The undersigned citizens residing, or doing business in the vicinity of the Governor's Circle, feeling that in no other city in the Union would such a hazarding of the health of the inhabitants be allowed by the authorities, asto permit the very centre of a City to be occupied as a place for a <u>Pest House</u>, respectfully remonstrate against such a use of the old <u>Council</u> House in the circle, and earnestly request of your Honorable Body such action as may be necessary to prevent such a nuisance, which may be the means of spreading extensively desolating pestilence through the city

Mr Pitts offered the following resolution:


Resolved, That the City Engineer make an estimate of the work done on Meridian Street, by Irvin & Shea, and report the same at our next meeting.

Mr. Karns - moved that a committee be appointed to ascertain how the small pox came in town


