The City Solicitor made the following report:

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 27, 1872.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:—In obedience to your instructions, I have examined the question of the power of the Council to exempt from taxation the property of the Citizens' Street Railway Company, and respectfully submit the following opinion:

The Constitution of the State provides that taxation shall be uniform and equal, and that all property shall be taxed, "excepting such only for municipal, educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, as may be specially exempted by law." (Const. Art. X.) The legislature, under this provision, have exempted certain property. (1 G. & H., p. 69.) But the class of property owned by the Street Railway Company has not been, nor could it be, by the legislature exempted from taxation. The City Charter requires the Common Council to assess taxes upon all property subject to taxation for State and county purposes. (Charter, secs. 24, 58.)

It is very clear, therefore, that the Common Council have no lawful power to exempt the property of the Citizens' Street Railway Company from taxation.

Special appropriation ordinance No. 69, 1872:

Was taken up and read the second time, and, on motion, unanimously amended by inserting \$1,000 to be used for the benefit of the poor and needy of the city, the same to be expended by the Committee on Benevolence.

In regard to which Mr. Thalman offered the following motion:

Moved, That where the Committee are not themselves personally acquainted with the needs of the applicant, that they be referred to the Councilman of the Ward where they reside for a certificate of their worthiness.

Which was adopted.

On motion by Dr. Woodburn, Councilmen Craft and Whitsit were added to said Committee for the purpose of aiding in the distribution of said fund.

The ordinance was then ordered engrossed, and read the third time and passed by the following vote:

Affirmative—Councilmen Bigham, Bollman, Cottrell, Craft, Gibson, Gimber, Hardesty, Kahn, Kennington, Pressly, Reagan, Rush, Thalman, Whitsit, Wiles and Woodburn—16.

Negative-None.

By consent, His Honor, the Mayor, offered the following motion:

Moved, That the Committee on Railroads, without delay, investigate and act upon the question of persuading or inducing the different railroads entering Indianapolis to bring wood for fuel into the city during the prevalence of the horse disease, the same to be sold or otherwise distributed at reasonable rates.

Which was adopted.

By unanimous consent, the rules were suspended for the purpose of taking up and reading the second and third times the following entitled ordinance:

An ordinance providing for the reporting and burial of persons dying from contagious and infectious diseases.

Which was read the second time.

His Honor, the Mayor, offered the following amendment:

There shall be no public demonstration at the funeral of any person who has died of small pox or other contagious disease in said city, without a permit from the Board of Health. Any one violating the provisions of this section shall be fined, upon conviction, in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

Which was adopted.

The ordinance as amended was then ordered engrossed, and read the third time and passed by the following vote:

Affirmative—Councilmen Bigham, Bollman, Cottrell, Craft, Gibson, Gimber, Hardesty, Kahn, Kennington, Pressly, Reagan, Rush, Thalman, Whitsit, Wiles and Woodburn—16.

Negative-None.

By consent, Mr. Craft offered the following motion:

Moved, That the Chief Fire Engineer be and is hereby authorized to hire horses at the lowest prices per day that they can possibly be procured, to work in the Steam Engines and Hose Reels, until the horses belonging to the Department are fully recovered from the prevailing epidemic, and that he at all times have a horse ready for his own use.

Which was adopted.

By consent, Mr. Craft offered the following motion:

Moved, That A. L. Wright be and is hereby permitted to lay down a flagstone crossing on Massachusetts avenue and in front of his Block, the same to be done at his own expense and under the direction of the Civil Engineer.

Which was adopted.

On motion the Council adjourned.
