COMMON COUNCIL.

REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

Monday, March 4th, 1867, 7 o'clock, p. m.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, John Caven, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Emerson, Glazier, Grosvenor, Jameson, Kappes, Kemker, Loomis, MacArthur, McNabb, Staub and Thompson—13.

Absent—Councilmen Allen, Colley, Fletcher, Schmidt and Seidensticker—5.

The proceedings of the regular session held March 25th, 1867, and of the adjourned session held February 27th, 1867, were read and approved.

Mr. Brown offered the following motion:

That some person be appointed to "test" and "regulate" the new burners lately ordered for the City Street Lamps before they are put in use.

Which was laid upon the table.

Mr. Coburn presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, March 4, 1867.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned, citizens and owners of property on Washington street, in Squares Nos. 67 and 54, in the City of Indianapolis, do petition your honors for relief from the exorbitant assessment of our respective property situate in the above squares, and in justification of said petition we submit the following statement, to-wit:

In the Squares (Nos. 66 and 55) immediately east of us the assessment is \$500 per foot front. In ours (67 and 54) the assessment is \$400 per foot front, and in the Square (68) immediately west of us the assessment is \$100 per

foot front.

The property in the square west of us commands nearly or quite as much rent as that in ours; and in the squares east of us, above described, property with equal improvements commands from double to treble the rents of our tenements.

Dr. Jameson offered the following motion:

That the Auditor be directed to strike off the amount on the tax duplicate assessed on National Bank Stock.

Which was referred to the City Attorney.

Mr. Loomis presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, March 4, 1867.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned, respectfully petition your honorable body to pass the ordinance introduced by Mr. Loomis three weeks since, entitled "an ordinance regulating the storage of Coal and other dangerous oils within the city limits," the same being considered dangerous under the present regulations.

That Elliott and Douglass, contractors for ditch on Railroad street, be instructed to continue the ditch from St. Clair street along the line of the old Bellefontaine Railroad to the north side of Massachusetts Avenue, as it was originally intended.

Which was adopted.

Dr. Thompson presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, March 4, 1867.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned petitioner would respectfully represent that he has been to the expense of graveling and fixing the alley from his stable to Pratt street, and that the gutter on Pratt street is so deep that it is impossible to get over it with a carriage, and would humbly ask your honorable body to cause a bridge to be placed over said gutter.

His Honor, the Mayor, asked for instructions as to the manner of publication of his Proclamation concerning dogs, in relation to which Mr. Brown offered the following motion:

That the Mayor be instructed to advertise his Proclamation on the subject of hydrophobia once a week for two weeks in the Daily Journal, Herald, Gazette and Telegraph, and in the Weekly Volksblatt.

The question being on the adoption of the motion, Mr. Emerson called for the ayes and noes.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Kappes, Kemker, Loomis, McNabb, Staub and Thompson-7.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Coburn, Emerson, Glazier, Grosvenor and MacArthur—5.

So the motion was adopted.

Sealed proposals were opened and read, and referred to the Board of Public Improvements.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES.

Mr. Coburn, from the Committee on Accounts and Claims, made the following report:

Indianapolis, March 4, 1867.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The Committee on Accounts and Claims, to whom was referred the claim of Hugo Marmont, would respectfully report the following facts:

On the 11th of September, 1865, Marmont petitioned to flag the sidewalk in front of his property (50 feet front); also, to curb it. It to be done under the direction of the Civil Engineer. He did not flag, but paved.

Again, on the 13th of November, he petitioned to pave in front of his

property on Georgia street, which was granted. We do not know under which petition he paved the corner. These are the facts as reported in the proceedings of the above dates.

Mr. Brown, from Select Committee, made the following report:

INDIANAPOLIS, March 4, 1867.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The Special Committee, to whom was referred the petitions on the subject of the Agricultural College appropriation, report that they have caused all the petitioners' names except 945 to be compared with the tax duplicate and assessment list for 1866. These 945 names the Committee have not had time to have compared. Of those compared 2,783 names are found on the duplicate and assessment lists. Your Committe ask to be discharged from the further consideration of the subject, and that the City Auditor be directed to pay off and discharge the Clerks employed by the Committee.

The Chief Fire Engineer made the following report:

Indianapolis, March 4, 1867.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Allow me to most respectfully ask your honorable body to purchase seventeen hundred feet of new rubber hose for the use of the Fire Department, as you are well aware all (but a thousand feet of our hose which were purchased last summer) have been in use ever since the organization of the present department. They have become so rotten that they will not stand the pressure of throwing an effective stream without bursting. By purchasing 1,700 feet each of the Companies will then have 900 feet of new

hose, and which will prevent any bursting of hose at fires when they are most needed. I would state that without the 1,000 feet of hose which were purchased last summer, we would not have been able to put out the fire of Mr. Tate's lumber yard on Alabama street some time since; and the fire last Saturday has fully demonstrated that new hose are needed very badly. From \$1,500 to \$2,000 worth of property would have been saved by having had good hose. Allow me, also, in this connection, to recommend the purchase of a new hose reel, so that an extra reel of hose be taken to every fire, that they may be on hand when needed, and entirely preventing such accidents as occurred at the fire on Saturday last by running out of water. The probable cost of all the above will amount to \$4,635.
