Navigating Shifting Landscapes in Education

Teachers have always had to adapt to changing circumstances in the classroom and in the world. Technologies change, curricula change, policies change, and through it all teachers persevere and make it work for their students. The last three years have been marked by radical change, not only with the pandemic, but also with changing circumstance in teaching as a field and sweeping governmental policies in Indiana and beyond. This year, we gathered at the annual INTESOL conference to contemplate not only how things have changed but how we've learned to navigate these changes. Keynote speaker Dr. Trish Morita-Mullaney led a retrospective on the ways language learning policies have changed in the United States and Indiana, and where we have the potential to go.

This issue features five peer-reviewed articles and one Voices From the Field editorial feature. This is followed by White, who discusses the importance of translanguaging in culturally responsive classrooms.
