Higgins be allowed to bowlder an eight foot driveway across the south sidewalk of Ray street.

Whereas, Councilman Gaul introduced the said motions, and should therefore be given the deserved credit for so doing.

Councilman Gasper offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That J. F. Flack be permitted to repair the sidewalk in front of his property on the corner of Massachusetts avenue and Delaware street, at his own expense, and under the direction of the City Civil Engineer, who is directed to set the necessary grade stakes.

Councilman Long offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements, Street Commissioner and City Attorney, to report at the next meeting: That the wages of the employes of the Street Commissioner (except the bridge gang), be raised twenty-five cents per day.

Councilman O'Connor offered the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Water:

Resolved, That the Indianapolis Water Company be, and are hereby, directed to extend their water main east on Bates street, from Benton street to Leota street; hydrants to be located under the direction of the Chief Fire Engineer. The City Clerk is hereby directed to notify said company of the passage of this resolution.

Councilman Stuckmeyer offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to place a new stock in the city well opposite Jordan's Drug Store, at the corner of South and East streets.

Councilman Swain presented the following petition; which was received:
