REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

Monday, October 16th, 1871, 7 o'clock P. M.

The Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Batty, Bigham, Brown, Cottrell, Craft, Gimber, Heckman, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Reagan, Thalman, Thoms, Weaver, Whitsit and Wiles—16.

Absent—Councilmen Newman and Woodburn—2.

The proceedings of the regular session held October 9th, 1871, and of the called session held October 10th, 1871, and of the adjourned session held October 11th, 1871, were read and approved.

Sealed proposals for the improvements of streets, alleys, sidewalks, &c., were opened and read, and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

The bridge bids were referred to the Committee on Bridges.

Mr. Craft, from the Committee on Contracts, made the following report:

Indianapolis, October 16, 1871.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen—We, the Committee on Contracts, would report that O. H. P. Bly is the lowest and best bidder on grading and paving the sidewalk on Virginia avenue, between East street and the corporation line, his bid being sixty-four (64) cents per lineal foot front. We would therefore recommend that he be awarded the contract for the said work, and the Civil Engineer is hereby ordered to set the grade stakes.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee on Fire Department, to whom was referred the petition of Henry D. Carlisle to be allowed to build a frame addition to his mill on the corner of Maryland street and the Canal, would respectfully report that they have examined the same, and would recommend the prayer of the petitioner be granted.

Mr. Marsee offered the following motion:

Moved: That the Committee in charge of the Contributions made by the citizens of this city for the Relief of the citizens of Chicago, be invited to act with the Committee appointed by this Council to disburse the appropriation of \$20,000 made for the same purpose.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Locke offered the following motion:

Moved: That the special Relief Committee be instructed to notify the Mayor of Chicago that the twenty thousand dollars appropriated bp this Council and on deposite here, is subject to his order, to be expended in the purchase of such articles as he may direct for the relief of the sufferers by the late fire in Chicago.

Mr. Thalman offered the following motion:

Moved: That Aaron Resier be allowed to bowlder the sidewalk on the east side of Blackford street, from Vermont to first alley north of Vermont street, said work to be done at his own expense, and under the direction of the Civil Engineer.

Mr. Bigham presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 16, 1871.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapalis:

GENTLEMEN—We the undersigned would respectfully ask your permission to grade and gravel the alley in square 60, from Washington to Court street, and between New Jersey and East streets, and that the City Engineer be and is hereby ordered to set the proper grade stakes, and the said work to be finished in sixty days. Indianapolis, Ind., 16, 1871.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN-The undersigned residents of the city of Indianapo-

lis, respectfully remonstrate against the passage of an ordinance now pending before your honorable body, proposing to authorize Edward King to lay down a railroad track across the eastern termines of New York street, for the reason that the same will be detrimental to a serious degree to the property along the line, and in the general neighborhood of the proposed track.

Moved: That the Street Commissioner be directed to cause the gutter on the south side of North street, between Meridian and Illinois (or the Canal) streets, to be opened and cleaned, so as to to admit of the free flowage of water down said gutter.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Reagan offered the following motion:

Moved: That the Street Commissioner notify the Terre Haute and Vincennes Railroad Companies to plank the width of ten feet at the crossings of Louisiana and McGill streets, the same to be done ten days from this date, in case of failure of said companies to comply with this order, the Street Commissioner be and is hereby ordered to do the said work and collect costs from said companies.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Heckman presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 16, 1861.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN—I herewith submit plat entitled "J. M. Ridenour's extended and revised sub-division in the city of Indianapolis," which

plat is now of record in Plat Book No. 3, page 208, of the records of Marion County, and is theirin specificially described as comprising J. M. Ridenour's re-subdivision of Wm. Williams subdivision, and part of lots E. & F. of Jas. Blakes subdivision, and also a certain other parcle of land lying west of State avenue and south of Washington street. In the said extended and revised plat the numbers of the lots of the former plat are preserved and the numerial order extended, excepting lots No. 12 and 23 of the former plat, which said numbers are dropped being mainly absorbed by William street, as designated on the revised plot, I would therefore pray your hon orable body that said extended and revised plat be accepted and approved, which involves the vacation of Blake alley between South Arsenal avenue and State avenue, and establishing instead William street between said points, and your petitioner will every pray, &c.

An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the west sidewalk of New Jersey street, between Merrill and McCarty streets,

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Marsee introduced Special Ordinance No. 141, 1871, entled:

An Ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick the east sidewalk of Virginia avenue, between Alabama and New Jersey streets, and to repair the portion already down.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Brown offered the following motion:

Moved: That Agedius Naltner be allowed the privilege of paving nine (9) feet in width of the sidewalk in front of property on south Meridian street, between Merrill and McCarty streets, with the patent pavements of which Stonestreet and Richters have the control,

Provided, that the same be done at his own expense and to the satisfaction of the City Civil Engineer.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Thalman presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Oct. 16, 1871.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen—The Water Works Company of Indianapolis respectfully represent that the improvement of the west sidewalk of Missouri street, between Indiana avenue and St. Clair street, directed by an ordinance of the Common Council, passed September 6th, 1871, would be materially injurious to said company; that to improve the sidewalk to the width therein directed, would require a large amount of earth to be thrown into the canal on the west side thereof, and greatly obstruct the flow of water the mills which are supplied by the canal, and to the Water Works. That the tow-path of the canal which is on the west side of said street is well graveled and furnishes a good walk for pedestrians. That the improvements directed would be in plain violation of the rights of said company as owners of said canal, and if not arrested will justify and compel an application on their part to enjoin the construction of the same.

Said company is further informed that the owners of a majority of feet of the property fronting on the line of said contemplated improvements are opposed to the making of the same, and that the contractors for the work in consideration of that fact and the likelihood of litigation, are willing to surrender and annul their contract.

A petition from the owners of property along said street, asking that said improvement shall not be made, and an agreement from the contractors that they are willing to relinquish the contract, are herewith submitted.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen—The undersigned, property owners fronting on the

west side of Missouri street, between Indiana avenue and St. Clair street, would respectfully petition your honorable body to repeal the ordinance providing for the grading and graveling of the west sidewalk on Missouri street, between Indiana avenue and St. Clair street, for the following reasons:

1st. The improvement was not asked for, and is not desired by any considerable number of the property owners or residents along said street.

- 2d. The sidewalk or tow-path along said street is now wide enough, and as good a walk as it would be after the improvements were made.
- 3d. Some of the owners of property along said street are widows, depending on their labor to support themselves and families, and it would compel them to sell their property to pay for the improvement.
- 4th. The improvement would be an injury instead of a benefit to our property, and would add in no way to the convenience of the citizens.

We therefore pray your honorable body to repeal said ordinance and annul the contract for improving the same.

Which, on motion, were referred to the Committee on Fire Department.

Mr. Bigham offered the following motion:

Moved: That Mr. English have permission to place stone curbing along the sidewalk in front of his property on east Washington street.

Which was adopted.

ORDINANCES ON SECOND READING.

General Ordinance No. 53, 1871, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for tapping public sewers and drains, and making connection therewith,

Was called up and read the second time.

Mr. Gimber moved to strike out the words "ten dollars," where it occurs in the second section, and insert fifty cents in lieu thereof.

Which motion was not adopted.

Mr. Brown offered the following amendment to section second, to be inserted after the words "ten dollars:"

Provided, That the fee for tapping any public sewer constructed wholly at the public expense, shall be twenty-five dollars.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Craft offered the following amendment to section three:

"The connections and openings in any sewer or drain must be made under the direction, and to the satisfaction of the Sewerage Engineer."

Which was not adopted.

The ordinance was then ordered engrossod.

On motion, the following ordinances were called up, and, on motion, stricken from the files:

General Ordinance No. 48, 1871, entitled:

An Ordinance granting permission to construct a railroad track across New Jersey street.

General Ordinance No. 51, 1871, entitled:

An Ordinance prohibiting the loading and unloading of freight cars on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, in the city of Indianapolis.
