John Latham: New Installations at the Mattress Factory, 1414 Monterey, Pittsburgh, PA. Since the 1940's, John Latham has initiated a wide range of art movements. He was an early practitioner of the shift from conventional spatial thinking to an event-based frame of reference (such as assemblage, performance, structural film and video, installation) and of the idea of context as an integral part of the work.

Downstairs, he has a **Long Glass**: glass wall divides the room. Through the glass pass books, wires and other objects. On the second floor, there is the documentation of Latham's work: books encased in plaster are scattered about the floor in the first room. Wall text and documentation in the second room focus on Latham's theories. On the third floor, Long Painting: a continuous rolled canvas passes through walls, as it travels into different rooms.
