#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR.

To the President and Members of the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: After frequent conferences with the members of the Board of Public Safety and the Chief of Police, and from personal observa-tion, I feel that I am justified in departing from the usual custom in thus writing you relative to the merits of the proposed ordinance regulating dance halls which will be introduced this evening.

If there is any one evil above another which demands most earnest effort on the part of public officials to absolutely abolish, it is the dance-house evil, threatening as it does the purity of the boys and girls of Indianapolis. These places are recruiting stations for the brothel and the penitentiary,

and have no right to exist. I most earnestly recommend to your honorable body that early and favorable consideration be given the ordinance in question.

It is not the intent or purpose of this ordinance to in any way interfere with reputable clubs or organizations which give entertainments for any proper purpose; but the City Attorney is of opinion that it will require legislation of the kind contemplated in order to give the police department absolute control of the questionable dances which have been a feature of Indianapolis underlife for so many years.

The provision of the ordinance compelling every one to secure a permit from the Controller does not provide a fee which can in any way be considered a burden, while the condition that such permit shall be based upon the approval of the Chief of Police is most necessary. The asking for a permit of this kind gives the police authorities (1) an opportunity to satisfy themselves as to the character of the proposed entertainment, and (2) at the same time serves notice upon such authorities, if the permit be granted, of the intention of holding such dance, and thus make it possible for all such entertainments to be properly policed.

One of the most serious evils connected with these dances is the attendance of young boys and girls, which attendance, under the ordinance now in existence, is not an offense. Under the proposed ordinance it is just as illegal for a person to attend dances of this kind as it is for the parties giving a dance to attempt to do so without first receiving proper sanction. The provision gives the police authorities that control over young boys and girls which is necessary to make effective any effort to keep minors away from these evil influences.

With the co-operation of your honorable body, I pledge to the people of Indianapolis that this evil shall be removed absolutely.

#### REPORTS FROM CITY OFFICERS.

#### From the City Controller:

#### CONTROLLER'S REPORT.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE, OFFICE OF THE CITY CONTROLLER, INDIANAPOLIS, IND., January 1, 1906.

To the President and Members of the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: I submit herewith my report of the accounts of the city for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1905, showing the city indebtedness, its receipts and expenditures, and its financial condition.

There has been a reduction of \$60,000 in the funded debt

during the year, of which \$27,000 was paid from the Sinking Fund tax, and \$33,000 from ordinary revenues. This leaves the total debt \$2,585,800, of which amount \$2,491,500 is debt of the city proper, and \$94,300 is debt of the annexed municipalities, assumed by the city. Of the debt of the city proper \$1,709,500 bears 4 per cent. interest, and \$782,000 bears  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. interest. Of the assumed debt, \$3,500 bears 3.65 per cent. interest; \$8,000 bears 4 per cent. interest; \$12,800 bears 5 per cent. interest; and \$70,000 bears 6 per cent. interest. There have been no bonds issued during the year excepting \$45,000 of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. refunding bonds which were issued to take up a like amount of 4 per cent. bonds of 1890, payment of which was optional. Owing to lack of time, the old bonds were taken up by an advance from the General Fund, and the proceeds of the sale were used to repay the advance, thus making the transaction appear a cash one on the books, but in actual effect it was a mere refunding, except that the premium of \$1,444.50 received on the new bonds was profit to the city.

With all 1905 bills paid, the available cash balance in the treasury on January I, 1906, exclusive of proceeds of bond sales, is \$224,048.63. This is the largest available cash balance the city has ever had at this date, and is \$159,199.69 more than was in the treasury on January I, 1904. This does not show the full improvement of the city's financial condition under your administration, because there have been investments, especially during the last year, that were not contemplated in the original estimates, or provided for in the tax levy. Among these were the payment of \$37,000 for the ground for a new central engine house; \$14,767.24 for land, building and equipment of the Raymond street engine house; \$1,000 for an additional strip of ground at the South street engine house; and \$9,000 for the Jackson Place opening. The purchase of the street cleaning equipment was, in a sense, contemplated in the estimate for street cleaning, but it resulted in special appropriations for that purpose during the year amounting to \$8,000. In money and property, therefore, the improvement in the two years is in excess of \$200,000; and this notwithstanding the fact that, as conceded on all sides, the Council cut the appropriations as closely as could prudently be done.

The increase of ordinary receipts from sources other than taxation has continued satisfactory. For 1905 the receipts from fees, licenses, franchise payments, etc., were \$405,682.09, which is \$25,842.07 more than in 1904. and \$81,595.17 more than in 1903. The justice of the principle that those who re-

ceive special benefits from the city government should make reasonable compensation for them is now generally conceded, and it will doubtless be insisted upon for the future.

The assessed valuation of taxable property in the city, for 1905, is \$152,978,350, and the constitutional debt limit of 2 per cent. is \$3,059,567, leaving a margin of \$473,767 for use in case of emergency.

As to the matter of official bonds, I am satisfied that those of reliable surety companies are much to be preferred to bonds with personal sureties, because the city is more certain of full indemnification; because an official is necessarily put under some obligation to persons who become sureties for him; and because surety companies usually maintain independent supervision over officials whose bonds they sign. Some of our city officials have been giving surety company bonds from personal preference, and paying for them themselves. I believe it would be a wise, fair, and eventually profitable course, for the city to require surety company bonds of all officials who have custody of city funds and property, and to pay for them out of the city treasury.

#### INTRODUCTION OF GENERAL AND SPECIAL ORDINANCES.

#### By Mr. Bangs:

General Ordinance No. 4—1906: An ordinance regulating and requiring licenses for dances in the City of Indianapolis, suppressing public dance halls and prohibiting the sale or distribution of any intoxicating liquors in

any public hall where dancing is conducted. SECTION I. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of In-dianapolis, Indiana, That no person, firm, corporation or association shall keep a public dance hall within the City of Indianapolis, which shall be open promiscuously to the public, either upon the payment of an admisssion fee or otherwise; nor shall any person visit or attend any such public dance house or public dance held therein.

SEC. 2. No person, firm, corporation or association shall knowingly let or lease to another any room, house or building for the purpose of having carried on or maintaining therein any public dance house, to which the public are invited promiscuously to visit or attend, either upon the payment of an admission fee or otherwise.

SEC. 3. No person, firm, corporation or association shall sell, give away or distribute any wine, beer or intoxicating liquors at any place where any dancing is being conducted, or in any premises adjoining or connected therewith.

SEC. 4. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, club, society or association to give or hold any dance in any room, hall or buildsociety of association to give of hold any dance in any room, han of build-ing, other than a private residence, without a permit or license first ob-tained from the City Controller, for which the sum of one (\$1.00) dollar shall be paid. The City Controller is hereby authorized to issue permits or licenses for dances only upon the presentation of applications properly signed and approved by the Chief of Police. SEC. 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance

shall be fined in any sum not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars nor more than five hundred (\$500.00) dollars.

SEC. 6. This ordinace shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication once each week for two consecutive weeks in the Indianapolis ....., a newspaper generally circulated, printed and published in the City of Indianapolis, Indiana.

General Ordinance No. 5—1906: An ordinance to amend Section One Hundred and Ten (110) of an ordinance, entitled, "An ordinance providing for all matters concerning, affecting or relating to the construction, alteration, repair or removal of buildings, structures and appurtenances thereof erected or to be erected in the City of Indianapolis, Indiana," approved June 6, 1904.

SECTION I. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That Section One Hundred and Ten (110) of the ordinance, entitled, "An ordinance providing for all matters concerning, affecting, or relating to the construction, alteration, repair or removal of buildings, structures and appurtenances thereof, erected or to be erected in the City of Indianapolis, Indiana," approved June 6, 1904, be, and the same is hereby, amended to read as follows:

SEC. 110. The face of any wall, pilaster or column of any building above the level of its main water-table shall not project beyond the building line, except as hereinafter provided.

The plinths and columns of porticos or entrances to buildings may extend not to exceed ten (10) inches and such porticos shall not be over thirty (30) feet in height.

Steps or stairs to any building shall not project over the property line, except where an open area is permitted under Section 97 of this ordinance, and in no case shall such steps project beyond such area. Oriel or balcony windows shall not project over the street line more than

Oriel or balcony windows shall not project over the street line more than three (3) feet, and no such window shall be at a less distance than twelve (12) feet above the grade of the sidewalk.

Balconies for hotels and theaters may be constructed in accordance with the provisions as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.
