## COMMON COUNCIL.

#### REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

Monday, March 7th, 1864, 72 o'clock, P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, John Caven, in the chair; and the following members:

Councilmen Allen, Brown, Boaz, Colley, Cook, Emerson, S. A. Fletcher, Jr., Glazier, Haughey, Jameson, Lefever, McNabb, Staub and Thompson—14.

Absent—Councilmen Blake, Coburn, and H. A. Fletcher—3.

The proceedings of the regular session, held February 15, 1864, were read and approved.

By Mr. Haughey—Petition:

Indianapolis, February 1st, 1864.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned, resident property holders on Delaware street, between St. Clair street and the Corporation line north, respectfully petition your honorable body to pass an ordinance providing for the improvement of said street, between the limits aforesaid, by grading and graveling.

Mr. Haughey, President, pro tem., in the chair, appointed as such special committee Austin H. Brown, Mayor Caven, S. A. Fletcher, Jr., Dr. P. H. Jameson and Stephen McNabb.

Dr. George W. Mears, President of the Board of Health, reported to the Council in regard to the health of the City. That there were a few cases of small pox which they had in the pest-house, which they had erected for that purpose. But that there was no occasion for any alarm about the disease, as by the prompt action of the Board of Health and the city authorities, it is now under complete control. He also reported several bills for sundries furnished the pest-house.

On motion, the report was received, and the bills referred to the Committee on Accounts.
