POSTAL CHANGES. Special Fourth Class "book rate" now applies book status to books with FEWER than 24 pages, meaning most bookworks and children's books too. As of 25 November 1984, the 24-page limit has now been reduced to 8 pages, allowing most bookworks to qualify for the cheaper rate. Previously publishers paid the higher priced third-class, parcel post or UPS rates. In the same action, the Post Office Board decided that floppy disks also could be sent at the book rate.

BOOK REVIEWS

MY WORLD OF BIBLIOPHILE BINDING by Kerstin Tini Miura (Univ. of California Press, 1984) is a large, purplish book with pink endpapers. After a foreword by Bernard Middleton, the book opens with a fine overview of continental bookbinding processes used by Mrs. Miura. Some Britishtrained binders are certain to quarrel (over drinks)about the appropriateness of stacked headband cores or crepe paper as a spine lining material.

Mrs. Miura is a tremendously skilled paper decorator. Her process and color control result in very inspirational papers. Her use of these papers on the exteriors of books is only slightly marred by the block of color from the spine leather and fore-edge strips. Even less successful is THE BRIDGE OF SAN LUIS REY with its muddy and chaotic watercolor paper cover versus the yellow, black and blue spine--no restraint here! The tooled onlay, being her most frequently used device for dissecting space, generally doesn't work. Shapes are awkward and look too often to have been made to fit the tool.

My favorite book is LA FEE AUX MIETTES (The Crumbs Fairy). Photographed on a <u>plain</u> background the book is more in harmony with itself: the sprays of stars drift through the lima bean shapes and do not overpower. It's a winner!

Although I disagree with the images and

their relevance to the texts which they wrap, I like Kerstin Miura's book. It is a lavish work from a prolific binder. --Timothy C. Ely

FIVE PELICANS FISH by Ruth Hayes is another in this prolific flipbook and filmmaker's list of message books about the environment and ecology. This book is a tribute to the survival of this bird as a species and to the awareness which will make the care of our environment a ritual practice. You are instructed to flip the book back to front and you watch the graceful dives into the sea of these remarkable birds. \$3.95 from Random Motion Co., 159 Western Ave.W. #484, Seattle, WA 98119.

WINDMILLS is the first in a series of Breakdancing Flipbooks by Kinegraphics & The Graphic Medium, 1 Sutter, Suite 703, San Francisco, CA 94104. The breakdancing is exciting in its rolls and twirls, and the price was right. \$3.50

SLEEP AND DREAM by Duane Michals (New York, Lustrum Press, 1984, \$11.95) is a quiet book, full of poems and photographs by this famous photographer who stirs the imagination both with his words and his mystical photos. There is pathos and humor, mystical qualities of words and images, and much to ponder after you read the book, to lull you to think rather than to sleep.

WHAT SHALL WE DO WITHOUT US? The Voice and Vision of Kenneth Patchen(San Francisco, Sierra Club Books, 1984, \$12.95 paper, \$25.00 cloth) rediscovers for us the painted poems of this energetic poet who wove a stunning tapestry of form and color with these 37 superbly printed paintings. These picture poems radiate vibrancy and life the poet put into them in glowing color. For someone who had been in pain most of his creative life, these poems sing of life and joy and hatred of hypocrisy and war, never of bitterness and pain. As indicated in the afterword by James Laughlin, the works are not illustrated writings, but "the fusion of words and pictures into an integrated 'poem.'" To be sure, the originals have a three-dimensionality not to be experienced on the printed page, but these are extremely wonderful reproductions. The originals are
