CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

Monday, April 2D, 1866, 7½ o'clock, p. m.

The Common Council met in regular session.

That J. W. Davis, E. T. Sinker and Mr. Bowen, be permitted to gravel the south half of the alley running east and west through square No. 14, 195 feet, provided the same be completed within sixty days, and that said improvement be done under the direction of the Civil Engineer.

An Ordinance appropriating money to Charles Richmann for the use of the Fire Department.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, That the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars be, and are hereby, appropriated to Charles Richmann, Chief Fire Engineer, to be expended by him for forage and other things needed, for the use of the Fire Department.

SEC. 2. The City Auditor is hereby directed to issue warrants to Charles

Richmann for the above named amount.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage.

Mr. Kappes introduced general ordinance No. 44, as follows to-wit:

AN ORDINANCE for the removal of the East Wood and Hay Market in front of the Court House on Washington street.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, That the Wood and Hay Market on East Washington street, between Delaware and Alabama streets, be removed to East Market street, between Delaware and Alabama streets.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage.

Mr. Brown introduced general ordinance No. 45, as follows, to-wit:

An Ordinance to amend section 3 of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance prescribing rules and regulations for the government of the City Council, its officers, and officers connected with the city government," passed June 12th, 1865.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, That section 3 of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance prescribing rules and regulations for the government of the City Council, its officers and officers connected with the city government," passed June 12th, 1865, be amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Accounts and Claims, to examine and report upon the correctness of all accounts and claims, except for printing, blank books, advertising or stationery, or for office furniture or fuel for the use of city offices and Common Council Chamber, presented against the city, and to report ordinances for the payment of all accounts and claims

allowed by the City Council, which ordinances shall be reported at the regular meetings of the Council on the second and fourth Mondays of each month and at no other time: Provided, That all accounts for articles purchased or money expended by officers or agents of the city shall be sworn to as correct and necessary and all accounts presented by other parties shall be duly certified to by some proper officer or committee of the Council, who shall be cognizant of the correctness thereof.

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage.

Which, on motion, was read the first time by title, and, laid over.

By Mr. Coburn, form the Board of Public Improvements:

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Public Improvements, to whom the matter was referred, would respectfully report to your honorable body that in relation to the petition of property holders in the vicinity of Lake McCarty, that something must be done immediately towards draining it. No permanent improvement can be made that will be available this season. We would, therefore, recommend the passage of an ordinance compelling Nicholas McCarty to dig a ditch from where the one dug last year by Street Commissioner terminates through to the Bluff Road to drain the lake. We have instructed the Civil Engineer to make an estimate of a sewer through the ground where the present ditch is to be dug, also west on Ray street through to Pogue's Run.

The Civil Engineer would respectfully report that Messrs. Coulter and White, the contractors for furnishing and erecting lamp-posts, lamps, and fixtures on Deleware street, between North and St. Joseph streets, have completed the same according to contract and a first and final estimate in their favor is herewith submitted for your approval.

Also, the contract and bond of Hiram Seibert for grading, paving, curbing, and bouldering the alley running east and west through square 57, and the contract and bond of of the same party for grading and graveling the sidewalk on the west side of Missouri street, between South and Merrill streets,

are respectfully submitted for approval.

Also, specifications for building a bridge over Pogue's Run at its crossing

with Tennessee street, is submitted for approval.

From the City Attorney—Report:

Indianapolis, April 2, 1866.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—I have examined the questions presented in Mr. Brown's motion, made at your last meeting. I am of the opinion that the city cannot alter the grade of a street after a contract has been awarded, without the consent of the contractor and his sureties having been first obtained. If the contract has been awarded for the work to be done at a specified grade there can be no collection of the assessment, because the contractor cannot make an affidavit that the work has been done according to contract, and without such an affidavit there can be no precept issued.
