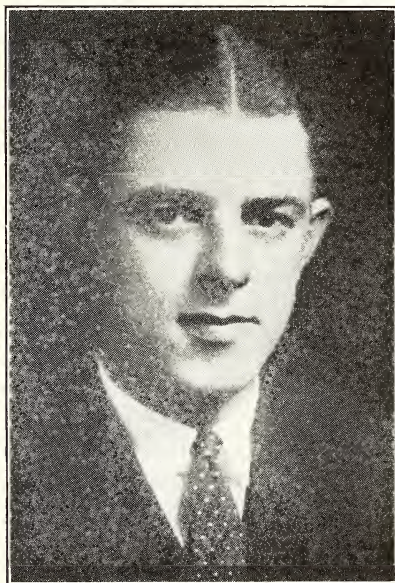

With the passing of Theodore Henry Allebach on January 11, 1927, the Indiana Academy of Science lost a member who had been elected to the organization scarcely a month before.

Mr. Allebach attended the grade and high schools in Emlenton, Pennsylvania, being graduated from the latter as an honor student in 1921. He entered Allegheny College the following September, having won by competitive examination the state scholarship for Venango, his



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home county. Throughout his four years in college he had an excellent reputation as a student, particularly in mathematics and chemistry, and at the time of graduation had won *cum laude* honors and the Ballinger Prize for high-grade work in chemistry. He was interested in fraternity and college activities, and during the senior year was an assistant in the Department of Chemistry. St. John's Reformed Church, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, and Alpha Chi Sigma claimed him as a member.

Coming to Purdue University in the fall of 1925 as an assistant in the Department of Chemistry, Mr. Allebach soon established his reputation as an earnest and capable student in higher mathematics and graduate courses in chemistry. Although he did not have time to demonstrate his worth to the Indiana Academy of Science, the organization lost in Mr. Allebach one who had energy, interest and capacity and who had given promise of really productive work in his chosen field.
