# REGULAR SESSION—October 19, 1885.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Council Chamber, Monday evening, October 19th, A. D. 1885, at half-past seven o'clock, in regular session.

OPENING AND REFERRING SEALED PROPOSALS FOR PUBLIC IMPROVE-MENTS.

Sealed proposals for making the following street improvements were opened, read, and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

- (S. O. 80, 1885)—For grading and bowldering the north gutter of Merrill street, from Alabama street to the J., M. & I. Railroad tracks.
- (S. O. 83, 1885)—For grading and graveling the first alley south of Sixth street, from Alabama street to Delaware street.
- (S. O. 84, 1885)—For grading and graveling the first alley west of Alabama street, from Sixth street to the first alley south of Sixth street.

Gentlemen:—In reference to the report of the Committee on Streets and Alleys concerning the adjusting of the grade of the sidewalk at and near the northeas corner of Mississippi and Vermont streets, I beg leave to report, that a sligh change, so as to give a proper flow to surface water, or the like, would not rende the city liable for damages at all. I think the Statute contemplates such a cutting down or raising of the surface at the property line as to materially injure the property of the party complaining. From the motion directing the Engineer to se stakes adjusting the grade, and the report of the Committee on Streets and Alley thereon, I take it that the case under consideration is one which would not involve the city in any damages at all; but to obviate any trouble in that direction, would suggest that the consent of the interested parties be obtained after the stake have been set, and before the change is made.

Nays, 10-viz. Councilmen Gallahue, McClelland, Newcomb, Pearson, Rees, Reynolds, Smither, Spahr, Thalman, and Trusler.

Councilman Pearson moved that the Common Council do now adjourn.

Which failed of adoption, by the following vote:

AYES, 9-viz. Councilmen Gallahue, McClelland, Newcomb, Pearson, Rees, Reynolds, Smither, Spahr, and Thalman.

Nays, 14—viz. Councilmen Benjamin, Cowie, Coy, Curry, Dowling, Doyle, Edenharter, Haugh, Mack, Moran, Reinecke, Sheppard, Trusler, and Wolf.

The following entitled ordinance was then read the second time:

G. O. 29, 1885—An ordinance requiring saloon keepers to pay an annual license of forty-eight dollars for the use of the General Fund of the City of Indianapolis.

Councilman Thalman moved an amendment to the above ordinance, to strike out \$48.00, and insert in lieu thereof \$47.00.

Which was laid on the table, on motion by Councilman Dowling, by the following vote:

Councilman Dowling moved that the ordinance be engrossed.

Councilman Thalman moved to refer the ordinance to a Special Committee.

Which was laid on the table, on motion by Councilman Coy, by the following vote:

AYES, 13 - viz. Councilmen Benjamin, Cowie, Coy, Curry, Dowling, Doyle, Edenharter, Haugh, Mack, Moran, Reinecke, Sheppard, and Wolf.

Nays, 10-v z. Councilmen Gallahue, McClelland, Newcomb, Pearson, Rees, Reynolds, Smither, Spahr, Thalman, and Trusler.

Councilman Spahr moved as an amendment to the motion to engross, that action on the ordinance be postponed until the next regular meeting of the Council.

Which was laid on the table, on motion by Councilman Coy, by the following vote:

AYFS, 13—viz. Councilmen Benjamin, Cowie, Coy, Curry, Dowling, Doyle, Edenharter, Haugh, Mack, Moran, Reinecke, Sheppard, and Wolf.

Nays, 10—viz. Councilmen Gallahue, McClelland, Newcomb, Pearson, Rees Reynolds, Smither, Spahr, Thalman, and Trusler.

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Councilman Dowling moved the previous question on the engrossment of the ordinance.

Councilman Pearson moved that the Common Council do now adjourn.

Which failed of adoption, by the following vote:

AYES, 10—viz. Councilmen Gallahue, McClelland, Newcomb, Pearson, Rees, Reynolds, Smither, Spahr, Thalman, and Trusler.

Nays, 13—viz. Councilmen Benjamin, Cowie, Coy, Curry, Dowling, Doyle, Edenharter, Haugh, Mack, Moran, Reinecke, Sheppard, and Wolf.

Councilman Thalman raised the point of order on Councilman Dowling's motion for the *previous question*, that the motion was out of order for the reason that the same was prefaced with remarks.

The Chair ruled the point of order well taken.

Councilman Trusler moved that action on the ordinance be postponed until January 1st, 1886.

Which was laid on the table, on motion by Councilman Edenharter, by the following vote:

AYES, 13—viz. Councilmen Coy, Curry, Doyle, Edenharter, Mack, Moran, Newcomb, Pearson, Reinecke, Reynolds, Sheppard, Trusler, and Wolf.

NAYS, 8—viz. Councilmen Cowie, Gallahue, Haugh, McClelland, Rees, Smither, Spahr, and Thalman.

Councilman Spahr moved to postpone action on the ordinance until the second meeting in November, 1885.

During the pendency of the above motion, it being now eleven o'clock, the Common Council was declared adjourned, by virtue of Rule 61, "The Council shall not, without a suspension of the rules by a two-thirds vote, sit later on any evening than eleven o'clock."
