REGULAR SESSION.

Council Chamber, Indianapolis, May 25, 1863.

The Council met in regular session this evening at 8 o'clock.

By Mr. Brown-Petition:

Indianapolis, May 25, 1863.

To the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned, respectfully represent that at the last term of the Marion Circuit Court, the case of Robert Johnson against the undersigned for their action as Common Council of said city, in relation to the grading of Meridian street, was brought to a close in said Court, by said Court's deciding the same on demurrer to the complaint, in our favor. S., late Margaret Stevens, is the owner of that part of the north half of Out-Lot No. 101, in the city of Indianapolis, through which the water runs from the culvert across Virginia Avenue, at the intersection of Noble street, and discharges itself again through the sewer or culvert constructed by the city on the east side of East street.

And that she and the undersigned desire, and intend, to fill up said ground so as to make it the same level with the said Virginia Avenue and East street. Such filling will require a large amount of earth; and as the undersigned has now the opportunity to procure the necessary amount of earth from gradings of streets and alleys in the vicinity, as well as from the gradings off the highest part of his lots, he is very desirous to commence said work without delay. He suggests that such filling up will make it necessary for the Council to make some provision for carrying off the water that now flows through said culvert across Virginia Avenue, and he requests that the Council will refer the subject to the proper committee, and make provision for carrying off the water by proper sewers and drains.

tract be awarded to the lowest bidder.

On motion of Mr. Brown, the election of Marshal at the Union Depot was referred to a select committee of three and the City Attorney, with instructions to inquire in regard to existing Ordinances on the subject, and report to the Council.

The Mayor appointed as said committee, Messrs. Brown, Colley and S. A. Fletcher, Jr.

By Mr. Brown-Motion:

That the Council now proceed to ballot for a Deputy Street Commissioner, whose duty it shall be to take charge of all prisoners sentenced to work upon the streets and alleys, who shall have no police powers, other than may be necessary to carefully watch and prevent from escaping all such prisoners when placed in his charge; that said Deputy shall be subject to the orders of the Street Commissioner as to the places where such prisoners shall be worked; and said Deputy shall serve one year from the date of his election.

Which motion was adopted.

M. Gallivan and James Stewart were nominated for Deputy Street Commissioner, and the Council proceeded to ballot, which resulted as follows:

James Stewart received 8 votes, M. Gallivan " 6 " George Thomas " 1 "

James Stewart having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared duly elected Deputy Street Commissioner for one year.

On motion of Mr. McNabb, the following Ordinance was taken up, and read a third time.

An Ordinance to provide for the grading and bouldering of Kentucky Avenue, between Washington and Tennessee streets.

SECTION 1. Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, That the whole width of Kentucky Avenue between the above named points, (exclusive of the side-walks) be properly graded and paved with boulder stone, and that the expense of grading and paving such street as aforesaid, (except so much thereof as is occupied by the crossings of streets and alleys,) be assessed against, and collected from the owners of the lots bordering on said street, between the limits aforesaid, according to the provisions of sections 66 to 69, inclusive, of the City Charter.

SEC. 2. The Civil Engineer is hereby directed to set the proper stakes, and also to advertise by publication for ten days in the Indianapolis Daily Journal, and by posting up printed notices in not less than five of the most public places in the city, that sealed proposals will be received by the Common Council, at the meeting of the Council to be held on the 8th day of June, 1863, for the execution of said work.

SEC. 3. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the grading and paving with brick the sidewalk on the west side of Meridian street, between North street and corporation line north:

Section 1. Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, That the whole width of the sidewalk between the above named points be properly graded, and nine feet of the inner edge be paved with good hard burned brick, and that the expense of grading and paving such sidewalk as aforesaid, (except so much thereof as is occupied by the crossings of streets and alleys,) be assessed against, and collected from, the owners of the lots bordering on said street, between the limits aforesaid, according to the provisions of sections 66 to 69, inclusive, of the City Charter.

SEC. 2. The Civil Engineer is hereby directed to set the proper stakes, and also to advertise by publication for ten days in the Indianapolis Daily Journal, and by posting up printed notices in not less than five of the most public places in the city, that sealed proposals will be received by the Common Council, at the meeting of the Council to be held on the 8th day of June, 1863, for the execu-

tion of said work.

SEC. 3. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
