NEW PERIODICALS

Joy, a Los Angeles-based fringe art publication, an editorial collaboration among Laurel Beckman, Ryan Hill and Kate Sorenson, is bound in a pink box much like the Chinese bakery boxes in which you can take home dim sun. The cover itself--ready to be transformed into a box, if you can, is imprinted with a mushroom patch, a giant bee, the price (\$3.99), while the inside of the box/binding has a child-like flower patch as well as the table of contents.

When one opens the pages, there is an unfolding of a major signature in which the collaborators suggest that this is "one big, honey-covered, throbbing (sic) confection dedicated to the joys of group psychology, animal behavior, pack mentality and the world that we share." An errata list peeks out of the pages, which allows us to see that artists are not such good spellers, nor do they follow through with getting author's permissions when necessary, but that is the learning process. The rest of the body of the publication is nicely designed by Laurel Beckman, has lots of good writing including an interview of Candice Pert by Bill Moyers, interesting graphics which continue the endpapers and an energy level which generates respect and commendation.
