# REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

Monday, May 20, 1872, 7½ o'clock P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Batty, Bigham, Bollman, Cottrell, Craft, Gibson, Gimber, Hardesty, Kahn, Kennington, Pressly, Reagan, Rush, Sherwood, Thalman, Whitsit, Wiles and Woodburn—18.

The proceedings of the regular session held May 13th, 1872, were read and approved.

Mr. Craft, from the Committee on Contracts, made the following report:

Indianapolis, May 20, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee on Contracts, to whom was referred sundry proposals for improving streets, etc., have examined the same and would recommend that contracts be awarded as follows, to-wit:

#### FIRST.

To grade and pave with brick the east sidewalk on Virginia avenue, from Louisiana to South street, to James W. Hudson at sixty cents per lineal foot front.

#### SECOND.

To grade and pave with brick the north sidewalk on St. Clair street, from Meridian to Delaware street, to Henry C. Roney at forty four cents per lineal foot front,

#### THIRD.

To grade and pave with brick the east sidewalk on Meridian street, from St. Joseph to First street, to Henry C. Roney at sixty four cents per lineal foot front on the line improved, he being the only bidder.

#### FOURTH.

To grade and pave with brick the south sidewalk on New York street, from Massachusetts avenue to East street, to John Schier at fifty-nine cents per lineal foot front on the line improved.

#### FIFTH.

To grade and pave with brick the east sidewalk on Rast street, from Massachusetts avenue to St. Clair street, to John Schier at sixty cents per foot front on the line improved.

#### SIXTH.

To grade and gravel Cedar street and sidewalks, from Huron

street to the old corporation line east, to James Mahoney at seventy-five cents per lineal front on each side of the line improved.

#### SEVENTH.

To grade and gravel Merrill street and sidewalks, from East street to Virginia avenue, to Hiram Seibert at eighty-seven cents per lineal foot front on each side of the line improved.

#### EIGHTH.

To grade and pave with brick the north sidewalk on Michigan street, from Delaware street to Massachusetts avenue, to John Schier at sixty cents per front foot on the line improved.

#### NINTH.

To grade and gravel Locust street, from Sycamore to Ray street, to Hiram Seibert at fifty cents per lineal foot front on each side of the line improved.

#### TENTH.

To grade, pave with brick, and curb with stone the north sidewalk on South street, from Delaware to Pennsylvania street, to James W. Hudson at one dollar and fifteen cents per front foot for paving, and fifty-five cents per front foot for curbing.

# ELEVENTH.

To grade and pave with brick the sidewalks on South street, from Meridian to Illinois street, to H. C. Roney at sixty-one cents per lineal foot on each side of the line improved.

Indianapolis, May 20, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen—Allow me to call your attention to that part of Seventh street, in front of W. H. Talbott's property. The balance of the street, east to the Fall Creek pike, and west to the Michigan road, is now being graded and graveled. The drainage being west, something will have to be done on this portion of the street, to afford drainage for the eastern end. The distance in front of Talbott's property is six hundred feet, and will cost two hundred dollars to grade it—thirty-three feet wide, the present width of the street. The property on the south side would be liable for one-half the expense of grading. I suppose the south sidewalk could be graveled at the expense of the property owners, and perhaps one-half the street.

It will be necessary to build a catch basin, and take down and rebuild two manholes, the cost of which is included in the above.

The footway on the east side was designed to be eight feet wide, but if there are two, six feet in width will be sufficient, the estimate is made for one that wide, and the amount saved by reducing the other is deducted.

It will be necessary to build two catch basins on the east side of the tunnel, and one at the south end, costing about \$665.00, which are not provided for in the contract for the tunnel.

# PROPOSITION OF PLAINTIFF.

- 1st. That the crossing of the road shall be by a well and permanently constructed stone culvert, and the approaches thereto to be so graded as to be perfectly safe and easy.
- 2d. The ditch constructed on, along and upon the west side of the road, to be on the west boundary thereof, and a well and permanently contsructed bowldered ditch of sufficient size and capacity to carry off all the water that may flow through said sewer, and the same to be constructed as to prevent the overflow of said road or any part thereof.
- 3d. That in the construction of said bowldered ditch on said west side of said road, said road shall be raised to a hight sufficient to slope gradually from said ditch to the east side of the road, and thereby prevent the water standing on said road.
- 4th. In lieu of the above proposition, plaintiff proposes that the defendant shall use cement sewer pipe under the road, and instead of said bowldered ditch, to use such sewer pipe, thus continuing under ground said sewer all the way to the railroad.

Negative—Councilmen Cottrell, Gibson, Gimber, Hardesty, Kahn, Reagan, Sherwood and Woodburn—8.

Mr. Gimber moved that the report of the Special Committee on Tunnels, made to Council May 13, 1872, in regard to additional sidewalk on the west side of South Illinois street, etc., be concurred in, and that the Civil Engineer be instructed to close the contract for said work, in accordance with said report.

The question being, shall the motion be adopted. Those who voted in the affiirmative, were Councilmen Bigham, Bollman, Gimber, Kahn, Kennington, Reagan, Rush, Whitsit and Wiles—9.

Those who voted in the negative were. Councilmen Batty, Cottrell, Craft, Gibson, Hardesty, Pressly, Sherwood, Thalman and Woodburn—9.

There being a tie vote, His Honor, the Mayor, voted in the affirmative, so the motion was adopted and the report concurred in.

Also, General Ordinance No. 36, 1872, entitled:

'An Ordinance to regulate the establishment of grades of streets in the city of Indianapolis.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Batty presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, May 20, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis;

GENTLEMEN-Your petitioners represent that they are property owners on Yandes, Columbia and Beeler streets, in the Second Ward of the city; that said streets run in unbroken lines due north to Tinker street, or what will be Tinker street, when said street is opened through eastward; that Martindale & Fletcher, in laying off and platting an addition to the city, on the north side of said Tinker street, have made an offset in each of said streets-Yandes, Columbia and Beeler - completely shutting off said streets at Tinker, and throwing the continuation thereof more than the width of said streets to the east, thus destroying the beauty of appearance of this portion of the city, and materially depreciating the value of our property. We would respectfully petition your honorable body to refuse to receive the plat of said Martindale & Fletcher's additon, until they shall have remedied the defect named by surveying continuations of said Yandes, Columbia and Beeler streets, on a line due north, without offsets on said streets, as already opened and accepted in the plat of E. Fletcher's subdivision of Fletcher's heirs' addition to the city of Indianapolis.

Mr. Thalman introduced Special Ordinance No. 101, 1872, entitled:

An Ordinance to grade and gravel Minerva street, between New York and North streets.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Thalman offered the following motion:

Moved: That the matter of Vacating that part of Fifth street east of Illinois, be referred to the City Engineer, to make a survey on a line of said street through to Meridian, to ascertain what part of said street could be opened through, and not interfere with Mr. Henderson's residence.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Thalman presented the following remonstrance:

Indianapolis, May 20, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen—We, the undersigned, property holders on the west side of Delaware street, between Maryland street and Union Railway Co.'s tracks, protest against the erection of said bridge now in process of construction in the center of the street, and for the following reasons:

1st. The frequent obstruction of the street being caused by rail-way trains, we deem it no more than just that property owned by railroad companies should sustain the principal damage caused by said bridge.

2d. By erecting the bridge in the centre of the street, less than seventeen feet is allowed for passage of vehicles between the curbstone and pier of bridge, which is entirely inadequate.

3d. The passage-way for foot passengers being on the west side of the bridge, the approaches thereto will occupy full seven feet of additionl space, leaving less than ten feet between the curbstone and approach to bridge, which will barely admit of the passage of one vehicle.

4th. The west side of the street is almost wholly occupied by business houses which require space for the passing of drays and business wagons, and the loading and unloading of merchandise, and by erecting the bridge in the center of the street, business will be destroyed.

5th. By erecting the bridge in the center of the street, the manufacturing establishments on the west side will suffer annoyance and damages, by their establishments being so darkened and obstructed by the bridge as to virtually suspend their business in some hours of day. There being but one business house on the east side, and that erected upon railroad property, the objections as herein stated will not apply to that side of the street. Furthermore, the sidewalk on the east side is but little used by foot passengers, but on the contrary is given wholly to the use of drays and business vehicles.

In consideration of the damage to our busines and property from the bridge being erected in the center of the street we respectfully, but earnestly, pray your honorable body to cause the bridge to be erected where you, in your good judgment, originally placed it; but if this be not done, then we pray you not to erect the contemplated bridge.

A decent respect to the opinions of those whose property and busines is *directly damaged*, in the erection of the proposed bridge, will cause your honorable body to move cautiously, so as to not ruin the interests of the *majority* in favor of the minority.

For this we will ever pray.

Moved: That the City Council take it for granted, (without trial,) that the Delaware street viaduct will be a constant source of annoyance, and is one grand humbug; they therefore agree to pay the contractor \$2,000 to relinquish his contract and not build the same.

Mr. Kennington offered the following motion as a substitute for Mr. Thalmans motion:

Moved: That the City Engineer be directed to locate the Delaware street bridge on the east side of the street as first contemplated.

Mr. Wiles moved to refer the whole matter to the Committee on Streets and Alleys, to ascertain and report upon what terms the contractors are willing to relinquish their contract.

After considerable discussion Mr. Bigham offered the following motion:

Moved: That the City Marshal be directed to notify the bridge contractors on the South Delaware street bridge, to suspend work for one day, from this date; and that a special committee be appointed to examine into the contract and plans of said bridge, and that said committee be required to report their proceedings at a special meeting of the Common Council, to be held on Tuesday evening, May 21, 1872, at 8 o'clock.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Councilmen Batty, Bigham, Bollman, Gibson, Hardesty, Kahn, Pressly, Sherwood, Whitsit, Wiles and Woodburn—11.

Negative—Councilmen Cottrell, Craft, Gimber, Kennington, Reagan and Thalman—6.

His Honor appointed as such Committee, Councilmen Bigham, Whitsit, Gibson, Sherwood and Hardesty.
