REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,
Monday, February 1st, 1864, 7½ o'clock, p. m.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, John Caven, in the chair, and the following members:

The proceedings of the special session, held January 14th, and the proceedings of the regular session, held January 18th, 1864, were read and approved.

By Mr. Haughey-Petition:

Indianapolis, January 21, 1864.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen—Your petitioners would respectfully represent that Lot numbered nine (9), in Square numbered three (3), in the city of Indianapolis, is held in the name of "Trustees of the Society of Friends," (Hicksite,) for religious purposes, and is exempted by statute from taxation; and that the same is not and has not at any time since or during such occupancy been assessed for State or county revenue, in consequence of said State laws exempting said property. That said property was assessed by the City of

Indianapolis for purposes of taxation in the years 1861, 1862 and 1863, said levy amounting in all to the sum of thirty-one dollars and thirteen cents (\$31 13); that the tax of the year 1861, with penalty and interest, amounting to nine dollars and eighty-five cents (\$9 85), has been paid, and that the sum of twenty-one dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$21 28) remains charged to said property, and for which it is liable to be sold. Your petitioners therefore ask that the above described property should be released from said tax thus assessed contrary to law, and refund to them the sum of nine dollars and eighty-five cents (\$9 85) paid on account of the same.

By Mr. Brown, from Select Committee:

Indianapolis, February 1, 1864.

Mr. President—The select committee to whom was referred the claim of Ambrose F. Shortridge, late City Treasurer, beg leave to report that they have given the subject that careful consideration which its importance demanded, calling to their assistance, for the purpose of an investigation of the books and accounts of the Treasurer's office, two competent gentlemen of integrity.

The committee find the books of the Treasurer's office to have been carelessly kept. They now show many erasures and interlineations, exhibiting such alterations that they cannot be relied upon as evidence in any suit that might be instituted to recover any real or supposed balance due from or to Mr. Shortridge. And in this connection your committee would say that, although the books of the present Treasurer are more reliable than those of his predecessors, yet they are not as perfectly kept as they should be; and we believe the city would be much benefitted by the creation of the office of City Auditor, whose books, properly kept, would serve as a check upon those of the Treasurer. As it now is, we have to rely more upon the integrity of those who hold that important office than a proper system of checks and balances.

Your committee can find nothing to warrant the claim that the city is indebted to Mr. Shortridge. When he retired from office a committee was appointed by the Council to examine his official books and papers, and settle with him. That committee made a report to Council, which was concurred in, showing that Mr. Shortridge paid over to the committee \$8,366 15, as his final balance, which amount the committee placed in the hands of Mr. S.'s successor in office, and took his receipt therefor. This was, to all intents and purposes, a final settlement, and was for some time so regarded by Mr. Shortridge. He cannot, in the opinion of your committee, now ask to have that settlement set aside and the accounts opened up anew. Could he legally do so, we do not believe he has any just claim against the city.

We think it equally clear that the action of Council, subsequent to the final settlement alluded to, in ordering the books to be examined and suit brought against Mr. Shortridge for an amount ascertained by such examination to be due from him, was wholly illegal. That suit has been dismissed, and to enforce any claim against Mr. Shortridge a new one would have to be instituted. We cannot advise the Council to do this, for the reasons before given, and for the additional reason that, should Mr. S. see fit to plead the statute of limitations, the city would lose any suit that might be instituted to collect any supposed balance due from him, which balance, in our opinion, could not be definitely established to the satisfaction of a jury, owing to the careless manner in which the books were kept.

The committee did not deem it any part of their business to investigate any charges that might have been made affecting the character for integrity of Mr. Shortridge or Mr. Daniel B. Culley, who was City Clerk during a part of Mr. S.'s term, (and who was afterwards employed by the Council to make an examination of the books of the Treasurer's office.) But it is due both of these gentlemen to say that we found no evidence, during the course of our investigation, to justify the belief that either had been guilty of any attempt to defraud the city.

Your committee ask to be discharged from the further consid-

eration of the subject.

From the Chief Fire Engineer-Report:

Indianapolis, February 1st, 1864.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen—Allow me to call your attention to our fire-alarm bell. The bell at its present place does not give an efficient alarm. It is very difficult to hear it at any of the engine houses, and in windy or stormy weather it is impossible to hear it at all, except in those localities where the wind may drive the sound. The reasons why this bell does not operate better are, first, that the bell is not hung high enough to carry the sound over the buildings; and second, it is too far from the look-out to be rung with sufficient force. The bell, being off so far, requires great leverage to ring it at all, and consequently the ringing apparatus is liable to break at any time when the bell is being rung. Although the said apparatus is examined every few days, and every time it is used, it has nevertheless given way several times while ringing within the last six months.

I would recommend, if the Council should not intend to build a look-out at some suitable place, that the alarm tower be so altered as to move into the alley west of this building, that the south portion of the stairway in said alley be removed, that a brick or stone wall be built on each side of the alley, of sufficient hight to allow wagons to pass, and the old frame be put upon said

walls.
