donation Line, could not be reduced more than seven inches without injuring the grade and drainage of other streets. To reduce the grade seven inches, will require the moving of 495 cubic yards of earth, and of 20 yards of gravel, which, at 15 cents per yard, will cost Seventy-seven dollars and Twenty five cents, in addition to the stipulated prices of grading and

graveling the Street. Before carrying out the resolution in reference to giving instructions to the contractor, the city engineer respectfully requests of the Council to determine how, or who will pay the the contractor for moving said earth & gravel.




