Gentlemen:—WHEREAS, The plat of Drake & Buel's subdivision of the Peru & Indianapolis Railroad Company's addition, as appears in Plat Book No. one, page 227, in the Recorder's office of Marion county, Indiana, shows a street twenty-five feet in width called Utah street, lying along the west bank of the old Canal bed, south of Morris street; and

Whereas, The plat of the Cincinnati & Chicago Railroad Company's addition, as appears in Plat Book No. one, page 249, in the Recorder's office of Marion county, Indiana, shows a street twenty-five feet wide called East Utah street, lying along the east bank of the old Canal bed, south of Morris street; and

Whereas, There is much doubt, uncertainty and dispute, as to the location of the lines of the Canal bed. and of both of said streets, lying on either side thereof, to the great detriment and inconvenience of the property adjacent thereto; and

Whereas, Said old Canal bed north of Morris street has been entirely abandoned, and the same has been filled up and subdivided into lots, therefore the undersigned, owners of real estate abutting on said street, respectfully petition your honorable bodies to open and lay out, to a uniform width of forty (40) feet, a street extending from Morris street to Wisconsin street, the center of which proposed street shall be the center of the old Canal bed, and is particularly described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at a point on the south line of Morris street 877.06 feet west of the west line of Meridian street; thence southwestwardly to a point on the north line of Wisconsin street 920.77 feet west of the west line of said Meridian street; thence west along the north line of Wisconsin street 40 feet; thence northeastwardly parallel with the above described line of said proposed street to the south line of Morris street; thence east along the south line of Morris street, 40 feet to the place of beginning.
