REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, Monday, Sept. 16, 1872, $7\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock, P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

The proceedings of the regular session, held Sept. 9th, 1872, were read and approved.

Sealed proposals for the improvement of streets, &c., and for building a continuation of the Tinker street sewer, were opened, read and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

Sealed proposals for building an Engine House on the corner of Delaware and New York streets, were opened, read and referred to the Committee on Fire Department.

Sealed proposals for City Loan were opened, read and referred to the Committee on Finance, with instructions to examine and report at this meeting.

Mr. Thalman, from the Committee on Contracts, made the following report:

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 16, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:—Your Committee on Contracts, to whom was referred sundry proposals for grading and graveling Dillon street and sidewalks, from Prospect street to English avenue, find them to be as follows, to-wit:

James Mahoney \$1.35 cents per front foot. John Green \$1.31 cents per front foot. Hiram Seibert \$1.20 cents per front foot. On each side of the line improved.

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ORDINANCES ON FIRST READING.

Mr. Thalman introduced special ordinance No. 177, 1872, entitled :

An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with wooden block pavement Indiana avenue, from Illinois street to Fall creek bridge.

An ordinance to provide for the building of a sewer in Pine street, from Elm street to Fletcher avenue.

Mr. Bollman introduced special ordinance No. 178, 1872, entitled :

An ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, lamps and fixtures complete to burn gas, except the service pipe, on Wyoming street, from Delaware to High streets.

Mr. Cottrell introduced special ordinance No. 179, 1872, entitled:

An ordinance to provide for grading and graveling Yeiser street and sidewalks from Japan street to the Madison Road.

ROLL CALL.

Mr. Batty presented the following petition:

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 16, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis :

GENTLEMEN:—The undersigned, owners of the real estate fronting on Bellefontaine street, between Forest Home and Christian avenues, would respectfully represent to your honorable body that the grade as at present estab-

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lished by the City Civil Engineer on said Bellefontaine street, and between the streets named, is such as to work a very great and permanent injury to the property fronting thereon; that said injury results in a great measure from the fact that by the system of drainage adopted by the Civil Engineer all the water for from two to eight squares has been drained into the crossing of Bellefontaine street and Christian avenue, and no provision whatever has been made to conduct it from that point. And inasmuch as there must of necessity, at an early day, be some provision made for draining that portion of the city, we most earnestly ask that that provision be made now; and that before the graveling and paving of said street, now under contract, are completed, the grade be lowered so as not to injure the property fronting thereon. And to this end we also ask that the work on said street be stopped until the matter of drainage is definitely settled. And your petitioners will ever pray.

Mr. Batty presented the following remonstrance:

Moved, That the City Civil Engineer cause flagging to be placed across the streets and alleys on Bellefontaine street, from Christian avenue to Home avenue, and that he curb with stone the sidewalk corners of the said alleys and streets.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That the City Attorney inquire into and report to this Council the present status of the case of George L. Dart vs. City of Indianapolis, in regard to the opening of Winston street, which was appealed to the Supreme Court, and also to report what steps are necessary, if any, to bring the case to a final hearing and decision.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Bigham offered the following motion:

Moved, That Henry Wonderly have permission to pave the sidewalk in front of his residence on the southwest corner of New York and Davidson streets with good hard burned brick; said work to be done at his own expense, and under the direction of the City Civil Engineer, who is hereby directed to set the grade stakes.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Bollman offered the following motion:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be and is hereby directed to lay down cement pipe at the crossing of Bicking and Delaware streets.

Which was adopted.

By consent, Mr. Wiles, from the Committee on Finance, made the following report:

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 16, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:-Your Committee on Finance, to whom was referred the various bids for the two hundred thousand two year eight per cent. bonds of this

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city, report that in our opinion Woolen, Webb & Co. are the best bidders for seventy-five thousand dollars, bearing date of September 17th, 1872, and that Joseph A. Moore & Bro. are the best bidders for twenty-five thousand dollars of those bearing same date, and recommend that the contract be awarded them accordingly. We reject all other bids.

Moved, That William Mankedick be allowed to pave the sidewalks with brick in front of his property on Prospect and Shelby streets, and the Civil Engineer is hereby directed to set the grade stakes.

WHEREAS, The general sewarage plan for the city contemplates a main sewer on Mississippi street, from Tinker street to the Kentucky avenue sewer, and whereas it is desirable to improve Missouri street south of Market street, and whereas said part of Missouri street cannot be improved without a sewer in the same, therefore

Resolved, That the Committee on Sewers and Sewer Engineer be instructed to examine into the practicability of so changing the plan of the Mississippi street sewer, as to run it west on Market street to Missouri, and thence south to the Kentucky avenue sewer.

Which was referred to the Committee on Sewers and Sewer Engineer.

Mr. Rush offered the following preamble and resolution :

WHEREAS, There is great danger of fire from the railroad engines when passing under the South Delaware Street Bridge, therefore

Resolved, That under the floor of said bridge, where the railroad engines pass, the same be covered with heavy sheet iron, No. ——.

Which was referred to the Committee on Bridges.

Mr. Rush offered the following motion:

Moved, That the City Marshal be and hereby is directed to notify the contractor of the South Illinois street block pavement, to put the crossings of

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South Illinois and Washington streets in a fair passable condition at once, also to remove the boulders on the corner of Washington street.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Thalman offered the following motion:

Moved, That S. Showalter be allowed to dig a well and put in a pump in front of his property on Indiana avenue. Also, that C. E. Geisendorff & Co. be allowed the same privilege in front of their property on Blake street, both parties complying with ordinance regulating the same.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Thalman presented the following petition:

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 16, 1872.

the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

We, the undersigned, tax payers and property owners living in the Fourth Ward, would respectfully petition your honorable body against the opening of Blackford street to the north-west end, believing there is no necessity for this improvement.

Mr. Whitsit offered the following motion:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be directed to place stone crossings across Virginia avenue at Huron and Merrill streets.

Mr. Wiles presented two bills in favor of J. J. Palmer for grading Tinker street in front of W! H. Talbott's property.

Which was referred to the Committee on Accounts and Claims and City Civil Engineer.

Mr. Wiles offered the following motion:

Moved, That the City Clerk be instructed to readvertise for the sale of the one hundred thousand dollar eight per cent. two year bonds of this city, to bear date of Nov. 1st, 1872.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Wiles presented the following petitions:

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 16, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Your petitioners, the Union Railway Company of Indianapolis, respectfully represent:

That by reason of the increased number of railroads centering in this city, and of the increasing traffic over the respective roads, the Union tracks and other facilities now supplied by your petitioners have become inadequate.

That the convenience of the railroads, and also the convenience and safety of the public, requires that two additional Union tracks should cross the city from east to west.

Your petitioners propose, upon obtaining the proper license from the City Council, to construct such additional double track along the following route, viz:

Commencing at a point on the present line of Union track at its intersection with Liberty street, thence running on the south side of said present track southwestwardly down Pogue's Run, crossing East street, New Jersey street, Virginia avenue, and Alabama street, at their intersection, Delaware and Pennsylvania streets, thence southwest to a point on the east line of Meridian street, opposite to the mouth of McNabb street, thence west across Meridian street, thence through McNabb street and across Illinois, Tennessee and Mississippi streets, one of said tracks continuing thence north-westwardly across Louisiana street and intersecting the present Union track in Kentucky avenue. The other of said proposed two tracks diverging westwardly, and intersecting one of the existing Union tracks on Louisiana st.

Your petitioners pray that they may be duly authorized and licensed by ordinance to cross and occupy each of the streets aforesaid, together with all the intervening alleys, with such additional double track.

Your petitioners further pray for license and authorty to occupy and enclose a portion of Louisiana street, in front or opposite to the Union Passenger Depot, extending to a point five feet north of the north rail of the north track now in said street, being 29 feet north from the north wall of the Union Passenger Depot.

They fully believe that with the permission to lay additional tracks, and to

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occupy and enclose a portion of Louisiana street, as above asked, they can establish a system of union railway traffic that will be greatly more convenient to both the several railroads and to the public.

That in the event of receiving the license prayed for, it is their design to take up the tracks now lying on Louisiana street, to pass all freight trains on the south side of the Depot, to remove the ticket office and all other offices and rooms appertaining to the Union Passenger Depot to the north side of the building and into that part of it that will extend into Louisiana street, and to occupy the space now occupied with offices, &c., at the south side of the Depot with additional tracks, the number now in use being insufficent to accommodate all the trains entering the Depot.

From the changes proposed, the following among other manifest advantages will result, viz: The obstruction of Louisiana street by freight trains will cease, and passengers and the public generally having business at the ticket and other offices, can transact it without being obliged to incur the risk and inconvenience of crossing all the tracks, as is now necessary to get to the offices on the south side, so far as concern the great majority of people having such business to transact.

> THE UNION RAILWAY CO. OF INDIANAPOLIS, By D. RICKETTS, President.

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 16, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianopolis :

The undersigned owners and occupants of property upon Louisiana street fronting the Union Passenger Depot, having seen the petition of this date of the Union Railway Company, for leave to lay additional tracks, and to occupy and inclose that portion of Louisiana street in front of the Depot, now occupied by railroad tracks, would respectfully recommend that the petition of the Union Railway Company be granted.

In view of the fact that Louisiana street extends no further east than Meridian street, it is the opinion of your petitioners that the remaining feet would be sufficient for the public use at that place, and that it would, if unobstructed by tracks and freight trains, more fully answer all the demands of public convenience than the full street now does, or can do, in its present condition.

They say that their daily observation shows them that the obstruction of Louisiana street necessarily caused by the passing of freight trains, and the consequent obstruction of access to the Depot, are attended by very serious inconvenience to the public.

They also submit that obvious reasons of public convenience require that the ticket office and other offices of the Union Railway Company should, if practicable, be established on the north side of the Depot.

Your petitioners, believing that both the interest of the public and their

interest as citizens of the immediate locality, would be promoted by the changes proposed, would respectfully ask that the prayer of the petition of the Union Railway Company may be granted.
