To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Council, held on the 18th day of December, 1871, a motion was passed directing the Civil Engineer to set the grade stakes for the City Marshal, for the opening of the first alley south of Pogues' Run, between East and Cook strrets.

Some time ago the Council, upon the petition of Speigel and others, passed an order vacating this alley. Afterwards, Gansberg and others instituted a suit in the Marion Circuit Court against the

city, Speigel, and others, to enjoin the closing of the alley. The Court granted a perpetual injunction, and Speigel and the other defendants, except the city, appealed to the Superior Court, where the case is now pending.

I respectfully submit that the above recited motion be recinded or reconsidered, as it surely would be improper for the Marshal to carry

it out while the matter is pending in the Supreme Court,
