Speech and Writing in the Composition Classroom TWI Spring 1989

The Spring 1988 Issue of TWI will focus on the bearing and applications that spoken and written modes of discourse have in the composition classroom. To what degree should the composition instructor be aware of differences in these modes, and how can this awareness be incorporated into the composition curriculum in ways which benefit the student? Possible topics:

- -the issue of orality in written discourse
- -the development of a student's written "voice"
- —the relationship between spoken and written language acquisition
- —spoken and written forms of discourse as pedagogical tools, both in written composition and in conferencing
- —the role of student dialects in the composition classroom.
