LAJM, The Language Arts Journal of Michigan

The Fall 1989 issue of LAJM, The Language Arts Journal of Michigan, will focus on teaching language in the English/ language arts classroom. The editors are interested in articles, review essays, and bibliographies which describe imaginative and effective ways to teach language study. Since research has demonstrated time and time again that grammar drill and piecework exercises in mechanics are ineffective and often counterproductive in teaching writing, what should be the role of 'grammar" in the English classroom? What should we teach about the ways the English language works and how might we teach it? How should we deal with dialect, usage, sentence structure, style? How should we deal with issues of stylistic variation, biased language, and doublespeak? What is the relationship of language study to the study of literature and composition? Are there ways to make the study of language as interesting, dynamic, and rewarding as the study of literature and composition? The editors of LAJM are interested in articles exploring these and other issues involving language study for a special focus issue for Fall, 1989. Deadline for submissions is September 1, 1989.

LAJM regularly publishes articles, interviews, review-essays, annotated bibliographies, and classroom practices that discuss issues, theory, theory-based practice, and research in the teaching and learning of the language arts at all levels, kindergarten through college, and in all areas of concern to the English/language arts teacher—composition, literature, reading, language study, critical theory, media, pedagogy.

Manuscripts should be 4-12 pages in length, double-spaced, and use the MLA style for parenthetical documentation and the NCTE Guidelines for Non-Sexual Use of Language. Computers and Composition invites readers to submit papers for an issue entitled "Questions for the 1990's" to be published in March/April 1990. Individual papers should focus on theoretical, pedagogical, and research issues in a specific area of computers and composition studies. Suggested topics include, among others, computer and linguistics, computers and teacher education in composition, computers and reading, compters and literacy, computers and political/social issues in composition studies, computers and literature, computers and basic writers, computers and literacy criticism, computers and hypertext/media, computers and desktop publishing. Papers will be reviewed by members of the Computers & Composition Editorial Board, and final submissions will be invited by June 1, 1989.

All authors are encouraged to be issue-oriented, forward-looking, far-ranging and cross-disciplinary in identifying questions to be addressed during the next decade. We hope this "Ques-

tions for the 1990's" issue will help us set scholarly, pedagogical, and research agendas for the next decade.

Twenty-Ninth International Conference on General and Liberal Studies

Liberal Education as Cultural Policies

This conference invites participants to explore the many political, social, and ethical implications of liberal education. AGLS members and guests will consider together the cross relations and influences among liberal education, intellectual development, political development, and self development. The conference format, keynote speakers, special sessions, and social occasions will provide both a format and an atmosphere to stimulate a vital exchange of opinions and arguments.

Proposals should emphasize discussion and participation. Perference will be given to proposals that define issues, examine challenges facing liberal education, advance new ideas, or use innovative formats for presenting such issues as (1) defining the political and ethical implications of curriculum and pedagogy, (2) defining the extent to which liberal education has a responsibility for supporting or not supporting particular social programs or perspectives, (3) defining the role of liberal education in teaching citizenship, (4) defining the role of liberal education in teaching values, (5) defining the role of liberal education in challenging forms of social oppression (racism, sexism, homelessness, poverty, governmental-sanctioned violence, etc.), or (6) describing what a liberationist pedagogy would look like and how it would work in the classroom, or (7) any other proposal that investigates the interaction between liberal education and the political situation that liberally-educated students will face in the world beyond the university. Proposals (colloquia, workshops, position papers, etc.) should be submitted in a one- or two-page memorandum and should have a detachable cover sheet that bears your name and address. All proposals should be submitted by May 15, 1989, and should be addressed to Marshall Gregory, Department of English, Butler University, Indianapolis, IN 46208.

Papers delivered at the conference will be considered for publication for the conference issue of the AGLS journal, *Perspectives*.

Registration fee will be \$85 prior to September 30, 1989, \$95 thereafter. Membership in AGLS is \$30 per year. Presenters are required to be members.
