The proceedings of the regular session held May 6tl 1872, were read and approved.

Sealed proposals, for the improvement of sundry street sidewalks, etc., were received, opened, read and referred to th Committee on Contracts.

Mr. Craft, from the Committee on Contracts, made the following report :

INDIANAPOLIS, May 13, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee on Contracts, to whom was referred sundry proposals, have examined the same, and would recomment that contracts be awarded as follows, to-wit:

FIRST.

To grade and pave the west sidewalk of Meridian street, from McCarty to Morris street, to John Scheirn at 55 cents per lineal foot front.

SECOND.

To grade and pave with brick the east sidewalk on Meridian street, from Merrill to McCarty street, to Henry C. Roney at 56 cents per lineal foot front.

THIRD.

To grade and gravel Wood street and the east sidewalk, from North to Michigan street, to Patterson and Dunning at 63 cents per ineal foot front on the east side, and 45 cents per lineral foot front on the west side.

FOURTH.

To grade and gravel North street and sidewalks, from Minerva treet to the old corporation line, to Patterson and Dunning at 65 ents per lineal foot front on each side of the line improved.

FIFTH.

To grade and gravel St. Mary street and sidewalks, from Alabama o New Jersey street, to James Mahoney at 49 cents per lineal foot ront on each side of the line improved.

SIXTH.

To grade and pave with brick the west sidewalk on Meridian treet, from South to Merrill street, to John Scheirn at 61 cents per ineal foot front on the line improved.

SEVENTH.

To grade and gravel Yandes street and sidewalks, from Lincoln treet to Malott avenue, to Hanway and Hanna at 99 cents per lineal bot front on each side of the line improved, they being the only idders.

EIGHTH.

To grade and pave with brick the west sidewalk on Meridian

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street, from Russell avenue to Merrill street, to Henry C. Roney at 56 cents per lineal foot front on the line improved.

NINTH.

To grade and gravel Elizabeth street and sidewalks, from Blake street to Geisendorffs mill race, to Patterson and Dunning at 65 cents per lineal foot front on each side of the line improved.

TENTH.

To grade and gravel Market street and sidewalks, from Arsenal to State avenue or corporation line east, to John Greene at $94\frac{1}{2}$ cents per lineal foot front on each side of the line improved.

ELEVENTH.

To grade and pave with brick the north sidewalk on Vermont street, from Pennsylvania to East street, to R. M. Riner at 59 cents per lineal foot front on the line improved.

TWELFTH.

To grade and gravel Douglass street and sidewalks, from North street to Indiana avenue, to Patterson and Dunning at 53 cents per lineal foot front on each side of the line improsed.

The Sewer Engineer made the following report:

INDIANAPOLIS, May 13, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis :

GENTLEMEN—According to the sewerage plan furnished by Mr. Lane, and adopted by the Council, the main sewer, which now terminates at the intersection of Kentucky avenue and Washington street, would extend up Washington to Winston street, thence north to Pogues' Run.

The construction of the sewer on the principal business street and main thoroughfare of the city will be a great annoyance to the citizens, and a serious injury to the business of the city. I believe the purposes for which the sewer is designed will be fully met by taking it from its present terminus up Illinois to Ohio street, thence east to Pogues' Run, terminating at the same point as by the other route. The cost of building the sewer would be less on Ohio than on Washington street, as the expense of taking up and relaying the Street railroad tracks and the bowldering would be avoided. Other changes which would become necessary would make the total cost about the same.

Should you deem it expedient to make this change, it should be done before the sewer on North Illinois street is commenced. Should

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the change not be made, it will be necessary to extend the main sewer to the east side of Illinois street, in order to make a permanent connection with the Illinois street sewer. The main sewer now stops on the south side of Washington street.

Notwithstanding what has been done, it may be well for the Council to examine into the expediency of making Pogues' Run the main sewer of the city.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Cottrell offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Street Commissioner be instructed to notify E. B. Noel to have the railroad crossing at his ware house, on South Alabama street, properly planked the full width of the street and sidewalks, and also to plank to a distance of not less than two feet on the outside of said railroad track, and on a failure to perform said work within twenty days after the serving of said notice, that the Street Commissioner is hereby instructed to tear up the railroad on said crossing and bowlder the same with good bowlder stones.

Mr. Gimber offered the following motion :

Moved: That the City Clerk be, and is hereby directed to advertise for proposals for building an iron bridge over the lower arm of the canal, on Washington street, the bridge to be built according to plans and specifications furnished by the Civil Engineer, the present bridge is an old dilapidated wooden bridge, and not wide enough for the travel over that bridge.

Which was referred to the Committee on Bridges.

Mr. Kahn offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That before any contracts are let out for public improvements, the City Civil Engineer shall report to this Council an estimate in detail of the probable cost of such improvements.

Which was laid on the table.

Mr. Reagan offered the following motion:

Moved: That the City Marshal be ordered to issue a proclamation against throwing dead animals into the central canal, between Market street and the corporation line south.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion :

Moved: That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby ordered to see that the irons of the catch basins on Ray street sewer, between Illinois and Missouri streets, are kept in good order.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion :

Moved: That that the City Marshal be, and is hereby ordered to notify the property holders to clean up the first alley west of Miss-issippi street, running north from Georgia street.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Rush presented the following petition:

INDIANAPOLIS, May 13, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN—I pray your honorable body will pass an ordinance to grade and gravel the street or alley called Wabash street, running east and west through square 42, from Alabama to New Jersey street, so that we can improve other alleys crossing the same.

And also pass an ordinance to grade the alley running through lots 7, 8 and 9, running north and south through square No. 42, to grade said alley down to the gravel bed and no further. Said alley has been improved, and is now filled up with dirt above the gravel. Said surplus dirt will help to fill up Wabash street.

Mr. Sherwood presented the following petition :

INDIANAPOLIS, May 13, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN-Your petitioners, would respectfully present, that

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they are property holders in the immediate vicinity of the school furniture works of Messrs. Higgins & Ryan, that said works recently caught fire, and were saved from total destruction only by the great efficiency and untiring energy of our excellent fire department, that by reasons of the inflammable nature of the building and its contents, and the facilities for the spread of the flames in every direction, our property at one time seemed doomed to destruction, and was only saved by the successful labors of the fire department aforesaid. That the works are about to be built again, over our protest, of the same inflammable material, to-wit: wood and shingles, or their equivalants, thereby placing our property in still further peril from fire, and greatly deterionating its value and our individual safety.

Wherefore your petitioners pray

1st. That your honorable body, together with the Chief Fire Engineer, will interpose in our behalf such legal relief as we may be entitled to, consistent with the mutual interests of the parties.

2nd. That if there be no existing statute to meet the case, we may have an ordinance introduced to cover this and similar cases.

3d. That pending the consideration of this ordinance, the parties may be restrained by an injunction from proceeding with the work. And your petitioners will ever pray, etc.

Roach and Mr. Neeld be allowed privilege of grading, graveling and paving the sidewalks with brick, so much of East Second street as separates their property, said work to be done at the expense of the petitioners, and under the direction and to the satisfaction of the City Civil Engineer.

Moved: That the Street Commissioner be directed to raise the flaging at the crossing of St. Clair and Pennsylvania streets.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion :

Moved: That the Street Commissioner be directed to examine the coverings of the various coal or wood vaults in the sidewalks of the city, and that in case he finds any of them out of repairs, that he notify

the owner of, or the persons occupying the same, to put the same in proper repair immediately, and that in default thereof, said Street Commissioner proceed at once to cause such vault to be filled up.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Woodburn offered the following motion :

Moved: That John F. Ramsey be permitted to pave with brick, and curb the outside edge with stone, in front of his property on South Illinois street, the same to be done in thirty days, the City Civil Engineer is hereby directed to set the grade stakes.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved: That the City Civil Engineer be directed to locate the Delaware street bridge in the center of said street, and he is hereby directed to set the stakes.

Which was adopted.

Dr. Woodburn moved that the Councilmen from the different wards retain the seats in Council Chamber same as last year.
