At its regular meeting July 28, 1952, after due public notice, the City Plan Commission held a public hearing on the subject ordinance, which would change the zoning to U3 or Business in the area bounded by 16th Street, White River Parkway, East Drive, 18th Street and East Riverside Drive.

The recommendation of the City Plan Commission, based on review of the proposal together with a specific recommendation of the Board of Park Commissioners, which was agreed to by the petitioners for said zoning change at the hearing, is that Section 1 of General Ordinance No. 70 be amended by striking out the words: "containing 19.10 acres, more or less" in the last two lines of Section 1, and substituting in lieu thereof the words: "except a strip of land one hundred fifty (150) feet wide measured south from and parallel with the south property line of 18th Street, from the west property line of East Riverside Drive to the east right-of-way line of White River Parkway, East Drive, and except also a strip of land one hundred (100) feet wide measured east from and aparallel with the east right-of-way line of White River Parkway, East Drive, from a line one hundred fifty (150) feet south of the south line of 18th Street to the north right-of-way line of 16th Street."

Section 6. The salaries and compensations of the various officers and employees of the city, or prescribed for certain positions and duties, for the ensuing year as recommended and fixed by the mayor and as now approved by the Common Council, are hereby adopted and fixed at the respective amounts herein specified and appropriated therefor under the several departments and schedules therein set forth: Provided, however, that no person, official or employee whose salary or compensation is hereby fixed under any item, or by any ordinance hereafter adopted, shall have any vested right to receive such amount, or any minimum amount, except as may be accrued, or otherwise provided by a statute.

Section 7. (a) Any executive department, in its discretion, may at any time transfer any employee from one position to another in such department, or may change and reassign all or any of such employee's duties therein, or may authorize the temporary use of any such employee's service by other executive departments, all whenever it deems such action necessary or advisable, for any reason.

(b) The mayor, in his discretion, may at any time and for any reason, transfer any employee from one executive department to another, where not otherwise limited by statute, and the amount of compensation of such employee shall remain at the sum payable by this budget in such prior position, unless otherwise prescribed in writing by the mayor and thereupon approved by the Common Council.

(c) Any such transfers of positions or reassignments of duties shall be at all times subject to further control and orders of the respective executive department, or the mayor; and the aggregate amount of compensation specified in this budget for all such positions and duties, in the one or more executive departments so affected, shall not be exceeded in fixing or paying any such compensation along with that of all other such employees therein.

Section 8. That the auditor of Marion County, Indiana, be and he is hereby ordered and directed to place all such tax levies upon the property tax duplicates, and the county treasurer of such county, ex-officio city treasurer, be and he is hereby ordered and directed to collect the same for the City of Indianapolis, and each of said departments thereof, and make due report thereof as provided by law.

Section 9. That there is hereby levied and assessed or confirmed as may be required by law on all real estate and improvements and all personal property of whatever description, notes, bonds, stocks, choses in action of every kind and character in the City of Indianapolis, as assessed and returned for taxation in said city for the year 1953, a tax rate of One Dollar and fifty-nine cents (\$1.59) for general purposes on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; also fifty cents (.50) for each poll for general Purposes; eight and nine-tenths cents (.089) ----- for city sinking fund for each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; one cent (.01) for flood prevention sinking fund on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; thirtysix and four-tenths cents (.364) for Public Health and Hospital fund on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; eight-tenths cents (.008) for Health Bond Fund on each one hundred dollars valuation of such taxable property; three and four-tenths cents (.034) for school Health Fund on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; two and three-tenths (.023) for tuberculosis Fund on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; twenty and four-tenths cents (.204) for Park General Fund on each one hundred

dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; one and fivetenth cents (.015) for Park District Bond Fund on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; four and fivetenths cents (.045) for Police Pension Fund on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; nine and ninetenths cents (.099) for Fire Pension Fund on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; three cents (.03) for thoroughfare fund on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of such taxable property; five cents (.05) for Redevelopment on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; twentyseven and seven-tenths cents (.277) Sanitation Maintenance Fund on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; five and four-tenths cents (\$.054) for Sanitation Sinking Fund on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; all of which levies are duly authorized by specific laws.

Section 10. That for the purpose of paying the principal and interest due on the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the city, there is hereby appropriated the respective sums set forth in the following table, to-wit:

Railway; thence southward on and along the west right-of-way line of said C.C.C. & St. L. All boundary lines as above described shall be considered as extending across all intersecting streets and alleys.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval by the Mayor, and publication according to law.

Also, beginning at a point in the west property line of Graham Avenue one hundred seventy-five (175) feet, north of the center line of East 10th Street; thence north on and along the west property line of Graham Avenue to the south property line of East 13th Street; thence west on and along the south property line of East 13th Street a distance of one hundred thirty-nine and sixteen one-hundreths (139.16) feet to the northwest corner of Lot 135 in Ellenberger Terrace 4th Section Revised Addition; thence south on and along the west lines of Lots 135 to 112, both inclusive, in said Addition to the north line of Lot 109 in said Addition; thence west on the north line of said Lot 109 to the northwest corner of said Lot 109; thence south on the west line of said Lot 109 to the present corporation line of the City of Indianapolis; thence east on and along the present corporation line which is one hundred seventy-five (175) feet north of and parallel with the center line of East 10th Street to the place of beginning.
