The text is in Italian intermittently placed between transparencies on mylar which are interlaced with dark papers. There is a face of a woman, a child, a manthe texts deal with darkness, dark metals, the paper pages have landscapes and seascapes, the faces of handsome men, women, young people, billboards, wide landscapes, birds' eye views of street traffic, faces against landscapes, beautiful eyes, until you get to the colophon on transparent mylar. Frequency is at the end of every season. Published by Luca Pancrazzi and Randi Malkin, limited to 99 copies.

James Ewan is a multi-faceted umbrella artist, graduate of Pratt Institute of Architecture, tinged with the aesthetics of the Color Field school of painting, yet functional and very contemporary. He has done fabric design and sets for experimental theater, done art direction for AT & T, commissioned drawings on fabrics for functional/wearable art for two Madison Avenue businesses, and an exhibition of stuffed drawings for Works Gallery in Southhampton, New York.

His umbrella art began in 1984 when he came to California. Commissioned by the Rodeo Collection, he did his first series of umbrellas, entitled *Olympic Shade*. Then in 1986, Ewan did an exhibition of functional art, which included an 11½ foot round umbrella which was bought by Mr. & Mrs. Frederick Nicholas, Vice Chairman to the Board of the Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles.

He also did commissioned umbrellas for buyers who knew collectors who introduced Ewan to Nick Popich, owner of Filmland Center in Culver City, who was looking for evocative, function art to highlight the grand Atrium of his new entertainment business and public dining complex in Culver City.

Ewan has just finished 9 amazing geometric square umbrellas measuring 13 feet each which are now in the Grand Atrium. The editor and publisher of *Umbrella* was invited to the grand opening of the umbrella installation, wherein Hollywood mingled with newsletter publishers easily and well. The food was abundant and gorgeous, the umbrellas a stunning device, because they are truly painterly works of art.

SOUND & VIDEO ART

The British Library National Sound Archive has opened to the public in London after a 9-month, \$1.65 million facelift. The archive houses more than 750,000 disks and 40,000 hours of tape recordings, which are available free. From a 1926 recording of George Bernard Shaw to a recent nature tape of Costa Rican rain forest, you can hear them all, if you call a day or two ahead and ask for it, that is, if you know what you want to hear. If not, there is a catalog of recordings. The library has 15 listening booths, a video room and a library of music periodicals from throughout the world. There is also an introduction to the archive on cassette. There are full-time curators for classical music, jazz, popular music, international music, wildlife sounds, literature and drama. Located at 29 Exhibition Road in South Kensington, you can visit from 9:30 to 4:30 Monday to Friday, except on Thursday when it is open until 9:30 p.m. The phone number is 589-6603.
