"An Ordinance providing for compensation to the Messengers of the Hook and Ladder and Fire Companies of the City of Indianapolis:

Sec 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, That from and after the first day of January



1854, the Messenger of the Hook and Ladder Company, shall entitled to a salary of twenty dollars per year, and the Messenger of each Fire Company shall be entitled to a salary of sixty dollars per year from the City Treasury.

Sec 2. Said salaries shall be paid at the time and in the manner provided by ordinance for the payment of City Officers.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage.

Read 1st, 2nd, and 3d time, and passed by the following vote:

Mr. President:

The Judiciary committee to which was referred the petition of J. L. Mothershead, praying a reduction in the valuation of Lot No 4, in Square No 74, belonging to Darby's estate, and also a reduction in the amount of his personal property, have had the same under consideration, and now report that in relation to the said lot they are satisfied that its valuation is considerably above the valuation of other property in the same neighborhood, and that they are informed by the gentlemen who made the assessment that it was his intention to value it at \$1500. and that by some mistake it has been assessed at \$2,500 The committee are satisfied that \$1500 for that lot would be as high in proportion as lots contigeous are appraised, and therefore, without entering into the investigation of the power of the Council to correct mistakes of judgment in valuations of property, recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be granted, on the ground of a clerical mistake, and that the value of the lot be accordingly reduced to \$1500. They are also satisfied by an examination of the same gentleman that he made a mistake of \$2,000. in the personal property of Dr. Mothershead, and therefore recommed that the amount be reduced to \$2,600 instead of \$4,600.





Dougherty, and is valued at, or taxed at \$300 per acre, the said 13 acres is the extreme south-west corner of said 75 acres adjoining the farm of Mr. Borgemyer, the most remote from the said street, and of less value than the others, and is appraised as stated at \$400 per acre.



The Chief Fire Warden made the following report: To the Presidents and members of Common Council of Indianapolis:

In company with the Street Commissioner, I have examined all the public cisterns and with the exception of the one on Hall's corner (which is now being recaired) are all in good order and full of water. The fire apparatus is as far as I can learn in good order.

The Invinciple Company will be compelled to go out of service unless something is done with their Engine House. I would suggest the propriety of having their House lined and filled in with saw dust or tan bark, if no other House



can be had for the Winter and that they rent a room or Hall for their meetings, as I am informed they can have W.W. Wright's Hall for one dollar per night or for each meeting. The O. K. Bucket Company are in want of more Buckets, and a room to hold their meetings in . I have no doubt but they might get the use of the Releif Hall. I would respectfully suggest the propriety of repealing the ordinance passed at the last meeting of your Body in regard to the salary of Messengers for the Companies as I am informed they cannot get good Messenger for the sums fixed by the Council. I believe the Companies should have the right to select their own Messengers and fix the salary, as by that means they will be bound for good order and care for their respective apparatus's while as it now is the Council will have to take the blame in case of anything being out of order.
