PROCEEDINGS OF COMMON COUNCIL.

REGULAR SESSION-June 21, 1886.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Council Chamber, Monday evening, June 21st, A. D. 1886, at eight o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. Caleb S. Denny, Mayor, and ex officio President of the Common Council in the Chair, and 24 members, viz: Councilmen Benjamin, Burns, Coy, Cummings, Dell, Dunn, Edenharter, Haugh, Herig, Mack, Markey, McClelland, McGroarty, Newland, Pearson, Reinecke, Reynolds, Rooker, Smith, Smither, Stuckmeyer, Swain, Thalman, and Waterman.

The Proceedings of the Common Council for the regular session, held June 7th, 1886, having been printed and placed on the desks of the Councilmen, said Journals were approved as published.

OPENING AND REFERRING SEALED PROPOSALS FOR PUBLIC IMPROVE-MENTS.

Sealed proposals for laying cement walks in Circle Park were opened, read, and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEE ON CONTRACTS.

The Committee on Contracts, through Councilman Reynolds, submitted the following report; which was concurred in:

To the Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Contracts, to whom was referred the proposals received June 7th, 1886, have examined the same, and find them to be as follows:

His Honor, the Mayor, delivered the following address; which was ordered printed in the Proceedings of the Common Council.

To the Citizens of Indianapolis:

Tomlinson Hall was completed and occupied for the first time by the public on the first instant. The ground floor of the building is now also nearly completed. No formal words of dedication having been spoken at the time the Hall was thrown open to the public, I have been requested to say a few words at this time concerning Mr. Tomlinson and the Hall which his generous bequest has given to us.

Stephen Decatur Tomlinson was born in the city of Cincinnati on the 17th day of August, 1815. He was the son of John and Florinda Tomlinson, who emigrated to that city in 1812 from the State of Pennsylvania, of which they were both natives. Stephen came to Indianapolis on the 11th day of July, 1834. He had previously learned the trade of a type-setter. This he abandoned, however, the year after coming to this city, and then entered upon the business of a druggist, which he pursued until 1854, when failing health compelled him to retire.

Mr. Tomlinson was a man of varied and extensive information, largely self-taught, for in his day the advantages were not as they now are. He was also accomplished in music and those other refinements which go to make up a polite education. In his relations with his fellow-men he endeavored to do his whole duty. He was social, but inclined to be retiring in his disposition, creating but few antagonisms and no lasting enemies. Brought up in what might be called the Puritanic period of the west, he was of a fixed character and firm in his convictions in the faith of a Christian orthodoxy, and sought to conform to the same, living and dying at peace with the whole world.

He was married to Mary Todd Brown, of this city, to whom were born two children, both dying in infancy. He himself passed to his final rest November 14, 1870,

his widow surviving him until June 25, 1882.

He left an estate worth about \$100,000 at the time of his death. He bequeathed it all to his wife, but directed that any residue thereof remaining at her death, including that which she might acquire by exchange or purchase, should go to the City of Indianapolis, "to be used in the erection of buildings for the use of citizens and city authorities," on the East Market Square, at the corner of Delaware and Market streets. Before any part of the large estate had been disposed of by Mrs. Tomlinson she entered into a contract with the city by which it was all transferred to the city, she receiving an annuity of \$7,000 for her support, during life, the contract providing that the property should be sold and the proceeds used as directed in the will.

Much discussion occurred between 1874 and 1881 as to the construction of the contemplated buildings, but not until November of the latter year did the municipal bodies take any definite action looking to its erection. Various ordinances were passed and plans considered, when, in March, 1883, a contract was about to be entered into with Moses K. Fatout to erect a large public assembly hall and city office building, such as was evidently contemplated by Mr. Tomlinson. At this point, however, a permanent injunction was granted by the Superior Court, at the suit af Samuel E. Perkins, forbidding the erection of such a structure, on the ground that the Market Square was originally dedicated by the State to the public for market purposes, and could not be diverted from such uses.

On March 9, 1885, the ordinance was passed under which the present building was constructed. By its terms D. A. Bohlen was appointed as the architect "to prepare plans and specifications for a market house on the East Market Square and a building across the west end thereof for market purposes and containing a n assembly hall." Under its provisions Mayor McMaster, Councilmen Pearson and Sheppard, and Aldermen Rorison and King, were selected as a Building Committee, "charged with the duty of contracting for and supervising the construction of said buildings."

The plans for the present building were then designed; conforming as nearly as possible to the terms of the will and the order of the court at the same time. The ground floor was wholly designed for market uses, which seemed to be all that was necessary to fairly comply with the decision of the court. At all events no one attempted to prevent the placing of the large assembly hall above the market, and I feel sure that no citizen would desire to see it removed, now that it is done.

The excavating for the building was done by Fulmer & Seibert, and the foundation stone work by Koss & Fritz, the contracts being directly with the city. Salisbury & Stanley were the successful bidders for the main structure. They sub-let the brick work to John Martin, and the stone trimmings to Goddard Bros. These men all did their work well. The building stands as a monument to the skill of Mr. Bohlen as an architect, and to the several contractors of honest workmanship. Its cost, including the architect's percentage, cement sidewalks, gas fixtures, furniture, and the market stalls, to be hereafter put in, will be \$141,613. It is safe to say that, according to the customs of extravagance usually indulged in the construction of public buildings of a like character, it would have cost \$200,000. It is fair to say that the upper story of the building (or Tomlinson Hall proper) was built out of the Tomlinson Fund, and the lower story (or market house portion) out of the Additional City Hall Fund, derived from the saloon tax.

The building is a pride to the city and a great convenience and source of pleasure and education to our citizens. We owe it mainly to the man whose name it bears, for his bequest laid the foundation for and gave impetus to the movement, resulting in its erection. His voice is now still, but his example is worthy of all emulation, and his memory will remain fresh in the minds of this people as long as the building itself shall stand.

There still remains unsold a considerable portion of the Tomlinson property. I trust it may be speedily converted into cash and used in the construction of a comfortable and commodious market house east of the present structure, as provided for by the terms of the ordinance referred to. While this will not be the kind of a building named by Mr. Tomlinson, it will conform as nearly thereto as the courts will allow to be built on this site, and will at least furnish additional cause for the people of the city to revere his memory. The present Building Committee, consisting of Councilmen Pearson and Howes, Aldermen Endly and King, and the writer, have already recommended that this be done, and hope it will meet with the approval of the people of this city, as well as our associates in the Council and Board of Aldermen.

In closing this sketch I desire to add my approval to a suggestson made in my presence some days ago by Councilman Swain. It is this: That in the future Dr. James M. Tomlinson and Mrs. Clarissa Sullivan, brother and sister of Stephen D. Tomlinson, and his only blood relatives living in this city, be complimented with tickets to all entertainments hereafter held in Tomlinson Hall, which shall be made a condition in the letting of it at all times.

The City Attorney submitted the following reports; which were received:

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—Since the last meeting of the Council the following cases have been disposed of in the Superior Court:

- 1. The case of Nathan Buley vs. John J. Garver, Superintendent of the City Dispensary. This was a suit against the defendant for injuries sustained by plaintiff because of the alleged negligence of the defendant in setting a broken arm. I voluntarily appeared for the defendant, as a city officer, and filed a demurrer to the complaint, which the Court sustained, and, on motion, dismissed the action at plaintiff's cost.
- 2. The case of Catherine Dixon vs. the City and Joseph Webster, Chief Fire Engineer, and myself as City Attorney. This was a suit to enjoin us from proceeding against plaintiff because of her attempt to erect and maintain a building on west Ohio street which we contended did not come within the provisions of the ordinance respecting fire proof buildings. The building was partly erected, the outer walls of which consisted of 2x4 studding, to which was nailed corrogated iron. We contended that this class of buildings did not fulfill the requirements of the ordinance which demands that the outer walls shall be of brick, stone or iron. The Court, Judge Taylor deciding, held that it had no jurisdiction of the case; and, secondly, held that the building thus constructed was not an iron building, as the ordinance required. The case was thereupon dismissed at plaintiff's cost.

9th. To clean the gutters of Michigan street, between Delaware and Noble streets. Recommend the work be done.

10th. To clean the gutters of New Jersey street, between New York and North streets. Recommend the work be done.

11th. To place a double stone crossing across Washington street, at the first alley west of Missouri street. Recommend the work be done.

12th. To clean the gutters of Ellsworth street. Recommend the work be done.

13th. To place double stone crossings on Madison avenue, across McCarty street. Recommend the crossing be made of broken stone.

14th. To clean the gutters and fill the chuck-holes, and put gravel where needed, on Blake street, from Washington street to Ind ana avenue.

Recommend the work be done.

15th. To place a double stone crossing on the north side of New York street at Minerva street. Recommend the crossing be made of broken stone.

16th. To repair West street, and fill chuck-holes on same, from North street to First street. Work has been done.

17th. To lay stone crossings on Garden street, at Tennessee street.

Recommend the work be done.

18th. To lay a single stone crossing on Virginia avenue, between south and Louisiana street. Recommend the work be done.

19th, To place a double stone crossing on Minerva street, at Michigan street.

Recommend the work be not done.

20th. Te clean the gutters of Minerva street, from New York street to North street. Recommend the work be done.

21st. To fill up the chuck-holes on south Illinois street, between Merrill street

and Morris street. Recommend the work be done.

22d To clean the gutters on Coburn and Daugherty streets, between East street and Virginia avenue. Recommend the work be done.

23d To lay double stone crossings on both sides of Broadway street, across

Eighth street and Ninth street, and alleys between Eighth and Ninth streets.

Recommend the crossings be put in on the alleys.

24th. To clean the gutters on Merrill street, from Illinois street to Tennessee street; also, the gutters on Eddy street, from Merrill to Norwood streets.

Recommend the work be done.

25th. Is to disposition of the old steam road roller "Romeo". Recommend that the Street Commissioner be directed to dispose of all of the machine except the roller.

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Public Light, to whom sundry papers were referred, would report thereon as follows:

We, however, realize the fact that the city's finances are not such as to be liberal, as its representatives would like to be, (even in case of distressed humanity.) We are limited in our funds, out of which we are in duty bound to provide for fixed and necessary expenses, for which such funds are raised. Under these circumstances we could not recommend the appropriation needed to meet their deficiency, but would recommend that the City Clerk be directed to add monthly to the appropriation ordinance, the amount of fifty dollars for their benefit.
