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Report of the School Trustees.

To the Common Council of Indianapolis: Gentlemen:

The acompanying documents, numbered from one to seven, inclusive, exhibit the operations of the Common Schools in the several Wards of this City, during the quarter ending on the llth day February, 1354. The report marked No. 8, shows the condition and operations of the Central High School of Indianapolis, for the same period; and the document marked No. 9 exhibits an abstract of the financial condition of the Common Schools interests of the city.

In carrying into effect the provisions of the School law, in Indianapolis, the Trustees have often been embarrassed in the discharge of their duties by the presence of difficulties which almost invariably attend an impartial and effective administration of the educational affairs of a new and rapidly growing community. These difficulties are of various degrees of importance. To harmonize the conflicting opinions that generally prevail, in such a community, on the subject of common school education, is a task of no small magnitude. The temporary inadequacy of necessary funds may be stated as another source of embarrassment. The purchase and enclosure of lots, and the building and furnishing of a sufficient number of school houses for the accommodation of the children of the city, are the duties which require, in their performance, not only a considerable lapse of time, but they require, also, a reasonable expenditure of money, the duty of securing the services of competent and efficient teachers in the public schools, has not been free from perplexities, yet the undersigned believe that this duty has been fairly and successfully discharged.

In order to promote harmony, and uniformity in the course of instruction, the school books recommended by the Indiana State Board of education have been adopted as text books in the common schools of this city.

Being fully assured of the necessity and expediency of the Measure, and relying on the sanction of the Common Council, and the approval of the citizens, the Trustees have established certain rules and regulations designed to secure punctualty in the attendance of scholars, and to maintain correct morals and strict discipline in the government of the schools. A faithful support of these rules, by parents, guardians, and teachers, is regarded essential to the usefulness and prosperity of the Common Schools of Indianapolis.

The Central High School has been established for the benefit of the more advanced pupils of the several Ward schools; and such pupils may, upon, examination, at certain fixed periods, be admitted to the High School; in which in-

stitution the scholars will be thoroughly instructed in all the branches of learning usually taught in Colleges.

On a late examination of the Central High School and the several Ward schools, the Trustees were gratified to receive satisfactory evidences of the faithfulness and diligence of the teachers, and the general good conduct and improvement of the pupils.

In four of the Ward Schools more room is urgently required for the accommodation of the classes; and the undersigned indulged a hope that they will soon have means at their disposal to supply this pressing demand.
