Gentlemen:—You submitted to me, through Alderman Connett, the bids received October 20, 1888, for the construction and erection of a bridge with stone abutments, in Garfield Park. I have the honor to report that I have carefully examined all of said bids, together with the plans submitted therewith, and find that Henry N. Tielking is the lowest bidder on the sub-structure.

For the superstructure, the bids submitted by the Wrought Iron Bridge Company of Canton, Ohio, are the lowest. Said company submit two bids; one plan, "B," for an iron bridge to carry the load required by the specifications on a factor of 4, for \$1,546.00, and the other plan, "A," to carry the same load on a factor of 5, for \$1,591.10; therefore I recommend that the proposition of \$1,591.10 for plan "A," be accepted, provided said company submit to the City Civil Engineer a full set of working drawings, which plans shall be approved by said Engineer.
