On motion by Mr. Seidensticker, the special order of business was suspended and the regular order taken up.

Mr. Coburn presented the following petition:

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 13, 1866.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis :

Your petitioners, George McOuat being the owner of the part of lot No. 9, and Robert B. Duncan the owner of the part of lot No. 10, in Square No. 57, in said City of Indianapolis, bordering on the alley running north and south through said Square, respectfully ask your honorable body to grant them the right to grade and gravel so much of said alley. or bowlder the same with stone, as lies between their said lots, being from Washington to Court streets, and to cause proper grade stakes to be set by the City Engineer for that purpose.

Adam Gold was granted the privilege of grading, paving and curbing in front of his property on Virginia Avenue, and the Engineer directed to set the grade stakes.

The sealed proposals for public works were opened and read by the City Clerk, and, on motion by Mr. Coburn, were referred to the Board of Public Improvements.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES.

Dr. Jameson, from the Finance Committee presented the following communication :

Dr. Jameson then introduced special ordinance No. 88, entitled :

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the City Treasurer to borrow the sum of forty thousand dollars, (\$40,000,) for the period of seven months, and making an appropriation to pay the interest thereon,

Which was read the first time.

Dr. Jameson moved that the rules be suspended and the ordinance read the second time, considered as engrossed, and read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The ayes and noes being taken under the rules, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn Emerson Glazier, Grosvenor, Jameson, MacArthur, McNabb, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Staub and Thompson-12.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the rules were suspended, and the ordinance read the second and third times and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Emerson, Glazier, Grosvenor, Jameson, MacArthur, McNabb, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Staub and Thempson-12.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Schmidt, from the Committee on Gas, offerered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the City Auditor is hereby authorized to advertise for sealed proposals to light and extinguish city lamps, for six months, with the privilege for one year, at the option of city, payment to be made in City Orders.

REPORTS FROM CITY OFFICERS.

The City Auditor made the following report:

1st. The first and final estimate allowed James and John Huffer for graveling, the west sidewalk on East street, botween Louisiana street and Virginia Avenue.

2d. First and final estimate allowed S. J. & R. H. Patterson, for grading and graveling North street and sidewalks, between Blackford and Minerva streets.

3d. The contract and bond of James and John Huffer, for grading and graveling Blackford street and sidewalks, between New York street and the south side of Market street.

4th. The contract and bond of James and John Huffer, for grading and graveling New York street, between the west side of West street and the west side of Blackford street. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the first and final estimate allowed James and John Huffer, for grading and graveling the west sidewalk on East street, between Louisiana street and Virginia Avenue, be, and the same is hereby, adopted as the estimate of this Council, and that the property owners are hereby required to pay the sums set opposite their respective names.

The question being on the passage of the resolution, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Glazier, Grosvenor, Jameson, MacArthur, McNabb, Schmitdt, Seidensticker, Staub and Thompson—12.

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 10, 1866.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The Civil Engineer would respectfully report the following for your approval

Corrected Estimate of John Stumph, for grading and bowldering Circle street, Market street, between Pennsylvania and Illinois streets, Meridian street, between Washington and Ohio streets; and curbing the outer edge of the sidewalk with stone.

Also, John Welsh, for grading and graveling the alley running north and south between Maryland and Cumberland streets, and east of lot (9,) square (63,) at 11 cents per lineal foot each side.

Also, submit a profile of East street, between Bicking street and the Corporation line. Cannot find any recorded or established grade except that established by Board of Engineers, which I have shown on profile.

The grade of street submitted will be nearly a continuous grade, from McCarty street to Corporation line, and will run water south to Corporation line, and out the public road, provided a ditch is opened from Corporation line, south on public road, about one hundred and seventy-five feet in length, and will average from one to two feet in depth. UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Mr. Brown presented the following petition :

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 13, 1866.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis;

On the 2d day of July, A. D. 1866, an ordinance was passed by your honorable body to grade and bowlder the alley running north and south through square No. 66, from Washington street to Pearl street accepting the sidewalk on the east side of said alley.

The nndersigned, owners of the property bordering on the east side of said alley, from Washington street extending south the distance of ninety feet were never consulted in the matter of the improvement, but understand that the ordinance was obtained in its present shape by representations made to Councilman, Austin H. Brown, to the effect that the property owners desired the improvement so made, which in point of fact is not so; and upon examination of the petition, we do not find the name of any property owner bordering on the desired improvement, but find it signed only by the tenants or renters of said property.

We therefore respectfully request that the ordinance be so changed, that the sidewalk on the east side of the alley, for the distance of 90 feet from Washington, street south, be included in the Ordinance. B. L. MCOUAT,

The Civil Engineer was instructed to have the lamp post on South Pennsylvania street, at Railroad crossing, moved about 20 feet south, as it will then throw light up and down the track.

Dr. Thompson introduced special ordinance No. 89-1866, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE to provide for lighting with gas Tennessee street, between Michigan street and the Corporation line north,

Which was read the first time by its title.

On motion by Dr. Thompson, the ordinance was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Glazier,

The Street Commissioner was instructed to lower the gutter on Pennsylvania street at the crossing of Railroad track, and re-bowlder the same, as the water overflows the sidewalk.

Dr. Jameson called up communication from City Marshal removing John S. Rusell, Deputy Marshal.

Which, on motion by Mr. Seidensticker, was made the special order of business under "unfinished business," at next regular meeting.

On motion by Mr. Seidensticker, the amended report of the City Commissioners, in the case of straightening the bed of Pogue's Run was taken up, as follows, to-wit:

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

We, the undersigned Commissioners, appointed by your Honorable body for the opening and laying out of new streets and alleys, &c., to whom was referred back

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 22, 1866.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned Commissioners appointed to appraise and assess damages and benefits in cases of opening streets, alleys, &c., to whom was referred the petition of the Indianapolis Rolling Mill Company, and others, to have the bed of Pogue's Run changed between Illinois street and the Canal, report that, in pursuance of notice given, they met at the office of the City Clerk on Thursday, the 16th day of August, 1866, at 9 o'clock, A. M, and proceeded to examine witnesses and hear evidence in the matter, and before concluding such examination, adjourned to meet on the following day at 9 o'clock, A. M. On re-assembling the Commissioners proceeded to view the ground proposed to be appropriated for the purpose of changing the course of the said Creek, and after making such view adjourned to meet on Saturday, August 18th, 1866, at 9 o'clock, A. M. Meeting pursuant to adjournment, the Commissioners proceeded to examine witnesses and hear evidence, and before concluding adjourned to meet on Tuesday, at 9 o'clock, A. M. Re-assembling at the time last stated, the Commissioners proceeded to re-view the ground and Creek, and adjourned to meet on Wednesday, August 22d, 1866, at 9 o'clock, A. M. The Commissioners met on the last named day, at the hour stated, and then proceeded to determine the amount of damages sustained and benefits accruing from changing the course of Pogue's Run as petitioned for, and according to the plat referred to the Commissioners by the Common Council. They find—

1st. That the whole amount of damages sustained is five thousand two hundred and seventy dollars (\$5,270), which is distributed and assessed to the owners of lots and parts of lots on the line of the proposed new course or channel of said Pogue's Run, between Illinois street and the Canal, as follows:

So the motion was adopted.
