Proceedings of Board of Aldermen.

REGULAR SESSION—August 24, 1885.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Aldermanic Chamber, Monday evening, August 24th, A. D. 1885, at eight o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. Brainard Rorison, President of the Board of Aldermen, in the Chair, and Aldermen Bernhamer, Endly, King, Prier, and Tallentire—6.

ABSENT, 4-viz. Aldermen Cobb, Cox, McHugh, and Pritchard.

The Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen for the regular session, held August 10th, 1885, and the special session held August 13th, 1885, having been printed and placed on the desks of the Aldermen, said Journals were approved as published.

The following message was read and received:

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—I submit herewith the following papers for your consideration, favorably passed upon by the Common Council, at its regular session, held August 17th, 1885.

The report from the Committee on Contracts, awarding sundry and various contracts (see pages 499 and 500, ante), was read, and the favorable action of the Common Council thereon, was concurred in.

Contract and bond of Thomas Cummings, to build a stone wall on the north bank of Pogue's Run, from Tennessee street to the first alley east of Tennessee street. Bond, \$2,000; surety, F. Wm. Schaefer.

Contract and bond of Fred. Gansberg, to grade and gravel the first alley west of Arsenal avenue, from Washington street to Market street. Bond, \$400.00; surety, H. C. Roney.

That Mr. Pruett be allowed to make bowldered driveway across sidewalk at 324 Indiana avenue, at his own expense, and under supervision of City Civil Engineer.

The following entitled ordinance (passed by the Common Council) was read the first time:

G. O. 32, 1885—An ordinance to grant to the Indianapolis District Telegraph Company, the right of way for the construction and operation of its lines, and to set poles and to string wires thereon, in the streets, sidewalks and alleys of the City of Indianapolis.
