REPORTS, ETC., FROM OFFICIAL BOARDS.

The Board of Health presented the Mortality report, showing eightyeven deaths for two weeks ending July 15th, 1885; which was read nd received.

The following communication from the Board of Health was read, acompanied with petition: To the Honorable Members of Common Council and Board of Aldermen :

Gentlemen:-In consequence of numerous complaints having been filed in our office by citizens living in the neighborhood of the Ray street sewer, and of a petition hereunto attached, we have made a careful inspection of the premises, and herewith report the same to you for your consideration.

We find that there are two branch sewers, running from Schmidt's and Lieber's breweries, and connect with the Ray street sewer, which empties into Pogue's Run at the intersection with Ray street, and deposits therein all of the offal of said brew-eries. Owing to the grade of the Run, it stands there in a pool, over a foot in depth, in the bed of the creek. The creek, north of the terminus of the Ray street sewer, is perfectly dry, with no flow of water to carry off the offensive deposits. The termination of the sewer at that point, we regard as a gross violation of all sanitary laws, and recommend that you take some immediate action in the matter.

On motion by Councilman Spahr, the whole matter was referred to the Committee on Sewers and Drainage, and City Civil Engineer, with instructions that if they deemed it advisable, to request the Chief Fire Engineer to have the same flushed with water from the fire plugs.

By consent, Councilman Newcomb offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That from and after the adoption of this motion, ten per cent. on all cestern contracts shall be withheld for ninety days from the time of completing the same, at which time the Chief Fire Engineer shall report the condition of said cistern to the City Clerk. and if in good condition, said Clerk shall drew his warrant on the City Treasurer for said ten per cent so withheld. Further, that hereafter all advertise-ments for cisterns, shall stipulate that the cisterns shall be walled up and remain in that condition thirty days before they are cemented, unless sooner done by order of the Chief Fire Engineer.

Councilman Newcomb offered the following resolution:

REPORTS, ETC., FROM STANDING COMMITTEES.

The Committee on Finance, through Councilman Thalman, submitted the following report; which was concurred in:

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen: —Your Committee on Finance respectfully report that the current axpenses for the past six months, have been \$252,780.05, against \$273,746.03 for the same months last year. The aggregate expenses also show that you are keeping inside of the estimates. One department, bridges (considering work contracted for and now under way), is up to the estimate. We would recommend that no more new work in this department be ordered. The cistern estimates will also be exhausted when the present contracts are paid for. The sewer estimate will be used up when work now under contract, and that which has been ordered by Council and Board, is completed and paid for. We would recommend a halt on passing any further sewer ordinances.

In regard to the Mayor's recommendation as to refunding at low rates of interterest \$155,000 that matures in 1889-'90, would say that we think the effort should be made. 'We would recommend that the Mayor further correspond with the holders of the bonds, and sound them as to what terms they would consent to take new twenty-year bonds at, and surrender the old ones.

We would recommend that \$2,000 be appropriated for the use of the Street Commissioner to clear obstructions and bars from Pogue's Run, so that when the Run is dry, he can put in his work to good advantage.

Gentlemen:—Your Judiciary Committee, to whom was referred the petition of John M. Higgins, asking damages for injuries to his horse in falling through the bridge over Pogue's Run at Virginia avenue crossing, beg leave to report that they do not think their committee is the proper one to pass upon said claim. We therefore recommend that the same be re-referred to the Committee on Accounts and Claims, and Street Commissioner.

We find that the claim of John W. Fultz, for refunding of taxes paid on Lot 118 of McCarty's second subdivision of Out lot 120, is just, the same having been taxed in two different names. Mr. Fultz asks less than is due. We recommend that \$3.92 be refunded, if accepted in full payment of all demands against the city.

That said report include a statement in regard to the second mortgage bonds issued on said Road, as to what said mortgage was made for; also, what disposition was made of the money by said Belt Railroad Directors, and if the money was all used in the way of improvements, as contemplated by the mortgage; if not, what portion was so used?

Councilman Rees offered the following motion; which was referred to he Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to fill the chuck-holes on Tennessee treet, from Washington street to North street, with gravel.

Councilman Reinecke offered the following motion; which was refered to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to place stone crossings at the crossings of Coburn, at Wright, McKernan and Short streets; also, to bowlder the alley crosings on Coburn street, between East street and Virginia avenue; also, to place tone crossings at the crossings of Dougherty street, at the crossings of Wright, McKernan and Short streets, and to bowlder the alley crossings on Dougherty street, between East street and Virginia avenue.

Councilman Smither offered the following motions; which were severally adopted:

That the Street Commissioner serve notice on the Citizens' Street Railway Company to immediately clean up Pratt street, between West and Paca streets, it being a nuisance, created by said company, of which the officers of said company have been frequently notified. In case said company does not at once comply with said notice, then the officers in the Board of Health are directed to cause the agents and officers of said company to be prosecuted for creating and maintaining a nuisance; and the Street Commissioner is directed to prevent by force, if necessary, the further use of said Pratt street for transfer purposes.

That the Committee on Public Property be authorized to have small stand painted in University Park.

Councilman Smither offered the following motion; which was referred to the Committee on Public Light:

That the Vapor Light Company be instructed to locate lamps on north West street, Third street, Torbit street, Center street, and also Pratt street.
