# PROCEEDINGS OF COMMON COUNCIL.

# REGULAR SESSION-JANUARY 19, 1885.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Council Chamber, Monday evening, January 19th, A. D. 1885, at seven o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. John L. McMaster, Mayor, and ex officio President of the Common Council, in the Chair, and 19 members, viz: Councilmen Benjamin, Coy, Curry, Dowling, Edenharter, Haugh, Mack, McClelland, Newcomb, Pearson, Rees, Reinecke, Reynolds, Smither, Spahr, Thalman, Trusler, Wharton, and Wolf.

ABSENT, 6-viz. Councilmen Cowie, Downey, Doyle, Gallahue, Moran, and Sheppard.

The Proceedings of the Common Council for the regular session, held January 5th, 1885, having been printed and placed on the desks of the Councilmen, said Journals were approved as published.

## OPENING AND REFERRING SEALED PROPOSALS FOR PUBLIC IMPROVE-MENTS.

Sealed proposals for constructing combination bridges over Pogue's Run, on Eddy street, and over the Canal, on Sixth street, according to plans and specifications on file in the office of the City Civil Engineer, were received, opened, read, and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

## REPORTS FROM COMMITTEE ON CONTRACTS.

The Committee on Contracts, through Councilman Newcomb, submitted the following report; which was concurred in, and contracts severally awarded as recommended:

#### To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:--Your Committee on Contracts, to whom was referred the proposals for street improvements received January 5th, 1885, have examined the same, and find them to be as follows, viz:

1st. For grading and graveling the first alley north of Bates screet, from Dillon street to Leota street.

Fulmer & Seibert ...... 29 cents per lineal foot front on each side, R. P. Dunning...... 27 cents per lineal foot front on each side.

There being a remonstrance of seventeen-eighteenths of the property on said alley, we deem it best to refuse to award the contract for improving said alley at this time.

2d. For grading and graveling the first alley west of West street, from Michigan street to North street.

#### COMMUNICATIONS, ETC., FROM THE MAYOR.

His Honor, the Mayor, presented the following petition, accompanied with motion; which was received, and motion adopted:

#### To His Honor, the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, Ind:

Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned, citizens and property holders residing on Railroad street, between Ohio and Market streets, would respectfully represent to your honorable body, the following; That on the 3d day of October, 1883, an ordinance was passed to grade and gravel Railroad street, trom Ohio to Market street, which reads as follows:

"Beginning at the south line of Obio street, and running to station 4, plus 76 feet to the north line of Market street, on a descending grade of .20 of a foot per hundred feet, and graveled to a width of thirty feet, and to a depth of fifteen (15) inches in the center, sloping to five inches at the sides with the best quality of raked River or Fall Creek gravel. All work to be done to the satisfaction of the City Civil Engineer."

The contractor has carried out the ordinance according to contract, and we, the undersigned, have paid our assessments. We now present to your honorable body that we have no benefit from the improvement made, for the following reason: That the Railroad company or companies, have up to this date, neglected and refused to improve their part of said street crossed by them with railway tracks, neither graded, graveled nor planked the space between the railroad bars; by not doing so, have shut out all travel by v. hicles of every description, and compelled them to pass through the alleys from Spring street, tearing up alleys and pavements in terrible manner, and causing great inconvenience and depreciating the value of the property of the undersigned property holders on said street.

We therefore respectfully request your honorable body to take such action as you may deem fit, to compel said Railroad companies to make such improvements as are necessary, according to ordinance made and provided, to make travel possible on said street to Market street; for ever pray the undersigned.

That the Street Commissioner be, and he is hereby, instructed to notify the C., C., C. & I.; W, St. L. & P, and the I, B. & W. Railroad Companies to open the drains and gutters so as to afford a free passage for the water under their tracks where they cross Railroad street; and to plank the crossings so as to permit the passage of vehicles; and that if not done within ten days from the service of said notice, the city will do said work, and collect the cost thereof from them. And the Street Commissioner is ordered to proceed to do said work if not done by said companies in said time.

The City Civil Engineer submitted the following report, accompanied with agreement; which was received, and agreement approved:

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen :

Gentlemen: - By section 1 of G. O No. 50, 1884, relative to the construction of a bridge over Pogue's Run at East street, the City Civil Engineer was directed to confer with the Chief Engineers of the C., St. L. & P. R. R. Co., and the C., H. & I. R. R. Co., to the end that the bridges mentioned in said ordinance might be constructed, as far as practicable, to conform to each other, so that they might be used with the least possible inconvenience and danger. As mentioned in the preamble of said ordinance, the two Engineers above mentioned had previously agreed with the City Civil Engineer to pay for the construction of so much of said city bridge as would be used by said companies respectively. I desire to report that I have held the conferences as contemplated in said ordinance, and have made the plans of said East street bridge accordingly I have also reduced to writing the substance of the agreement made between the ab we mentioned Engineers and myself, in reference to the distribution of the cost of constructing said bridge. By the terms of said agreement, the R R. Co's are permitted to rest one track stringer of their bridge on the last girder of the City's bridge, where said girder rests on the north abutment, and in consideration therefor, the City is permitted to rest the east tier of floor beams on the last girder of the K. R. Co's bridge; and further, the R. R. Co's agree to construct all the masonry necessary for the City's bridge east of the east line of East street, thereby reducing the length of the south abutment of the City's bridge from 24 to 30 feet, which under the circumstances. in my opinion is a fair adjustment of the proportionate cost of constructing the East street bridge

I submit herewith the agreement, as entered into between the Engineers of the two R. R. Co's and myself, and ask your approval of my action.

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framed into the last girder of the R. R. Co's bridge. And, further, to construct at their expense, the stone abutments as contemplated by their plans, to the east line of East street on both sides of said Run.

The Hospital improvement of \$27,456.00, adds quite a figure in this years' expenses, otherwise we would be considerable inside of our revenue. We are convinced that a 90 cent levy, with care and economy, will be sufficient to meet all necessary requirements. There has, however, been a constant growing increase in the cost of water rent and gas, which, in our opiuion, can be checked for several years to come, without creating great inconvenience to any one.

We would recommend that a resolution be passed, and strictly adhered to, that no further extension of water mains nor erection of lamp-posts, be ordered during the year 1885. We would also recommend that a rule be established, that no street improvement ordinance be passed without a petition accompanying it from the resident property owners owning at least one-half of the number of lineal feet along the line of the contemplated improvement. This would prevent a great many ordinances from being pushed through, and save the city a large amount.

Gentlemen:--Your petitioner represents and shows to your honorable bodies that he is a regular attendant of the East Market, and has occupied Stall No. 6 in Market House in reta ling meat, for nearly three years last past,

Petitioner further shows that all leases thereon had expired, and he was paying the rent by the week to the Market Master.

Further, that one David Umpstetter made demand of the Market Master, as your petitioner is informed, that he should offer for sale or lease to the highest bidder, for the unexpired market year, Stall No. 6 in Market House. That thereupon the East Market Master did, upon Thursday, the 15th of the present month, notify all parties that he would at 12 o'clock noon upon said day, offer to the highest bidder said Stall 6 for the unexpired market year.

That at the time mentioned, said Umpstetter and your petitioner, and other market men, were present ready and willing to make bils upon said stall. That about as the Market Master was ready, and made the statement that he was ready to offer said Stall. The said Umpstetter, in the hearing of your petitioner, notified the Market Master that he must not offer said Stall for sale at that time, as he would not bid, gave as a reason, that "he had too many enemies present," and thereupon left the Market House.

The Market Master thereupon informed the parties present that he would not offer said Stall until said Umpstetter was ready to bid tioner is informed, said Umpstetter employed Ge rge W. Spahr, as his attorney, to secure said Stall for him in some other manner than in bidding for it.

That said Umpstetter and his attorney, ignoring both the Market Master and the Committee on Markets, went to the Treasurer's office on Friday evening, January 16, 1885, a little before closing time, and tendered to Frank Blanchard, Deputy Treasurer, the sum of \$6 88, and demanded an order from him on the City Clerk, to issue to him a license for Stall No. 6, in Market House, until June 30, 188

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The said Blanchard, supposing everything was regular, did so, and upon his order issued the license. Your petitioner is further informed that said Umpsteter said, before he employed said attorney, that he would bid the sum of eleven dollars for said Stall for the term from now until June 30th, 1885. Your petitioner further shows, that he has always been ready, and is ready now, to make a better bid than Umpstetter offered to make.

Wherefore your petitioner, in justice to himself and the City Treasury, asks your honorable bodies to revoke said license so secretly obtained, and in defiance to your Market Master and your Committee on Markets.

He further asks, that after so revoking said license, you will direct the Market Master and Committee on Markets, after due notice given, to offer either at public or private sale, said Stall No. 6, to the highest and best bidder, for the term of the unexpired market year, ending June 30th, 1885.

That in September, 1875, said Ruddall deeded to him his undivided ins terest in said lot; and shortly thereafter; in September, 1875, your petitioner deeded the entire of said lot to one Lindley Vinton. Both of the deeds were duly recorded at the time, in the office of the Recorder of Marion County; but by some mistake or inadvertance, of the particulars of which your petitioner is not advised, said real estate was thenceforward carried on the tax duplicate of the City of Indianapolis, in the name of Ruddall & Vinton. The proper change having been made in the County Treasurer's office, and it being in the county assessed to said Lindley Vinton. That said Lindley Vinton continued to be the owner of said property, and in actual possession thereof, and erected buildings thereon, which possession continued until in the year 1883, when said real estate was by said Lindley Vinton conveyed for full consideration paid, to your petitioner, and your petitioner then and thereby acquired said title. That while said real estate was so held by said Lindley Vinton by recorded title, and while he was in the possession thereof, certain property holders, to assess the benefits an<sup>d</sup> damagas occasioned by the opening of Henna street. That said City Commis- sion<sup>e</sup>rs required of the City Clerk among other things, that a

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notice should issue, and required him to issue a notice to said Ruddall and Vinton as the owners of said portion of said lot; and the reupon said City Clerk issued notice to the City Marshal, directing him to notify said James H. Ruddall and Merrick E. Vinton of the pendency of said proceedings; and thereupon said City Marshal, as appears from the record, served the same upon said James H. Ruddall by copy upon his agent, and upon your petitioner, by publication, your petitioner being then a resident of the City of St. Paul, in Minnesota. And thereupon under such notice, the said Commissioners proceeded to, and did assess benefits againstt said Ruddall and Vinton to said lot, in the sum of \$100.00, and so reported the same to your honorable body; and their report was thereupon approved, and the City Treasurer directed to collect said \$100.00; and said City Treasurer now claims. that the same is a valid and subsisting lien upon said real estate, and is threatening to collect the same.

Your petitioner shows as aforesaid, that at the time when said proceedings were had, said notices were issued and served, neither said James H. Ruddall nor said Merrick E. Vinton had any interest whatever, whether legal or equitable, in said real estate; and said notice to them was for that reason void and of no effect, and can not constitute the foundation of any lien. Nevertheless, he says by reason of the same appearing of record in the office of the Recorder of Marion County, and of the City Treasurer of said city, a cloud is cast upon the title of your petitioner to said real estate.

Your petitioner shows, that inasmuch as it is apparent that the alleged claim is of no legal validity, and should be released, be prefers to bring the matter to your attention, rather than to institute a suit to quiet title. He therefore prays that the proper city officers shall be directed to enter upon the records in the Recorder's office and in the City Treasurer's office, that said alleged lien is of no legal force or validity whatever; and your petitioner will ever pray, &c.

MERRICK E. VINTON, By Claypool & Ketcham.

Councilman Thalman offered the following motion; which was adopted :

That Robert Jolly have permission to pave with brick the pavement on both sides of his premises, situated on the point between Washington street and Nationa Road west of Blackford street; said work to be done at his own expense. Also that the City Engineer be hereby directed to set the grade stakes.

Councilman Trusler offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner proceed to open Shelby street to a uniform width in accordance with the proceedings had, and in conformity to the report of the City Commissioners heretofore made in the matter of widening and straightening the lines of said street, from the southern terminus of Virginia avenue to the south Corporation line.

Councilman Pearson offered the following motion; which was adopted :

That all motions regarding stone-crossings during the year 1885, be referred to the Board of Public Improvements without debate.

On motion, the Common Council then adjourned.
