Transfiguring the Book, a Symposium sponsored by the Libraries of the Claremont Colleges, was held on 13 November 1993, covered "reading pictures, viewing texts, as well as the Electronic book and its ramifications.

Franklin Furnace. With MOMA's buying of the Franklin Furnace archive of over 13,500 items, added to their 4,000, makes MOMA's library the largest public archive of artists' books in the country. Rumor has it that MOMA paid \$500,000 for the collection, since FF couldn't afford to install the proper airconditioning, humidifying, and fireproofing needed to safeguard the collection. The influx of money allows Franklin Furnace to refurbish their Franklin St. location to make it a dynamic performance space, on the cutting edge. Siah Armajani will be creating a Living Library.

Acid Migration of Culture, a window installation by Ligorano/Reese is on exhibit at the Donnell Library Center in New York City, opposite the Museum of Modern Art, through 3 February. Using books, words, and video images, this installation provides a critical public forum that presents issues of the confrontational cultural debate. The 45-foot photo/video mural transforms the entrance and display windows into a huge, open reference book. The entrance be-

comes a dictionary defining selective terms that deal with contemporary cultural issues about art, criticism, and representation.

The title of the window installation, Acid Migration of Culture is a pun on the problems of library collections and in a larger sense, on our society's own cultural reference and identity. In a library collection, acid migration is an irreversible condition leading to the complete destruction and deterioration of a book.

New Art Examiner for September 1993 features the bookworks of Pattie Belle Hastings, as well as a review of "Volumination: The Book as Art Object" at the Ulrich Museum of Art in Wichita, KS.

Joni Mabe has just published Joni Mabe's Classic Postcard Book from her Museum of Obsessions, Personalities & Oddities (Atlanta, Nexus Press, 1993, \$15.00), a series of 32 postcards devoted to pop culture and historical icons. Included are "obscure heros" such as Pez Whatley, championship wrestler, who appears on one card handling a pair of serpents, afloat in a sea of clip art. Another obscure hero is '70s country singer Mel Street, a "borrowed angel" who died too soon. When he was really successful, on his birthday, he came down and ate breakfast, went back upstairs and shot himself in the head.
