## REGULAR SESSION—October 11, 1886.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Aldermanic Chamber, Monday evening, October 11th, A. D. 1886, at halfpast seven o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. Thomas E. Endly, President of the Board of Aldermen, in the Chair, and Aldermen Brown, Crosby, King, Laut, Prier, Pritchard, Rail, Schmidt, and Wright—10.

The Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen for the regular session held September 27th, and the special session held September 28th, 1886, having been printed and placed on the desks of the Aldermen, said Journals were approved as published.

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to notify all owners of real estate fronting on Washington street, between Delaware and Illinois streets, to at once roughen all the stone pavements in front of their property, to the satisfaction of such Street Commissioner; and that upon failure so to do, said Street Commissioner is hereby ordered to do said work, and collect costs thereof from such property owners.

The report of the City Attorney, relative to the action of the Board of County Commissioners, dis-annexing certain territory in accordance with petition of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen (see page 847, ante), was read and received.

The reports from the City Rental Agent for August and September, 1886, were read and received.

The quarterly report from the Chief Fire Engineer was read and received.

The following motion was read, and the action of the Common Council non concurred in:

That the Chief Fire Engineer be, and he is hereby requested to reinstate Alexander Haugh in the Fire Department.

Alderman Rail presented the following communication; which was read and received:

Indianapolis, Oct. 11th, 1886.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—Not wishing to impair the efficiency or discipline of the Fire Department, or antagonize Chief Webster in any manner, I would respectfully ask that you do not concur in the action of the Council in reference to the request for my re-appointment; but would ask if, in the near future, Chief Webster seen fit to appoint me to a position in the Fire Department, that you would give the matter a favorable consideration.

The report from the Board of Public Improvements and Street Commissioner, showing the expenses of the Street Repair Department for September, 1886, (see page 848, ante), was read and received.

The Mortality report from the Board of Health for September, 1886, was read and received.

The report from the City Commissioners, in the matter of opening and extending Lincoln Lane from its eastern terminus to Shelby street, and the following resolution, (see pages 848, 849, 850, 851 and 852, ante), was read:

Resolved, That the report of the City Commissioners in the matter of opening and extending Lincoln Lane on a straight line to the width of sixty (60) feet, from the present eastern terminus of said Lincoln Lane to Shelby street, be, and the same is hereby, in all things, accepted and approved; that the benefits assessed and damages awarded by said Commissioners be, and the same is hereby approved; that the real estate described in said report necessary for the opening and extension of said Lincoln Lane, be, and the same is hereby, appropriated; that the City Clerk be, and is hereby, directed to certify to the Treasurer of Marion county, Indiana, so much of said report as assesses benefits and awards damages upon the real estate, giving description thereof: Provided, however, That said Treasurer shall not tender or pay any part of the damages occasioned by said opening and extension, as shown by said Commissioners' report, nor shall said street be opened or widened until the benefits assessed shall have been paid to the Treasurer, the collection of which benefits the said Treasurer is hereby directed to make as soon as said certified copy of said Commissioners' report comes to his hands.

The favorable action of the Common Council on the report was concurred in, and the resolution concurrently adopted, by the following vote:

That the eleventh clause of the report submitted by the Committee on Contracts July 19th, 1886, awarding the contract to Robert Kennington & Co., for grading and graveling State avenue and sidewalks, from Washington street to Michigan treet, (see page 631, ante), be concurred in, and the contract awarded.

The report from the Superintendent of the City Dispensary for the month of September, 1886, was read and received.

The report from the Superintendent of the City Hospital for the month of September, 1886, was read and received.

The report from the Building Committee on Market House and Public Buildings, (see page 854, ante), was read, and the favorable action of the Common Council thereon, concurred in.

The following report from the Committee on Judiciary and City Attorney, favorably passed upon by the Common Council, (see pages 852 and 853, ante), was read. The first clause was, on motion of Alderman King, referred to the Committee on Judiciary, and the second clause concurred in:

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen: — Your Committee on Judiciary and City Attorney, to whom sundry papers were referred, would report:

1st. Is the petition of Andrew J. Scott, asking that he be paid the sum of \$135.00 for the loss of his horse, by having a nail run into his foot, while driving over White River bridge.

Your committee have thoroughly investigated the matter, and recommend that

he be paid the sum of \$125.00 in full satisfaction of said claim.

2d. Is the petition of Theo. Pfafflin & Co., for refunding the sum of \$36.30, taxes claimed to have been returned in 1884, while the property was in Terre Haute, and properly taxed there.

Recommend the prayer of the petitioners be granted, and that said amount

(\$36.30) be refunded.

That the Traub heirs be, and are hereby, granted permission to pave with brick, the sidewalk in front of their property on west Washington street, from Belmont avenue to a point 470 feet east of Belmont avenue, at their own expense, under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

That Patrick Kirland be, and is hereby, granted permission to pave with brick, the sidewalk in front of his property on west Washington street, at his own expense, under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

That John McDonald be allowed to make a bowldered crossing across the pavement at Lot No. 7 Cypress street, subject to the approval of the City Civil Engineer.

That Moritz Kaufman be granted the permission to pave with brick the north sidewalk of North street, from West street to the first alley east, at his own expense, and under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

That the Street Commissioner furnish lumber for the driveway in front of No. 3 Engine House, and the labor be done by the members of the department.

That the Street Commissioner notify the Trustees of Fletcher Place Church to repair the sidewalk on Virginia avenue.

That A. I. Lyon be, and is hereby, granted permission to grade and pave with brick, the sidewalk alongside of his property, south side of Lincoln avenue, from College avenue to the first alley east of College avenue; work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

The following motions (see pages 859, and 861, ante), were read, and referred to the Committee on Streets & Alleys and Sewers & Drainage:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to at once to lower the gutter on the east side of Sullivan street, from Bradshaw street to McCarty street, according to the stakes set by the City Civil Engineer, so as to relieve Bradshaw street from the overflows that have occurred on that street for the reason that the gutters of Sullivon street are higher than the gutters on Bradshaw street, that are so graded as to drain into the gutters of Sullivan street.

That the Street Commissioner be directed to notify D. A. Chenowith to remove the gate placed at the north opening of the alley first west of Shelby street south from Sanders street, as the alley is a public alley, fifteen feet wide.

That Wm. G. Wasson be granted the privilege of erecting a private telephone line from the corner of North street and the Canal to No. 24 south Pennsylvania street, and to use the poles of the city where he can, under the direction of and subject to removal by the Chief Fire Engineer.

That Dr. Bigger be granted the right to string a private telephone wire from his Virginia office to his residence on Fletcher avenue; wire to be strung under the direction of the Superintendent of the Fire Alarm Telegraph.

The following petition and resolution (see pages 857 and 858, ante), were read:
